Handle Fowl With Care

Thanksgiving Day turkeys, chickens and other fowl must be handled with care both before and after the meal.

Birds should be stuffed just before placing in the oven. If the stuffing is prepared ahead of time, it should be kept in the refrigerator until the bird is stuffed.

"An occasional large meal won't hurt you," Mrs. Smith said, "if you go easy on food a day or two before and a day or two after the feast."

"Another good thing to know is that the traditional Thanksgiving meal is high in food values," Mrs. Smith pointed out. "Turkey is rich in protein. Dressing also is very nourishing when made with such things as green celery and oysters. Even pumpkin is nutritious.
