



If your grocery list includes the purchasing of a frozen turkey, chicken or duck, it is very important that the bird be absolutely frozen when bought. The test of a frozen fowl is made by appearance and by touch to determine the frozen state. A bird must be completely frozen because if it is allowed to thaw at all, germs will multiply in the bird's exterior before the interior thaws.

Deer Kill Up Early Report

Rainy weather and soggy for-ests prevailed throughout Michigan on opening day of the 1958 deer season to dampen hunting enthusiasm of the state's red-coated army, estimated at more than 400,000

Despite these conditions, early traffic deer counts indicate the buck kill will likely surpass the 1957 total of 62,500.

The antierless take is also expected to be appreciably greater due to an increased area open in the Upper Peninsula. In the northern lower peninsula, antlerless kill has run close to the anticipated

At the Standish checking station, antlerless deer represented nearly one-third of the 3.040 counted

Hunter pressure in the upper peninsula is comparable to last year with normal hunter success record-

Northbound cars totaled 22,661; an estimated 45,322 hunters have crossed the Straits, a figure equaling that of any year since 1954.

There is an apparent over-all increase in hunter numbers in the northern lower peninsula. The influx is most marked in the Mio

ly, from Baldwin district while an average take was noted elsewhere in the region. At the Rifle River area in Ogemaw county, 31 bucks were harvested during the first two days compared to 20 in 1957. They averaged six pounds heavier than last year.


