Thanksgiving Eve Crash Fatal For Lloyd F. Blonshine In a terrible crash on top of a

hill just west of Ada, Wednesday evening, November 26, just before 6 o'clock, Lloyd F, Blonshine of

Lowell met instant death on the slippery snow covered road while returning to his home here. The crash occurred, Sheriff's officer Don Harrington reported, when the

Blonshine car going east, struck the rear end of one west bound car and then crashed head on into the car following.

The cars were accordioned together, Harrington said, completely blocking M-21 on top of the hill just west of Sommerville Construction offices, The road was blocked for over an hour for traf-

fic from both directions until the dead, injured, and wrecked cars could be removed.

The first car the Blonshine car struck was driven by John Ryvarsyk, 55, of Grand Rapids, Neither he or his passenger were injured. The car following Ryvarsyk driven by Warren Dalman, 28, of Hudsonville, was struck head on. Dalman and his passenger, Randal DeWent. 55, also of Hudsonville, were both taken to St. Mary's hospital.

At the hospital, DeWent was reported to have severe skull lacerations, fractured arm, broken hip and possible internal injuries and broken ribs. He was still hospitalized on Monday and his condition was reported as fair. Dalman was treated at the hospital for severe lacerations of the right eye and
