## Thanksgiving Eve Crash Fatal For Lloyd F. Blonshine

In a terrible crash on top of a hill just west of Ada, Wednesday evening, November 26, just before 6 o'clock, Lloyd F. Blonshine of Lowell met instant death on the slippery snow covered road while returning to his home here. The crash occurred, Sheriff's officer Don Harrington reported, when the Blonshine car going east, struck the rear end of one west bound car and then crashed head on into the car following.

The cars were accorded together, Harrington said, completely blocking M-21 on top of the hill just west of Somerville Construction offices. The road was blocked for over an hour for traffic from both directions until the dead, injured, and wrecked cars could be removed.

The first car the Blonshine car struck was driven by John Ryvasky, 55, of Grand Rapids. Neither he or his passenger were injured. The car following Ryvasky driven by Warren Dalman, 28, of Hudsonville, was struck head on, Dalman and his passenger, Randal DeWent, 55, also of Hudsonville, were both taken to St. Mary's hospital.

At the hospital, DeWent was reported to have severe skull lacerations, fractured arm, broken hip and possible internal injuries and broken ribs. He is still hospitalized on Monday and his condition was reported as fair. Dalman was treated at the hospital for severe lacerations of the right eye and middle finger, and was released from the hospital on Saturday, November 29.

Services were held Saturday afternoon for Lloyd F. Blonshine who was born April 3, 1894, in Coopersville. The Reverends David Debbink and Norman Woon officiated. Burial was in Oakwood cemetery. Mr. Blonshine was employed by the Consumers Power Co. for 40 years.

Surviving are his wife Katherine; one son, Duane Blonshine of Watervliet, New York; three daughters, Jean and Joan of Lowell, and Mary Katherine of Watson, Michigan; seven grandchildren; and one great-granddaughter. One brother, Roy of Grand Rapids; three sisters, Mrs. Travis Eden of Marne, Mrs. Elsie Manchester of Coopersville, and Mrs. Seyforth Johnson of Lansing.

## World Leader to Speak at Installation Service for Rev. David Debbink

Dr. Russell Henry Stafford will speak in the Lowell Congregational church Sunday evening at the installation service of Rev. D. H. Debbink as minister of the Lowell church. For the past thirteen years Dr. Stafford has been president of the Hartford Seminary, a graduate school for the training of ministers. He came to this position from an eighteen year pastorate of Old South Church in Boston, one of the most famous and historic churches in New England.

Dr. Stafford has held many important positions both in and out of the Congregational denomination. For ten years he was President of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions, the denominational foreign mission society. He is vice-moderator of the International Congregational Council, Chairman of the Board of Anatolia College in Turkey, a Director of Japan International Christian University Foundation, on the Editorial Board of the magazine "Religion in Life."

At present Dr. Stafford is the interim minister of the First Congregational church of Grand Rapids, and is also writing his sixth book. The Lowell Congregational church is honored to have a leader in the Christian World such as Dr. Stafford speak within the church. Others participating in the in-

**Lowell is Loaned Fire Truck**  
The John Bean Company of Lansing brought a fire truck here last Thursday, November 27, when it was found that the old Reo truck, now some 25 years old, was unable to be repaired after it broke down in a fire at the Neal farm on Timpson Road on Tuesday night. **School Fire Inspections**  
Lowell School Superintendent W. W. Gumsier said Wednesday that Lowell Schools are inspected regularly by officers from the State Fire Marshall and insurance companies. The two grade buildings are considered fire proof. The high school building is maintained to high standards and given high ratings on all inspections.

This truck has to be returned to the factory Thursday for a training program there, but it is hoped that Lowell and Vergennes Township Supervisors, Ray Rittenger and Fred Roth will have an opportunity to make arrangements with the County to help secure a County Fire Unit to cover this area. This unit would cost about \$18,000 and Chief Geldersma revealed that he would recommend to the County Fire Board to go along with the two townships in purchasing the unit. Final action must come from our supervisors and this board.

**Other Council Action**  
In other action at the Council meeting the purchase of a new Ford police cruiser with 300 hp. motor, was ordered at a price of \$1,249 and the old unit. The council also accepted the bid of \$335 for a new portable auxiliary lighting unit and flood lights for the fire department.

Residents of North Division St. presented a petition to the council asking the board to take action on repairing the street. This was referred to the street committee.

## School Board Reviews Needs of District For New Elementary Classrooms for '59

Lowell School District Board members Monday night reviewed the needs of the Lowell School system for elementary classrooms needed by the fall of 1959, to accommodate the growing enrollment in the lower grades.

Superintendent W. W. Gumsier pointed out that at least four additional class rooms will be needed next fall to properly handle the children in the first four grades. It will be necessary to secure a second kindergarten room, and additional class space for third, and first grades.

The district has increased its valuation to a point with the additional districts that have annexed so that no additional taxes would be necessary to provide funds, if the present bond issue was refinanced, financial experts have advised the board. No action is being taken at the present time but investigation of the needs will be conducted and a definite recommendation will be made early next year.

**In His Wondrous Way...**

The year 1954-55 was called the "Pioneer Farmers" of the Iwate Prefecture in north Japan. Veterans and repatriates had been evacuated in a cold, during the first half year of the war, were short. Unseasonable rains and early frost killed the rice crops. Unit food from America began to arrive the people subsisted on weeds and the few sweet potatoes they could find. The Christian group who distributed the clothing and the food discussed with the farmers some specific plans for agricultural projects, to diversify crops. Through the Christian Rural Overseas Program (CROP) they secured seven tons of clover seed. It arrived in Japan for the spring planting. But the young minister, Shohichiro Sasaki, a youthful multiple pleurisy or so he had tuberculosis until he contracted Tuberculosis and went to the hospital—was now fully recovered. He has been well graduated and trained for agriculture and was unanimously approved to serve the pioneer farmers of Iwate.

More and more farmers have qualified for cattle loans as the weather's silver shows faith in them, the mental outlook of the farmers improves. **Experts Reveal How to Silence Squeaky Floors**

Repeat put an end to the "speakeasy," but the squeaky floors "is still. So, if easily squeaking wooden floors are robbing you of snootie-time this winter, there are several remedial cures for your insomnia because squeaky floors can be silenced, says a University of Michigan wood technologist. Prof. Stephen B. Preston, chairman of the Department of Wood Resources, admits that he, too, has fought the battle of squeaky floors. "Wooden floors, even those with good finishes, are constantly picking up and losing moisture in the atmosphere," Nails hold the floor tightly to the joists during the summer because of swelling pressure of the wood against its fastenings, says Preston. "As the wood dries in winter, however, the pressure is released and the floor becomes free to move slightly when it is stepped upon."

Cracks in hardwood flooring also appear in winter because of contraction and add their share of squeaking and squeaking, Preston says. "These problems are especially noticeable in new homes because they are exposed to furnace heat for the first time."

Professor Preston has handled the problem in his own home, and he suggests a "proper caulking" may be made on the underside of the floor. This is done by using a plastic wood preservative. "Proper caulking" means that the underside of the floor is sealed with a plastic wood preservative. The plastic wood preservative is applied to the underside of the floor in a dry place at the building site. The plastic wood preservative should develop however, Preston advises that the floor be re-caulked. There are two ways of doing it:

1. Nail or screw through floor and into the joist from the top and then fill the hole with plastic wood preservative.

In 1954, Michigan celebrates its 50th year of metal automobile license plates. According to James M. Hare, Secretary of State, the law requiring vehicle license plates was passed in 1904. During the first full year, 2,181 imported license plates were registered.

The first standard plates, which were black on white, were manufactured in Jackson Prison in 1910. These first plates were porcelain. Today, Michigan's license plates are still being manufactured by the Michigan State Industries Branch of the Corrections Department.

In 1955, before plates were issued, the motorist received a metal disk which he affixed to the dashboard of his automobile.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to resolutions adopted by said Board, a petition signed by at least twelve electors, requesting that a special meeting and election be called for that purpose;
