Lowell Five Upset Godwin Friday Night

A resurgent Lowell cage team displayed a powerful offensive attack Friday in a come-from-behind upset win over Godwin, 64-55. The Arrows were cool, confident, and poised in the clutch to win their first conference game in 2 years.

The Wolverines, displaying hot shooting, surged to a 16-10 first period lead. A nine point spree by substitute guard Steve Fritz narrowed the margin to 32-10 at the half.

A fired-up Arrow team took the floor in the third period and roared into the lead after four minutes of play; a lead which was never relinquished. Coolness at the foul line by Wissman, playmaking by Ryder and Dilly and tremendous rebounding by Lawrence and DeVries enabled the Arrows to hold the lead.

Although three boys fouled out of the game, the Arrows' great depth paid off with Fritz and Ward coming through in fine style.

The Lowell seconds were downed 58-50. Frank McMahon had 24 points to lead both teams. John Myers followed with nine.

Bob Carlgren, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Carlgren of 3429 Thirtieth St., Grand Rapids, Mich., former resident of Alto, added another impressive triumph to his growing list of cross-country victories when he took first place in the Troy Invitational Cross-Country Run in Troy, Ala. Running easily behind the leaders for the first mile, he took over at the mile and a half mark and remained unchallenged for the rest of the race, finishing over 30 yards ahead of the second man. Bob ran the three-mile course in 15 minutes 57 seconds, just three seconds off the course record. This was surprisingly good time considering the rain and bitter cold wind that hampered the runners. Teams from Mississippi State, University of Alabama, Georgia Tech, Tennessee Tech, Troy State College and Auburn were entered in this race along with unattached runners from the Marine Corps, Air Corps and the 1986 U. S. Olympic Team. Mississippi State won the team trophy. Carlgren is a student at Bryan College, where he is majoring in Physical Education.

George Baker Injured in Monday Morning Crash

George Baker, 20, 219 1/2 West Main, Lowell, was taken to Butterworth hospital Monday morning after he crashed into the rear end of a truck about 2 miles west of Ada on M-21. He required 12 stitches on his face, and suffered wrist injuries the hospital reported.

The accident happened, Baker told Deputy Robert Tanner, when he was late getting to work, passed on a yellow line, and when he pulled in, he was unable to avoid hitting the rear of a truck driven by Roger D. McLean, 39, of Port Huron. The impact threw Baker from the car and his car drove the truck, which was only traveling between 10 and 15 miles per hour, off the road. Deputy Tanner issued a summons to Baker for improper passing.

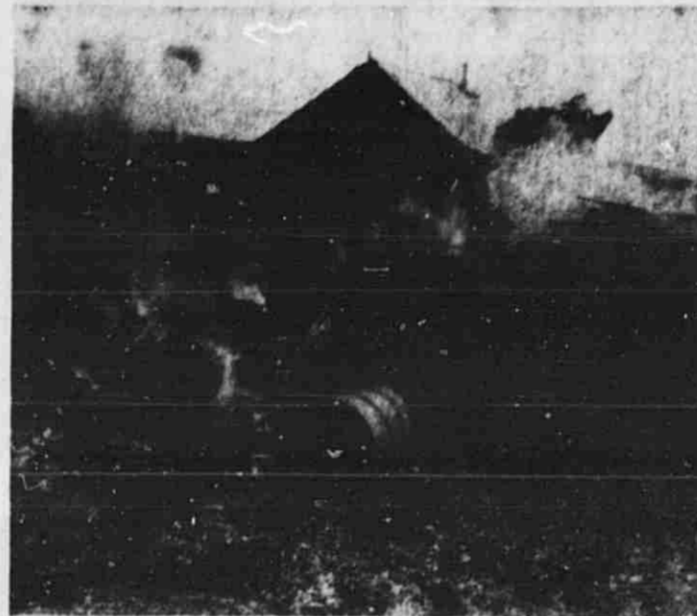

Thomas - Cook Barn Burns Sunday



The barn at the Thomas-Cook farm, two miles north of Lowell on Lincoln Lake Road, burned to the ground Sunday night in a spectacular fire that could be seen for miles around.

The fire destroyed the barn, 27 calves, one fresh cow, quantities of feed, hay and tools. No estimate of the damage could be given by the owners on Monday, but was expected to be in excess of \$50,000.

The fire started, James Cook felt, when a heat lamp which was being used to warm a new-born calf in the basement calf pens, ignited the hay. Mr. Cook had been in the barn only a short time before he was notified by George Baker, a former employee at the farm who was passing and noticed the flames. This was about 11:15 p. m. By the time the Kent County Fire Unit from Lowell arrived, the barn was a mass of flames. The efforts of the firemen were put to saving the milk house, a nearby garage and house. Other County Units arrived from Ada and Grant and tank trucks from Lowell and Vergennes to maintain a spray of water on the close-by buildings which the fire units managed to save.

Saves Some Calves

Mrs. Dora Cook related how she and her husband and others managed to go into the basement calf pens and save three calves before the smoke and flames forced them from the building. The fresh cow was brought right to the door but the smoke and flames scared the cow into balking and refusing to leave the building. The other cattle were out in the feed lot, and not in the barn.

Work to Restore Milking Parlor

The firemen all during the fire had fought to keep the milking parlor and milk house with its thousand gallon bulk milk cooler from being destroyed, along with the barn. As soon as the flames died down enough, a bulldozer was put to work pushing the still burning timbers and barn materials away from that part of the structure. Work went on during the night to clear away the burning feed, etc., from the area of the milking parlor.

The temperature was in the teens but plenty of help was on hand to work to restore the milking facilities which had to be ready to handle over 100 milking cows. Work went on throughout the morning, trucks, loaders and other equipment having been volunteered to help in the clean-up.

Careful examination of the milking parlor and bulk tank revealed that the fire did not damage the pipe line to the parlor or the tank. The milk from the Sunday milking was picked up as usual. A new milker unit was installed, and by noon milking had started on the herd.

Will Rebuild

The owners said Monday they plan to rebuild the milking parlor, calf barn and hay storage as soon as possible. In the meantime, the giant size dairy operation will be carried on in temporary shelter.

we are truly Christian, we shall see the universe to be not an IT, but a THOU. But this is such a real, a throbbing world; a world in which the things of sense and the achievements of men are so real, so everywhere present, that the masses seem to have been made insensible to the presence of God. Sensations of the marvelous things men are doing, are so ceaselessly crowding in upon our mental horizon that the presence of Jehovah is almost lost sight of. How many Christmas shoppers and merchants take thought of the real meaning of the Christ-mass?

"White Christopher" appeared before a company of profane men one day while they were at work. With his arms outstretched, he looked so awe-inspiring, so Cross-like, that the men stopped swearing. This illustrates the value of religion; a pledge to us of the Presence of God that we might have correction for our evil ways.

It seems that the presence in the race of a supreme being is fundamental. The most primitive peoples were animists. Later the divine being is located in sacred places and idols. In the Old Testament God is present in the pillar of cloud, in the burning bush, and in the ark. Gradually, a more moral view began to prevail, and God was seen without the aid of these material associations. Early and late, the prophets are pleading for a recognition of God through a spiritual awakening and ethical reforms. But some were unimaginative and unspiritual and so the prophet's message did not take well. Yet others were expectant and longing, so it remained for the great Jehovah to give a pledge in reality, to both Jew and Gentile, of his redeeming presence. Therefore our text announces the coming of Jesus, the "God with us" man.

One morning the nurse was manifestly selfish and irritated, and it humiliated her to be reproved by the sick little girl who said, "Didn't you know Jesus was born?" Friends of the yuletide, are our hearts warm and tender towards the Babe of Bethlehem? Through your Christmas spirit will your children recall that Jesus was born to save us from a hell of selfishness into which so many are falling. The Founder of our religion came lived, and lives that we might keep near God. Startlingly different in word and life, the Great Teacher finally goes to the Cross to prove to the first century folk that he is Immanuel. And the twentieth century would do well to interpret this Jesus as "God with us."

Our Satellite Tops Russians

The air force's talking satellite has proved that the United States can match—and even excel—Russia in throwing its weight around.

According to our research department, the Atlas has boosted the total weight of American satellites launched to more than 8,900 pounds—more than twice the weight of Russia's three Sputniks put together.

The four-ton Atlas, which blasted off from Cape Canaveral on December 18, is a far cry from America's first satellites, which Soviet Premier Nikita S. Krushchev dubbed "oranges."

The army's Explorer I, which was launched last January, weighed 30.8 pounds. The tiny Vanguard I, which followed in March, weighed a mere 3 1/2 pounds.

The United States now has 8,870 pounds of earth satellites whirling around the globe, including Explorers I and IV and Vanguard I. Explorer I never orbited, and Explorer I burned up after three months.

Russia has only Sputnik III, which tips the scales at a little less than 1 1/2 tons, or 2,925 pounds.

The Atlas is the longest as well as the fattest baby moon of the space age. It is 85 feet long, compared with Sputnik II's 11-3/4 feet.


