



Revenue from timber sales is pumped into the state treasury for subsequent financing of referestation programs; pulpwood receipts totaled \$179,863 last year.



YOU may think that listing your income is the easiest part of preparing a tax return. Actually, according to the Internal Revenue Service, this is where taxpayers make the

Internal Revenue Service, this is where taxpayers make the greatest number of errors.

Not all of the money that may have come to you during 1958 needs to be reported on your tax form. For example, don't report:

(1) "Dividends" received on an insurance policy. They are considered merely a refund of part of the premium you paid.

(2) Social Security benefits, Railroad Retirement Act benefits, or payments received under Workmen's Compensation laws.

(3) Property or cash gifts received from other people, although the giver may have to pay a gift tax. Tips and other compensation for services must be reported, however.

(4) Inheritances and bequests. The estate may be taxed, but not the received the services must be received. The estate may be taxed, but not entitled to exclude this amoun
