

Here are the architects, Robinson, Campau & Crowe's, sketch of the way the front of the proposed addition to the Runciman Elementary School would appear after the building was extended, The school would extend from Monroe through to Washington Street, with a new entrance from Washington, The school district would purchase the Walter Gibson property and remove the house as soon as possible after the bond issue is approved. The former West home on the corner of Washington and Avery is now being

purchased by the District and plans are now to remove this house to enlarge the playground to take care of the additional children to be housed in the new school. At the present time while the playground is not large, special equipment has been purchased to make good use of all the ground available. With the addition of the area now taken up by the West home, the playground would be adequate for some time



Six additional new class rooms are being planned for the \$160,000 addition to be voted on next Tuesday by the citizens of Lowell School District, There will also be an additional kindergarten room and a craft room. With approval of this addition, all the elementary children through the 4th grade can be housed in the Runciman Building. When the school was built three years ago this addition was planned and heating, lighting and plumbing facilities were installed so the addition could be made with a minimum of cost. With the addition of a second kindergarten room these children can go back to full half day sessions with three or four groups. These classes will be small enough so that a teacher can handle them satisfactorily. It is expected that there will be three 1st grades, three 2nd grades, three 3rd gra
