

Post Office Offers Patrons Improved Service

Postmaster George Hale announced that beginning the first of May, Lowell is enjoying Sunday mail service. This is the first time in the history of the community that there is regular mail service on Sunday. Letter mail is now being picked up at drop boxes in Lowell at 4:10 p. m. and dispatched on the Highway Post Office that comes through Lowell going to Grand Rapids.

The schedule for other days is also improved. East bound mail now leaves Lowell by truck at 11:45 a. m. This truck also brings mail from Grand Rapids which formerly arrived by train at 1:35.

In the evening a Highway Post Office comes through town at 7:30 taking all the first class mail into Grand Rapids. This earlier pick-up will facilitate the handling of the mail in the terminal.

Parcel post and other classes of mail leave the village on a second truck which comes through town at 8:30 p. m.

Small Track Squad Has Top Performers

Friday night coach Norm Goshall's Red Arrow track squad, the Valley's smallest at 15, takes on the league's largest team, Reed Waterman's 100-man defending state champion East Grand Rapids. Lack of numbers severely hampers the Arrows, but a few boys come through with great performances. Next Tuesday the Arrows take on the Rockford Tracksters, who are having one of their better years. All Grand Valley meets are held at Wyoming Park with field events beginning at 5:30.

Last Friday, Grandville defeated Lowell in the cinder sport, 66-42. Several outstanding showings were made by Lowell performers. The biggest surprise was rapidly improving Steve DeVries' first place toss of 41 feet in the shot put. More than a foot over his best previous mark, Steve is the first Lowell putter to hit that mark in several years. He also won the pole vault at 10 feet, placed second in the 120-yard high hurdles, and tied for third in the high jump. Chuck Ryder won the 100-yard dash in .11.05, placed second in the 220 second in the pole vault, and third in the broad jump.

The Arrows' medley relay team was victorious in one of the night's most exciting events. Larry Miller, Jim Green, John Myers and Ray Jones composed this team. The 880 relay team was also a winner. Terry Buck took second in the 880 with a 2:14. Jim Green grabbed a third in the shot put and 440. Jim Vandenhout and Brian Hoag picked up thirds in the high hurdles and mile, respectively.

Olivet President To Speak Sunday At the Congregational Church



Dr. Gorton Riethmiller, President of Olivet College will speak Sunday at the Congregational Church. Over one hundred years ago the churches of the Congregational Denomination founded Olivet College as an institution for Christian Higher Education. Olivet is a college of liberal arts and sciences. Today it holds two unique distinctions that set it apart from other institutions of learning in Michigan; it has the highest ratio of teachers to students of any college in Michigan, which of course means that it concentrates on the individual students. Also Olivet has the highest percent of students going on to graduate study after they have received their Bachelor's degree. Olivet is a college dedicated to higher learning and standards without equal in Michigan. The school is co-educational, accepts students from every race and creed, and has students from many different nations of the world.

Mr. Riethmiller became President of Olivet College in July of 1957. Prior to that time he had been affiliated with the Highland Park Public Schools, Highland Park, Michigan, in a number of capacities, serving as Deputy Superintendent at the time of his leaving. Currently Mr. Riethmiller is Chairman of the Governor's Commission on Community Colleges. He is an alumnus of Olivet College, M. A. degree from Wayne State University, and has studied at the University of Chicago and Columbia University.

Mr. Riethmiller will speak at the Sunday morning worship service of the Congregational church. His subject will be "The Church and Higher Education." Stephen Nisbet will conduct the service.

Warner expanded his ministry by becoming a regular contributing editor to several of America's leading farm journals: "The Illinois Farmer," "The Michigan Business Farmer," and "The Southern Planter." Through these columns he has preached sermons to over 250,000 families. The ministry of the Christian Church has been strengthened and enlarged through the work and efforts of Rev. Warner.

Cigarette Smoking By School Pupils; Illegal to Smoke, Give, Sell, or Furnish

Several local citizens have protested the alleged smoking of cigarettes by school pupils and they have asked school authorities about the law pertaining to smoking, as applied to minors. Accordingly, school officials requested the county prosecutor, Joseph A. Renihan, to send a copy of the law now in effect. The law provides that:

(1) It is illegal for any person to give, sell, or to furnish cigarettes in any form to any person under 21 years of age. The penalty for so doing is a \$50 fine or imprisonment in the county jail for not to exceed 30 days, and;

(2) Any person under 21 years of age who shall smoke or use cigarettes in any form on any public highway, street or alley, park or other lands used for public purpose, or in any place of business or amusement, may be arrested by any officer of the law, who may be cognizant of the offense—and it shall be the duty of such officer upon the complaint of any person, to do so. The penalty is \$10 fine or imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 5 days, and

(3) It is illegal for any persons to knowingly harbor any person
