Godfrey Roth, 73 Dies Here Monday

Death came suddenly to Godfrey Roth Monday at his home in Lowell, when he suffered a heart attack. Mr. and Mrs. Roth had returned a few days ago from several weeks' stay in Florida. Services will be held Thursday afternoon at 1 p. m., at the Roth Funeral Home. Conducting will be the Rev. J. Marion DeVinney and Rev. Philip Gioletty. Interment will be in Chapel Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Roth was born in Switzerland, March 11, 1886, and came to this country in 1910. He first farmed in Wisconsin, but came to this community shortly after he married Rose Blaser in 1915. They lived on a farm in Keene Township until 1952 when he retired from active farming and moved to Lowell. He was a member of the former German Methodist Church on Vergennes Rd., and served as a member of the Wilkenson School Board for many years. He has been in failing health for the past year.

All boys must wear a protective helmet furnished by the league when batting and running the bases. If he takes off the helmet when running the bases he will be called out.

This year the boys will be allowed to steal a base after the ball has passed the batter. A back stop will be built to aid the catcher. All coaching on the bases will be done by the boys. Games will start at 6 p. m. and all boys playing should be there not later than 5:45 p. m.

Any game that is rained out will be played the following Sat. afternoon at 3 p. m. In case two games are rained out the first game will be played at 1:30 p. m. and the second at 3 p. m. The first game rained out will be played at 2 p. m.

While in World War II he played with his division band until he was assigned to a combat unit. While in France he received a battle field commission and when discharged from the army held the rank of captain.

In the few years since coming to Lowell he has taken an active part in many community affairs. He has served two years on the village council and is now on his second term as village president. When the Lions Club was organized Jones was its charter president. He has always been ready to accept jobs that are part of being a good citizen and taking over the big job as middle man on the Showboat stage is another fine contribution to the community.

Lowell Boy Expert Steno

A high proficiency MOS of 712.27 was granted to the 327th Airborne Battle Group Education NCO, Pfc. Gerry Potter of Headquarters on his completion of the Stenographers' School at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, on March 31.

Taking shorthand over 120 words per minute, increasing his typing speed to 58 words a minute and maintaining a high score in English and military correspondence enabled Potter to gain this MOS. Normally a graduate of the 16-week school receives an MOS of 712.17.

Potter is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carroll Potter of Lowell, and was a 1956 graduate of Lowell High School. He entered the Army in September of 1957, and completed jump school at Fort Campbell in March 1958.

Hold Area Polio Clinic at Cascade

Dr. W. B. Prothro, City-County health officer, announced today that eight special City-County Polio immunization clinics will be established for children between the ages of three months and twenty years beginning May 18th. The clinics have been established primarily for first and second injections but third shots will be offered also.

The immunization clinic for this area will be held in the Cascade Township Hall on Tuesday, May 19, and on Tuesday, June 16. The clinic will operate from 9 a. m. to 11:30 a. m.

Dr. Prothro said that the decision to hold special clinics was made by the City-County Health Departments, private physicians, the Kent County Chapter of the National Foundation and City and County Public and private schools. All the above mentioned groups, he said, are greatly concerned over the thousands of unprotected children and have combined forces to make available polio immunizations for those children not having a private physician and who have not secured their polio immunizations.

Dr. Prothro said that the Health Departments have a limited supply of polio vaccine on hand and it has been decided that four clinics will be established in the city and four in the county.

The main objective in providing the clinics, Dr. Prothro said, is to make sure that children in the age group "three months through twenty years" have at least two of the three desired immunizations before this year's polio season. Those having had two injections at least seven months ago may secure their third injection.

Regional Track Meet At Lee Saturday

Saturday is the date of the Regional track qualifications for the State meet. The meet, held at Lee field, pits the area's finest performers against each other. Lowell hopes will rest with Steve DeVries in the pole vault, high jump, and high hurdles, Chuck Ryder in the broad jump and 440, Noel Smith, Terry Buck, and Jerry Boone in the half mile, and several other boys in various events. Qualifying heats and field events will be staged in the afternoon, and the finals will be run at night.

Next Monday the Arrows battle the Wyoming tracksters in a battle of the league's wingless teams. Action begins at Wyoming Field at 5:30.

Tuesday night Rockford downed the Arrows 70 to 39. First places for the Arrows were taken by Steve DeVries in the pole vault (10 ft. 8 in.), Chuck Ryder in the broad jump (19 ft. 6 in.), Terry Buck in the 440 (56.5), Steve DeVries had 12 points and Chuck Ryder 11 to lead the Arrow scoring.

Last Friday East Grand Rapids downed the Lowell squad 80 to 29. Steve DeVries took a first in the pole vault and seconds in the high jump and high hurdles. Chuck Ryder won the broad jump and Terry Buck, the mile (5:07).

Former Lowell Resident, Mrs. Rosetta Kallinger, Passes In Weslaco, Texas

Mrs. Rosetta Kallinger, widow of Anton Kallinger, and a former resident of Lowell, passed away Wednesday, May 6, at the home of a daughter in Weslaco, Texas. Death was due to a cerebral hemorrhage, and she was ill only two days.

She was born Rosetta Wittenbach on July 7, 1875, in Schwarsenegg, Switzerland, and came to Lowell with her family in the early nineties. She lived there nearly all of her life except the past ten years when she lived in Jackson, Michigan, and in Texas.

In 1899 she was married to Anton Kallinger and to this union four children were born: Mrs. Richard B. Holmes of Donna, Texas; Mrs. Clisson Caston of Weslaco, Texas; and Imbert A. Kallinger of Jackson, Michigan. A daughter, Anna Caroline, died at the age of two. A stepson, Leo R. Kallinger, resides in Grand Rapids. She is survived by a brother, Rudolph Wittenbach of Lowell, and many nieces and nephews of the well known families of Wittenbach, Roth and Wingerly. There are seven grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren.

For many years she was an active and devout member of the former Swiss Zion Methodist church in Lowell, and a worker in the Swiss Ladies Aid Society. Later she became a charter member of the Lowell Christian Science Society and also a member of the Mother church of the First Church of Christ Scientist, Boston, Mass.

The remains were brought from Texas to the Roth Funeral Home where funeral services were held on Monday, May 11, at 3 p. m., conducted by the Rev. J. Marion DeVinney of the Methodist church, assisted by L. Ronald Kallinger, a grandson of the deceased. The pallbearers were Elmer, Carl Paul, Alfred, Rudolph jr., and Ernest Wittenbach, all nephews of the deceased. Interment was in Oakwood Cemetery.

Highway Department Lets Bids To Widen and Resurface M-21, US-16

The state highway department will let contracts in the next few months to resurface US-16 from M-91 west to Whitneyville Road, a distance of 6.7 miles. Also planned will be 4.2 miles on US-16 from M-37 east to Cascade.

5.1 miles of 24-foot bituminous concrete surfacing on M-21 from the Kent County line east to Saranac Road. Completion date on this job is October 15, 1959.

The program is designed to restore existing pavement in over 120 sections of the state and to protect it for future use. Mackie said, "Some sections involved suffered damage from the spring break-up and other sections have been deteriorating from continued use. 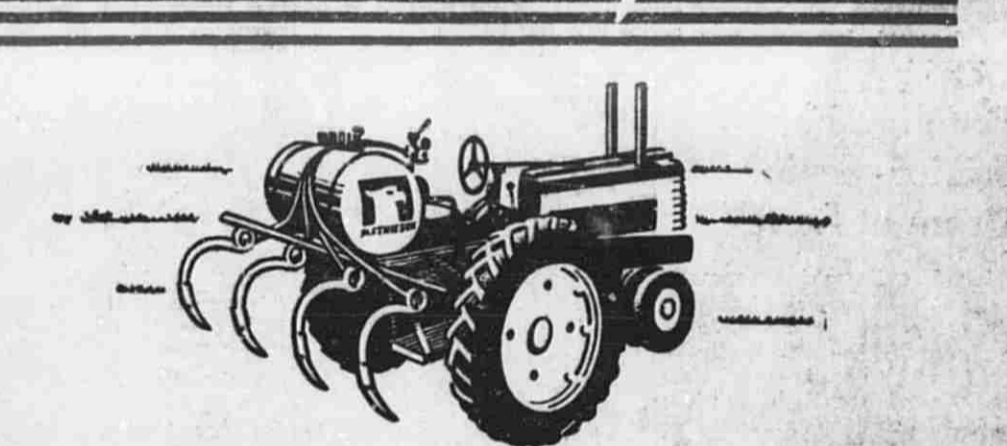

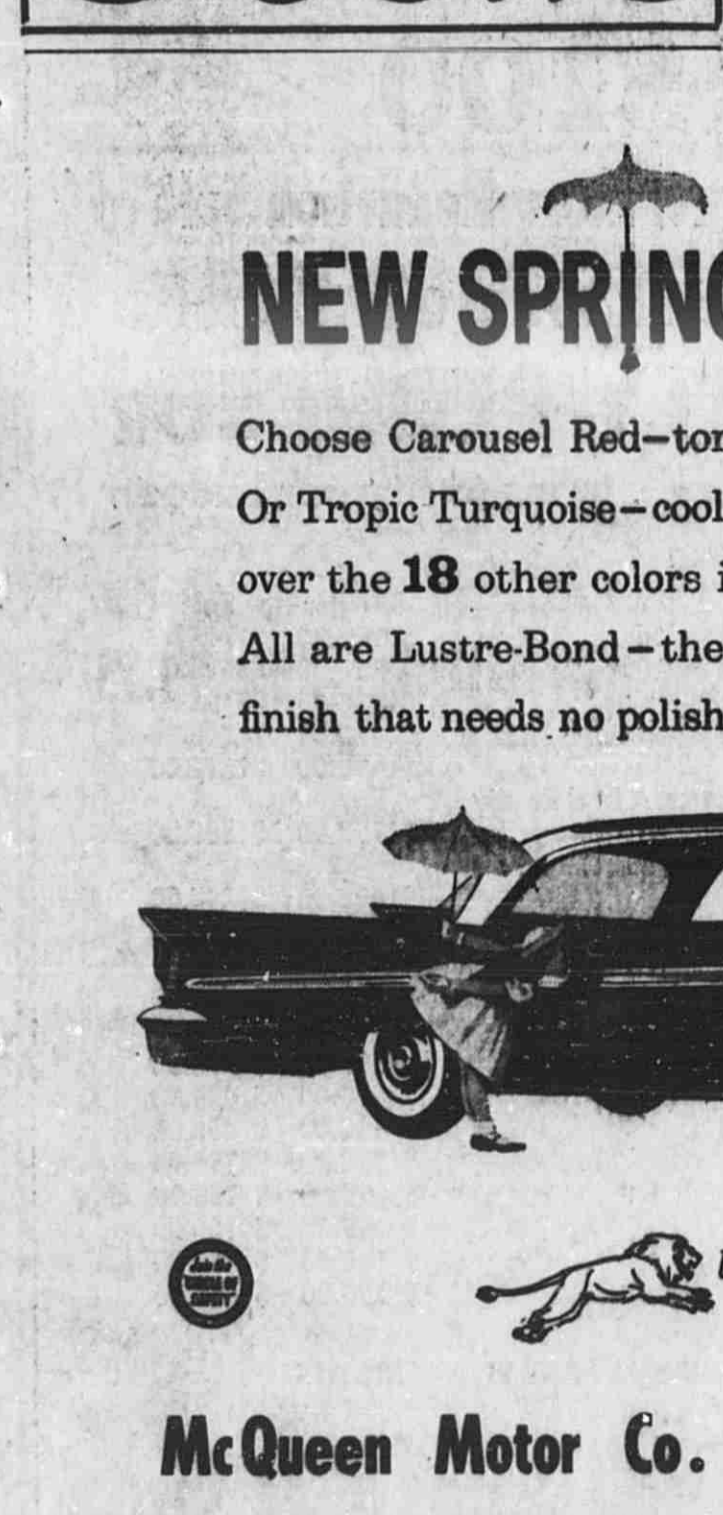


