## School Board Organizes; Sells Bonds to Bank

Lowell School Board organized on Monday evening for the coming year, re-electing Gerald Rollins as president of the board. Rollins was unable to be present at the meeting; he has been a patient at St. Mary's hospital having throat surgery. He is expected home in a few days.

Francis Campau was named vice-president; David Coons, treasurer and Dr. Thomas Hill was re-elected secretary. Edward Rankin, new member of the board was sworn in.

The bid of the State Savings Bank to purchase \$32,000 in tax anticipation bonds from the school board at an interest rate of 3 percent was accepted. The loan was necessary to meet current bills of the school. This money is expected to carry the school until the legislature makes up its mind at Lansing, and the promised state aid money is received.

The next meeting of the school board will be on Monday, August 10. It is hoped that bids for the construction of the addition to the Runciman Elementary building will be ready by the middle of August.

## Barn Burns Monday At Cornelius Bouwens's

A blaze, thought to have started from a short in a milking machine, destroyed a barn, silo, and six head of cattle owned by Cornelius Bouwens, of Nash Ave., Alto, Monday morning.

The fire was discovered in the milking section of the barn around 8:20 in the morning. Besides the barn and cattle, all of the milking equipment was destroyed. Bouwens was able to get all his milking cows out of the blazing inferno, but he was not able to save six head who were chained inside the barn.

Fire departments from both Alto and Caledonia answered the call, which was reported by fire officials as one of the hottest fires they have fought this year. The reason for the terrific heat was that 3,000 bails of hay and 2,000 bushels of oats were being stored in the barn.

Some fire fighters were treated for minor burns, but no one was seriously injured in the fire. Estimates of the damages have not been made yet.

Louis Baker, 1062 Beach St., local plumbing and heating contractor was seriously injured Sunday afternoon some 25 miles west of Cadillac between Dublin and Irons while riding a motor scooter. The accident happened when Baker lost control of the scooter and was thrown over the handle bars, falling on his left side.

He was taken to Cadillac hospital Sunday suffering from severe lacerations of the knee, back and head along with broken ribs, collar bone and socket bone in his left shoulder.

Monday he was removed to Blodgett hospital in Grand Rapids where his condition is good although still in lots of pain. He is expected to be at the hospital for some time and laid up for several weeks. The Bakers were visiting at the Chauncey Boyce cabin near Irons when the accident occurred.

## Sprinkling Ban Continued Here

Low ground water table in spite of the rain last week has made it necessary to continue the sprinkling ban in Lowell until further notice, Roger Westbroek, Lowell Utility Superintendent, announced Wednesday. Sprinkling will be permitted on an alternate day basis with the east side on even days and the west side on odd days.

Westbroek revealed that wonderful cooperation has been received from local citizens and the alternate days have allowed the water utility to maintain a reserve of water needed in case of a fire. The continued cooperation, he said, would be appreciated.

## Jail and Fines For Drivers in Court Here

William Valney Miller, 19, of Lowell was arraigned in Justice Rittgers court here after being arrested by Sheriff's Department on a reckless driving and driving with a suspended license.

He was fined \$100 on each offense or 30 days in jail along with a mandatory 5 days for driving with a suspended license.

He was arrested July 19 by Deputy Hill after being spotted by the officer as the turned around and ran away from the officers at speeds up to 90 miles an hour.

Lehman married Lena Reusser of Ionia in 1939, moving to their present home in 1940. Lehman was also an active member of St. Mary's Catholic church during his life.

## RIDER'S CLUB TO STAGE HORSE SHOW, JULY 25


Walker Rider's Club will stage a horse show at the arena on Kinney Road West of Grand Rapids on Saturday, July 25. The event will start at 12:30.

## M-91 Bridge Repairs Completed Last Friday

The M-91 bridge, that crosses the Grand River just south of Lowell, was closed for repairs last Friday. According to state highway officials a truck driver reported that the old structure sagged as he drove his truck over it Thursday night.

The highway department sent a crew out Friday morning to repair a hair pin that connects one of the floor beams to the stresses. The floor beams are the main support of the bridge; and a highway official said that every time a hair pin breaks, the old one is fixed plus the addition of a new one for safety.

The cause of the damage was not known, except for the fact that a lot of heavy trucks use the bridge which is over 50 years old.

## Letter Carriers Attend State Convention Recently

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Radford of Lowell were some of the delegates from Kent County to the Rural Letter Carriers Association State Convention, held at Escanaba, Michigan, last week. They heard many interesting talks from their National Officers from Washington, D. C., Post Office Inspectors and some of those in charge at the Chicago, Ill., Office. Here are only a few of the interesting facts which were received, and might be of interest to the Lowell Ledger reader.

The Rural Mail Service was started in 1896, the Association was organized in 1903 and the Ladies Auxiliary to the R. L. C. A. was organized in 1924. Mrs. Newton Coons of Lowell was the first State Auxiliary President. Mrs. Coons died several years ago and Mr. Coons is now making his home in Grand Rapids. There is a Junior organization making it possible for the families to meet together at the State and National Conventions. The National Rural Letter Carriers Association are the largest independent National Postal Employees group and the Auxiliary is second largest Auxiliary in the USA.

The Rural Mail Service is a Post Office on Wheels. If a Rural Mail carrier would multiply his day by all the rural carriers, together they would travel daily the equivalent of 60 times around the world and only work out half of the Post Offices of the Nation and serve one-fifth of America. Some of the larger cities do not have rural mail service, but have mounted routes.

The Rural Letter Carriers Association and the Ladies Auxiliary gave \$2 million dollars to the Heart Association this year. They have helped with many other projects during the past years.

The Robert E. Lee sweeps around Cattail Bend preparing to dock before Monday night's record crowd of 6,000 excited spectators. Aboard the majestic floating castle are such top professional stars as Bob Crosby, Carol Richards, Johnny Matson, Tanya and Blagi, the Berosinis and the Miriam Sage Dancers. Also aboard are those six intellectual endmen who spend most of their time in concentrated nonsense, not to mention their fine display of talent. Over 20 acts appear in this year's Lowell Showboat, which will run through Saturday, making it the biggest and best Showboat ever to come down the Flat River.

Cries of "Here comes the Showboat!" echoed throughout the crowd of 6,000 excited opening night spectators, as the Robert E. Lee, sketched in glimmering pinpoints from the lights along its decks, swept around Cattail Bend Monday evening with her smokestacks belching, and the 200 aboard singing and waving.

As the deck ramps were lowered the orchestra, continued into "Are You From Dixie" as the Showboat chorus, special guests and endmen, all singing, left the beautiful craft and paraded on to the stage before the largest opening night crowd that has ever attended the Lowell Showboat.

This year, even before the Showboat docked for the 121st time since its maiden voyage in 1932, the audience was introduced to the special guests by ship-to-shore radio.

## 4-Hers Honored

In honor of 4-H Family Night, special guests were: Ralph Kirch, Kent County 4-H Agent; Thomas Slater, 1st president of Kent County 4-H Fair; E. W. Reuths, former president, and Bert Nokes, 1959 president of the Fair. Also riding aboard the Showboat was WOOD-TV's Buck Barry. A group from Camp O'Malley, and Mary Free Bed patients were also guests for the performance, as were Rotary Club members, News boys, and members of the Michigan Press Association.

Opening with "Are You From Dixie" by the entire Showboat Company, the program rolled into its grand finale nearly three hours later with the aid of Endmen Forrest Buck, Phil Kropp, Steve Nisbet, Dr. Roy Westcott, Bernard Kropp, and Dr. Robert Reagan, who exchanged jokes with Interlocutor Bill Jones, sang and cake-walked in the time-honored minstrel manner.

The six endmen, in burnt cork and grease paint, attired in suits of purple and yellow, make a colorful sight, and their lively antics kept their interlocutor busy most of the time keeping them in line. The endmen's opening number, "Bye Bye Blues," played on bottles, was a definite applause-getter.

Crosby Headlines Show  
Headlining the Showboat bill was Bob Crosby, who demonstrated the real art of showmanship. Crosby

showed his versatility by not only singing his well-known style of music, but by also joining in with the endmen with the joke telling. Featured with Crosby on the bill, was his singing star, Carol Richards, who showed her popular singing style with her famous rendition of "My Heart Belongs To Daddy."

Johnny Matson, always a top laugh-getter, had the crowd howling through his entire comical accordion-trumpet playing routine (at one point with two cigars in his mouth). Brought back for an encore, Johnny stepped off the stage with one of the loudest ovations given during the show.

Getting more than their share of the laughs were Tanya and Blagi, a comedy ballroom dance act, who had the audience splitting their seams with laughter as they split their seams on the stage.

The Berosinis, a center-ring attraction with the Ringling Bros. Circus, left the crowd gasping as they proved that they were one of the top acrobatic-gymnastic acts in the country. Also on the Showboat list of top entertainers were the Miriam Sage Dancers, who added a festive air to the whole show.

Amateurs Get Encore  
The Coachmen, a local teenage trio, provided the amateur entertainment on Monday night's show. After singing their version of "The M. T. A." these three Lowell boys received a hearty applause from the crowd which brought them back for an encore.

Thursday night the amateur act will be the Crystalaires, of Crystal, who will harmonize together, Friday evening, Sally Parks of Grand Rapids, will present her comical pantomime of the Coaster's new recording "Along Came Jones."

The Two Smoothies, Patricia and Larry Trask of Sunfield, will feature the amateur talent on the closing night, Saturday, with their entertaining song and tap dance routine.

"This is wonderful... ought to be more like it," said Bob Crosby at Monday afternoon's Showboat rehearsal. Crosby, a real showman, got right in and offered advice to the chorus and some of the endmen routines.

Unit 8's camera crew was on hand at Monday's rehearsal to film the Showboat chorus rehearsal. Al Ackerman, narrator, was supposed to interview Bob Crosby; but due to union rules, Crosby could not appear. Interlocutor, Bill Jones, filled in and talked about how rehearsals were conducted.

Many people who are not in favor of automation would have said, "I told you so" as the pump which supplies the water to soak the ski jump, broke down during the water show Monday night. Dave Clark stage manager, was called off the Showboat to come down and fix the pump. The Charles Sligh group still performed their jump routine despite the breakdown.

This year automation has put at least three boys out of work on the Showboat. In the previous years, two boys were needed to soak the ski jump and one to turn the paddle wheel. Now an electric pump has taken over the soaking operation, and a gear reduction process uses power from the outboard motors to turn the paddle wheel. Also the use of bigger motors, has cut down the number of operators needed to run the Showboat outboards.

The blushing young man who received a kiss from Tanya, of the Tanya and Blagi comedy ballroom act Monday night, was none other than Showboat president, Theron Richmond. Mr. Richmond was the

first in line Tuesday morning to buy tickets for the same seat for the rest of Showboat week.

One outstanding visitor at Monday night's show was Theron Richmond's 90-year-old mother, who flew all the way from California to see this year's Showboat performance.

Seated in his old Interlocutor's chair was C. H. Runciman, who was Mr. Interlocutor for 104 performances without missing a show. Despite his illness, Runciman was able to attend this year's show, an event he has never missed.

Park benches have been set up on the South side of Main Street for those who would like to see the Robert E. Lee as she comes around the bend, and at least here the Showboat.

Mrs. Maxine Mulicke, of 311 Myrtle, Greenville, suffered a minor heart attack in the Showboat bleachers Monday night. Mrs. Mulicke, who was unconscious, was taken by Legion Ushers to the first aid building where she was given oxygen and a nitroglycerin tablet. Dr. Lyard, who was attending the performance, was immediately at the scene.

Saturday night after the final Showboat performance, an open dance will be held at the American Legion Building, 800 East Main, featuring Lee Lockwood and orchestra. Admission will be seventy-five cents.

Rumors back stage have been heard that a tall man in a white suit and boating hat may get relief from Saturday night's hot show by being politely ushered into the Flat River after the show.

Do You Smell Smoke? Plan for Emergencies

Your youngsters know what to do in case of fire at school. They have frequent fire drills. But do you and they know what to do if fire should break out in your home?

Fire that begins downstairs quickly shoot hot gases and smoke to the top floor. Even if there are no flames upstairs when you discover a fire, it may be too late for escape by the main stairway.

According to Eleanor Denmore, County Extension Agent in Home Economics, many families today are preparing for just such an emergency by having family fire drills so that each member of the family will know how to escape from his or her room without going into the main hall or without using the stairway. When the plan has been decided on, a few dry runs will keep it fixed in the minds of all.

First rule in any fire is, of course, to get everyone out of the house and keep them out. Then, call the fire department. Don't take time to gather up belongings. Close the doors when you go to leave a room—this holds back fire and fumes and protects your exit.

If you smell smoke, don't rush into the hall. First, test the door at the top with your hand to see if it is too hot to touch. If you can't feel the heat, open the door a crack. If you can't see the stairway, Escape by window may be necessary.

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Shy Sandhill Crane

Sandhill cranes, formerly found throughout Michigan in plentiful numbers, have been drastically reduced by man's excessive hunting and drainage on their nesting grounds. A few cranes still nest in isolated marshes of southern Michigan. Swampy areas of the upper peninsula provide a greater degree of privacy and are, therefore, preferred nesting sites of these shy birds. Remaining wetlands must be preserved and restored to safeguard against the threatening disappearance of this migratory wild bird in Michigan.

There is serious danger in some of the delicious food of summer-time unless care is exercised in preparing, storing and serving certain dishes during warm weather. Lack of cleanliness or failure to take normal precautions in preparing food from the body of the person preparing the meal is important. This is one of the causes for such organisms getting into food.

Proper cooking is important. If food is to be in the refrigerator, it should be chilled immediately after cooking and then refrigerated until used. Constant refrigeration is important with custard-filled baked goods, sausage or ham during warm weather.




