### Sheriff's Car Damaged in Chase In Alto Vicinity

Kenneth A. Moore, 20, of 113 Main St., Freeport, was able to outrun a sheriff's cruiser, but due to an unknown person who got his license number, was later identified and arrested on charges of reckless driving.

Besides paying \$104 in fines, Moore will also have to pay for the damages to the police car involved in the chase and possible personal injuries to Deputy Dale Benjamin.

Early last Saturday, the Sheriff's department received a complaint from a woman in Alto that the speed zones were not being observed.

Deputy Benjamin was sent out to investigate the complaint; and while talking to the complainant, Moore's car sped by. Sheriff officials also reported that the car went by, beer bottles were tossed out of the window.

Benjamin immediately began to chase the car, but somewhere near 76th St. and Hastings Rd., his car hit a rise in a bridge and left the ground. Damages to the car included a sprung frame, Benjamin also reported a back injury.

Some hours later Saturday, Moore was arrested and brought in. He signed a full statement and was fined in Municipal Court on Monday.

### New Automatic Pinsetters Featured at Legion Lanes

### Highway Death Rate Climbs to New High

Michigan's unrivaled good safety traffic record of the last three years has plunged into a sharp reverse spin with July going into the records as the fourth consecutive month with an increase in deaths.

More cars and more travel sparked by the economic recovery are given as the reason.

On the basis of provisional figures compiled by the State Police, July fatalities totaled 126 compared with 119 in the same month a year ago, an increase of 7, or 6 percent. Delayed death reports will raise the total.

Despite decreases in January, February and March, the increase for the seven months period since January 1 now averages out at 6 percent, or a total of 732 deaths as against 690 for the same period in 1958, a gain of 42.

### Ellis E. Faulkner, 81 Former Lowell Man Passes

Services were held Wednesday for Ellis E. Faulkner, 81 of Delton who died Sunday, August 2. He was born in Lowell and worked in the Winegar Drug Store here before opening a store of his own in Middleville and later in Delton.

Mr. Faulkner served on the board of pharmacy in 1916 and, after serving in World War I, became a Probate judge in Barry county, holding that position several years. In 1934 he was elected for the first time to the house of representatives and was re-elected to serve 10 more years.

Surviving are his wife, Anna Grace; three sons, Paul of Middleville, Arnold of Berrien Springs, and Robert of Coloma; and two sisters, Miss Bessie Faulkner of Delton and Mrs. Charles Kopt of Hastings.
