

Retirement of Gumser in 1960 Makes Administrative Changes Necessary

W. W. Gumser, Superintendent of the Lowell schools, has been planning on retiring from his profession at the close of the school year 1959-60, when his contract expires. The termination of his services will mark the close of thirty-four years as superintendent in Lowell. Before coming to Lowell, Mr. Gumser served as superintendent at Clare and Reed City and before that he had been teacher and coach at Fenville, Gladstone, and Mt. Clemens.

The Board of Education has long realized that the administrative costs have been low in Lowell. The Board has also known that there has been a need for a better program of administration due largely to the increased enrollment in the number of pupils. Accordingly the

Board has made several appointments. Mr. Gumser will continue to be the administrative head for the ensuing year, but he will be assisted by Mr. Nisbet, whose title will be Principal and Assistant Superintendent, which means that he will assume more administrative duties. Mr. Nisbet came to Lowell from Alma college in 1947. Mr. Nisbet will be relieved of some of his duties as principal by the appointment of Carl Hagen as Assistant High School Principal. Mr. Hagen will still teach agriculture, but will spend about half of his time in the principal's office. Mr. Hagen came to Lowell in the spring of 1947 and is well known in the village and rural circles.

Other Assignments

Mrs. Arlene Claus has been acting principal of the junior high school but at her request wishes to relinquish those responsibilities and Vern Morse will be acting principal for the year 1959-60. There have been and will be marked increases in membership in the grades 7 and 8 and it was deemed necessary to have a principal for those grades.

Mrs. Hester White has been acting principal of the Runciman building and Dirk Venema has been acting principal of the intermediate building. Both have been doing splendid work in their respective duties as acting principals. Mrs. White will continue to act as principal, but at her request will be relieved of those duties when the addition to the Runciman building has been completed. Mr. Venema will assume the duties as principal of both the Runciman and Intermediate buildings—kindergarten through sixth grade inclusive—before the close of the ensuing school year.

Church Trip Ford Suggests For Khrushchev

Khrushchev should see "Americans at worship," Rep. Gerald R. Ford said today in urging that the Russian leader attend some of our church services during his visit to this country.

Ford wrote Deputy Assistant Secretary of State Poy D. Kohler, who is acting as Coordinator for the Khrushchev visit, to recommend that he do everything possible to include in the Soviet Premier's schedule of activities attendance at one or more places of worship.

"I do not think that Mr. Khrushchev can fully understand us nor evaluate the basic forces in American life unless he sees some expression of our religious faith," Ford wrote. "I trust that our faith will be demonstrated in everything we do for him during his visit. But specifically I hope Mr. Khrushchev will have an opportunity to attend some of our church services."

"What would be more appropriate than to have our distinguished guest accompany Mr. Eisenhower to the President's accustomed place of worship in Washington or at Gettysburg," Ford continued. "If this is not feasible let him attend one or more of the services of any church or denomination. The important thing is that he sees Americans at worship."

Ford said he was encouraged to write the Coordinator by an editorial in the Grand Haven Tribune and by a letter from a Grand Rapids constituent.

Son of Local Man Named A. F. General



"My job... to run an air base in defense of our country... is just like one of yours," said Brig. General Thomas R. Ford as he spoke before last Wednesday's Rotary club.

Brig. General Ford, the son of T. W. Ford and the late Mrs. Ford, of East M-21 in Lowell, spent a few days visiting his father last week before returning to South Carolina where he is Division Commander at Shaw Air Force base.

Ford was born at his father's home at a small cross-roads called Edgettes in Lake County back in 1915. When he was very young, the Ford's moved to Shelby where Brig. General Ford spent most of his youth. After graduating from high school in Shelby, Ford attended Michigan State College.

In 1938, he graduated from MSC with a degree in Business Administration. Shortly after his graduation, he joined the United States Army Air Corp., and was sent as a cadet to Officers Training School in San Antonio, Texas, where he was commissioned a 2nd Lieut. in the Air Corp. and received his wings.

Brig. General Ford's first command was in Panama. He was stationed on a small island just off the coast of Venezuela where his assignment was to be in charge of guarding the oil refineries located on the island.

While at this post, the 2nd World War broke out in Europe. Ford, who was in the 9th Air Force Reconnaissance Corp., was sent to England. He was one of the first men to take off from England and fly over enemy territory in France. Ford was active in Europe throughout World War II.

One of the highlights in his 21 years in the Air Force was when he was sent around the world to check United States Air Force bases. Today, Brig. General Ford is in charge of an air base that is on a 24-hour alert ready for retaliation and standing as a deterrent to any foreign aggressor.

Besides making the Air Force a career, Brig. General Ford is also a family man. Ford met his wife, the former Marilyn Gunnell, while attending MSC. The Ford's now have three children; a son, Thomas R., Jr., and daughters, Jackie Kay and Barbara Ann.

Last May, Ford received one of the highest honors in the Air Force when the President of the United States selected him for promotion to the rank of Brig. General in the United States Air Force. His promotion was ratified by the Senate in June. Ford is now one of the youngest men to fill this rank in the service today, especially during peacetime.

The Women's League met on Monday evening to set up their leagues, establish their handicap and plan for the coming season.

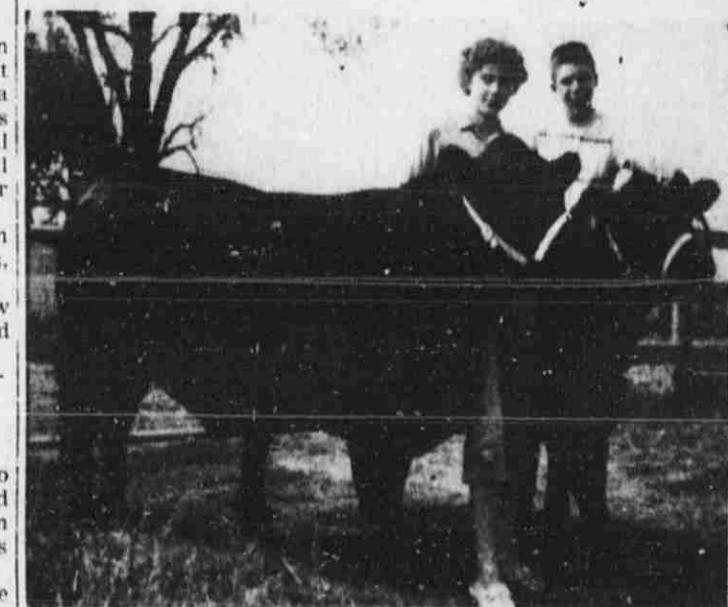

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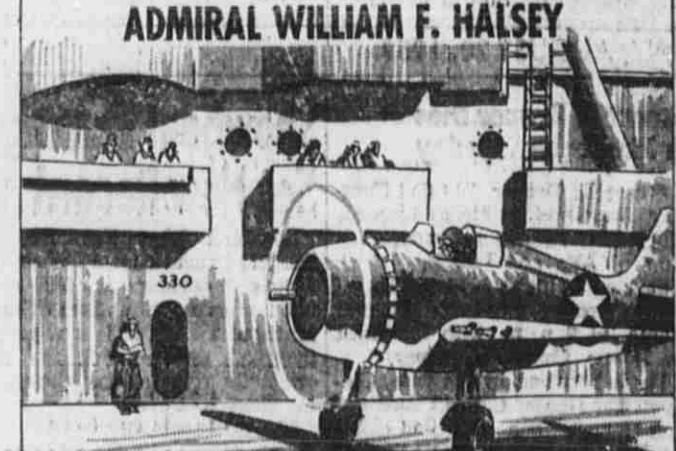

Lowell Council Proceedings

Regular session, Monday evening August 3, 1959.
