Conservation Department game men feel the new stamp requirement will improve management of these big game animals and curtail a waste of bears which has increased in recent years because of indiscriminate killing. A metal seal will be issued with each stamp, similar to the one used for deer. Bears may still be hunted during deer seasons on a deer license. No stamp or seal will be required. Bear stamps and seals are available through mail or personal application at the Department's Lansing office. They may also be obtained at all Department district headquarters and the Highway Department's information office at Mackinaw City.
