More Research On Dutch Elm

More intensive research in the control of Dutch Elm disease was urged by Rep. Gerald R. Ford, Jr., in a recent letter to Secretary of Agriculture Benson.

Ford told the Secretary that the Kent County Road Commission alone had removed 4,560 diseased trees in 1958 and that many more trees are being removed this year.

"I am seriously disturbed by the fact," Ford wrote, "that thousands of elm trees in Michigan are threatened with destruction by Dutch elm disease." The Congressman went on to urge that "a maximum research program in the control of this disease be undertaken

by both the Forest Service and the Agricultural Research Service. These agencies are presently engaged in experimentation to control the insect carriers of the disease and to develop a chemical means of eliminating the fungus

and thus curing an infected tree. Ford said that the \$92,000 budgeted or Dutch elm disease reledged that "much more research is needed," and as a member of the House Committee on Appropriations, Ford agreed to support vigorously a substantial increase in next year's budget.



It is obvious that water is a rest less resource; always moving from its origin on the surface of the land to its destination, the atmosphere or the ocean. Even underground, fresh water are moving, although their pace is generally slower. The upland areas in Michigan are above the level of the Great Lakes, Ground water that collects in this mass of up land, builds up until the water table is higher than the Great Lakes, then it begins to flow, In most cases, it moves steadily along the underground until it intersects a river valley where it becomes river or surface water. Thus, the relationship between ground water and surface water is close and direct and cannot be
