

Farm Census

Miss Hamilton, former editor of the Cedar Springs paper, will direct a force of census takers who will canvass all farms in the eastern 15 townships of Kent County. Mr. Baker will direct a force who ed to typical Michigan scores. In LHS Home Ec. Girls vill canvass the 14 townships in the western portion. Before assuming their posts, they will go to Ionia where they will receive five days of training by a member of the Census Bureau's staff. Topics to be covered include procedures for recruiting of census takers, census taker training, canvassing methods, preparation and submission of reports, and the supervision of census takers to insure a complete and accurate count.

The crew leader is one of the key people in the field operations of the Census of Agriculture. It is his responsibility to recruit and train the census takers and super vise their work; plan and allocate work assignments: review the work of the census takers and take remedial action where necessary, and to conduct difficult interviews.




