## Vote on Gas Franchise Nov. 12

At a special meeting of the Village Council on Tuesday noon, approval was given for a vote on Thursday, November 12, to give the Consumers Power Co. a franchise to supply natural gas in the Village of Lowell for 30 years. Robert Lawlor, Asst. to the District Manager, was present with Robert Davis, Ionia Asst. Manager, and stated that gas would be available in the community in early spring, if the franchise is approved by a three-fifths vote of the electors on November 12. The company is eager to start construction this fall if the pipe can be secured.

Lowell Township will vote on a franchise on Thursday, October 29; vote has also been called in Boston Township and the Village of Saranac for October. This means if approval is secured the entire distance from Ionia to Lowell will be ready for construction in early November.

**Present Letter of Intent**  
To satisfy the demand to be consulted on construction in the village the Consumers Power Company presented a letter to the village guaranteeing their intent to consult and present plans of construction to the local utility head before beginning any construction.

**Approve Sewer Bid**  
The bid of Maurice Vermeersch of Lansing to construct three blocks of 15 inch sewer on Washington Street from Avery to North for a total price of \$10,405.65 was approved by the council at their special meeting. The project is scheduled for completion by January 1.

A powerful 33-12 entry into Grand Valley competition last week at the expense of Wyoming Park shot the Arrows into the league lead, but the Arrows' top spot will receive a severe challenge this Friday at East Memorial Field from the East Grand Rapids gridgers who battled Godwin Heights to a 0-0 tie in their last outing. The Arrows have displayed a lot of gridiron strength thus far, and appear to be living up to their early season darkhorse tag, but the Lowell boys must continue to win in order to keep their title aspirations alive. A strong Lowell following at away games would certainly stimulate a team effort. Game time Friday, October 2, is 7:30. Relying on a crushing ground attack for the entire contest the Arrows wasted little time in serving notice to the visiting Vikings last Friday. On the first play of the game sophomore speedster Don Dilly sprinted 60 yards around his own left end to pay dirt. George Moore added the point, and the home team enjoyed a 7-0 bulge after only 22 seconds had elapsed. Two plays after the Arrows regained the ball, fullback Steve Fritz showed his heels to the Vikings on a 40-yard scoring jaunt. Jerry Boone tallied the point and the Arrows were away and winning. Scores by Moore (1 yard) and Boone (6 yards) and an extra point by Moore sent the Red Arrows scampering off to a 27-0 half-time lead. A key play in the second period was a blocked punt by end Fred Wissman deep in Wyoming territory. ## Lowell Students Take National Merit Tests

Last Spring the Lowell High school 9th and 10th grades took the increasingly popular National Merit Test which attempts to measure achievement. The areas of achievement are closely correlated to the basic subjects found in the first two years of college. While the test is one of the best of its kind, it should be interpreted only with other information about the student such as grades, mental ability, work habits, personality, etc. The purpose of the test is to give the students practice in taking tests which are used for college entrance, and to acquaint them with any weakness they may have in a specific area which will later be important in college.

## Local Petition Requirements Set

Do you know how many signatures are needed to nominate candidates for State Senator or Representative in your District? Secretary of State James M. Hare has issued a statistical table showing the minimum number of petitions required to nominate candidates of Republican and Democratic parties for offices of U. S. Senator, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Representative in Congress, State Senator and Representative in the State Legislature.

Have reminded incumbents and hopefuls that the last day for filing petitions for the general primary election to be held on August 2, 1960 is June 14, 1960 at 4 p. m. Eastern Standard Time. The number of signatures needed is fixed by law and is based on the number of votes received by the candidates for Secretary of State in the last election for that office. "For example," Hare pointed out, "Democrats planning to run for Governor must have petitions carrying 3,036 more signatures than the Republican hopefuls, inasmuch as the Democrats polled 30 percent more votes for Secretary of State than did the Republicans in the 1958 State election."

For this reason, Democrats must have petitions carrying 12,708 valid signatures or Republicans must have 9,672 for the offices of United States Senator, Governor, and Lieutenant Governor. They must be signed by at least 100 residents who are registered voters in each of at least 20 counties of the State, and no more than 25 percent of the minimum required number of signatures may be by resident voters on any one county. In some districts, where the Republican candidate for Secretary of State received more votes than did the Democratic candidate, Republicans running for State Senator or State Representative must get more signatures than those seeking nomination on the Democratic ticket. In the 17th District of Michigan, Republicans circulating petitions for State Senator must get 345 signatures while Democrats must have 291 valid names on petitions to qualify as candidates in the primary election. Republican nominees for State Representative in Kent 2nd will need 142 signatures to qualify while their Democratic opposites will need 114 to earn a place on the primary ticket. In the Kent 3rd Republicans need 165 and Democrats 96. Copies of a leaflet carrying a brief summary of election laws pertaining to the preparing, circulating, and filing petitions are available to any citizen or group who wishes to write to James M. Hare, Secretary of State, Lansing, Michigan. Also available are copies of the table showing the number of signatures needed for all offices to be contested in the Spring election where petitions are required.

Former Cedar Springs Editor to Direct Farm Census

Appointment of Grace E. Hamilton of Cedar Springs, Michigan and Walter J. Baker of Grand Rapids, Michigan, as crew leaders for the 1959 Census of Agriculture was announced today by Field Director John E. Tharaldson of the Census Bureau's regional office at Detroit. Miss Hamilton, former editor of the Cedar Springs paper, will direct a force of census takers who will canvass all farms in the eastern 15 townships of Kent County. Mr. Baker will direct a force who will canvass the 14 townships in the western portion. Before assuming their posts, they will go to Ionia where they will receive five days of training by a member of the Census Bureau's staff. Topics to be covered include procedures for recruiting of census takers, census taker training, canvassing methods, preparation and submission of reports, and the supervision of census takers to insure a complete and accurate count.

The crew leader is one of the key people in the field operations of the Census of Agriculture. It is his responsibility to recruit and train the census takers and supervise their work; plan and allocate work assignments; review the work of the census takers and take remedial action where necessary, and to conduct difficult interviews. After completing their training, Miss Hamilton and Mr. Baker will return to their districts where they will spend several weeks recruiting census takers, and training them in preparation for the start of the field canvass on October 28.

Local Petition Requirements Set

Do you know how many signatures are needed to nominate candidates for State Senator or Representative in your District?

Secretary of State James M. Hare has issued a statistical table showing the minimum number of petitions required to nominate candidates of Republican and Democratic parties for offices of U. S. Senator, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Representative in Congress, State Senator and Representative in the State Legislature. Hare reminded incumbents and hopefuls that the last day for filing petitions for the general primary election to be held on August 2, 1960 is June 14, 1960 at 4 p. m. Eastern Standard Time.

The number of signatures needed is fixed by law and is based on the number of votes received by the candidates for Secretary of State in the last election for that office. "For example," Hare pointed out, "Democrats planning to run for Governor must have petitions carrying 3,636 more signatures than the Republican hopefuls, inasmuch as the Democrats polled 30 percent more votes for Secretary of State than did the Republicans in the 1958 State election."

For this reason, Democrats must have petitions carrying 12,708 valid signatures or Republicans must have 9,672 for the offices of United States Senator, Governor, and Lieutenant Governor. They must be designed by at least 100 residents who

are registered voters in each of at least 20 counties of the State, and no more than 25 percent of the minimum required number of signatures may be by resident voters on any one county.

In some districts, where the Republican candidate for Secretary of State received more votes than did the Democratic candidate, Republicans running for State Senator or State Representative must get more signatures than those seeking nomination on the Democratic ticket.

In the 17th District of Michigan, Republicans circulating petitions for State Senator must get 345 signatures while Democrats must have 291 valid names on petitions to qualify as candidates in the primary election.

Republican nominees for State Representative in Kent 2nd will need 142 signatures to qualify while their Democratic opposites will need 114 to earn a place on the primary ticket. In the Kent 3rd Republicans need 165 and Democrats 96.

Copies of a leaflet carrying a brief summary of election laws pertaining to the preparing, circulating, and filing petitions are available to any citizen or group who wishes to write to James M. Hare, Secretary of State, Lansing, Michigan. Also available are copies of the table showing the number of signatures needed for all offices to be contested in the Spring election where petitions are required.

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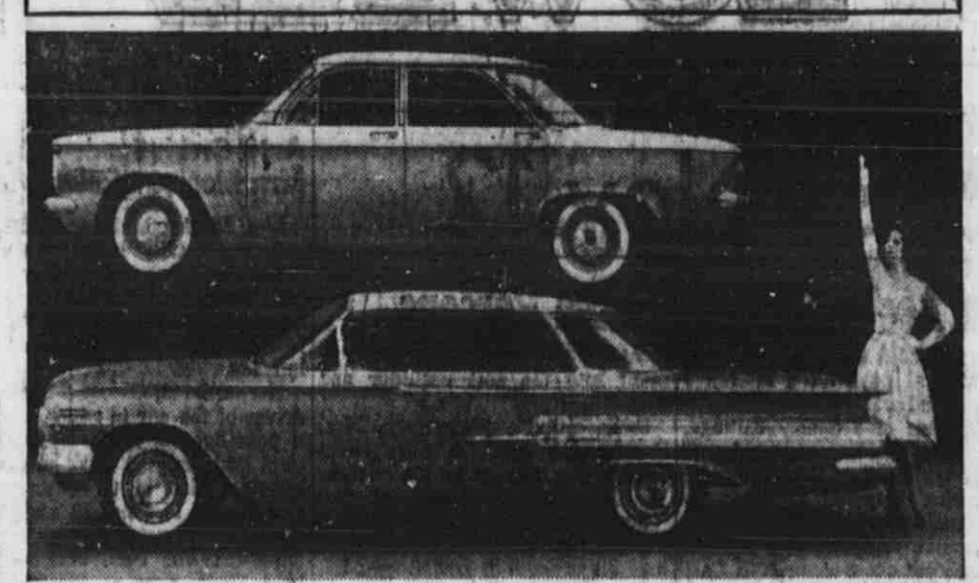

**Blanch Vegetables For Freezer Storage**  
It's easy to freeze fresh vegetables—just don't overcook them. Take time to blanch vegetables, says Roberta Hershey, food and nutrition specialist at Michigan State University. To blanch foods, you simply scald them in boiling water, then cool them quickly before freezing. Scalding destroys enzymes present in the vegetables—enzymes that cause off-flavors and unnatural colors. Scalding time varies with the different vegetables. This is generally longer because of the different sizes of pieces. One research laboratory found that green beans changed in flavor within two weeks after freezing if they were not blanched, Miss Hershey adds. The vegetable should be cooked in the same amount of time it takes to scald it. For instance, if green beans require three minutes to scald, they should be cooked in three minutes. To test, bite into a piece of the vegetable. It should be cool to the center. Information and directions for freezing foods is found in Bulletin 216, "Freezing Foods for Michigan Homes." It is available at your county Cooperative Extension Office. Copies are also available from the Bulletin Office, Agricultural Experiment Station, Michigan State University, East Lansing.

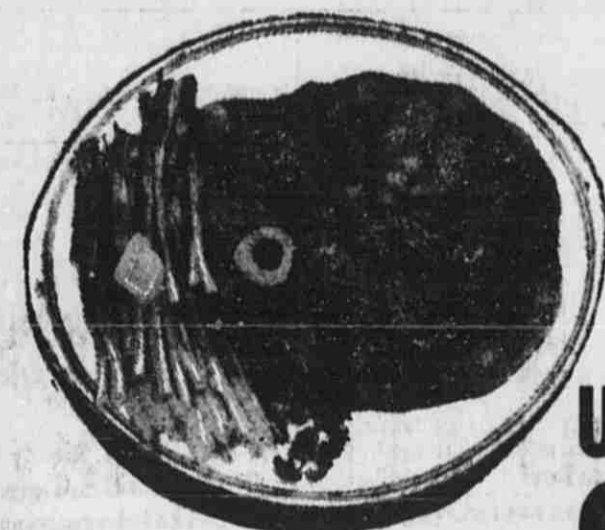
