

Lowell Beats East 14-13; Grandville Here Friday

The Arrows' first win over an East Grand Rapids football team since 1951, a 14-13 thriller last Friday, set the stage for one of the most important contests of the season in this week's Homecoming battle with Grandville. A victory is a must for the Lowell crew if it intends to continue holding the Valley's top spot. The visiting Bulldogs are defending co-champions and have three non-league wins under their belts. They bring a fast backfield and a line headed by all-star Doug Hanlon to open the defense of their crown. Lowell coach Chuck Pierce has been putting his charges through stiff workouts, emphasizing defensive work, in preparation for the battle Friday at 7:30.

A large hometown following witnessed the Arrows shade East 14-13 to move into an early season lead in the Grand Valley Friday night. The Lowell boys continued their string of scoring the first time they got the ball, sending fullback Steve Fritz over from the 3 after driving 58 yards in 11 plays. Senior

quarterback George Moore pushed over for the extra point, and the Arrows held an early 7-0 bulge. The Arrows never seriously threatened again in the first half, but the defense was extended to contain the Pioneers' penetration to the Lowell 4 early in the second period. An Andrews-Barrett passing combination netted the hosts a score with 19 seconds left in the first half, placing the score at 7-7 during the intermission.

The teams battled evenly in the third quarter, until the Pioneers tried a quick kick on third down from their own 15. Guard Dale Green crashed in on the third punt, and an alert Fred Wissman grabbed the ball and scampered to the East 3-yard stripe. Fritz bucked over for his second score of the night, and Moore again added the point, giving the Arrows a dramatic 14-7 lead.

The Arrows penetrated to the East 9 early in the final quarter but were stopped by a penalty. Later, after stopping another Lowell drive, the Pioneers took over on downs on their own 25. John Ryan, subbing for East quarterback George Andrews who was ousted from play by the hard-tackling Lowell line, directed the attack, culminating in a 30-yard scoring pitch to Bill Moser. With the score 14-13, East attempted a kick for the point after touchdown, but Lowell end Fred Wissman, a third year varsity man, said "no" as he rifled in to neatly block the attempt.

After an inside kickoff attempt that failed, the Pioneers again gained control of the ball on downs but an intercepted pass by Steve Fritz assured the Arrows of the win.

School Board Asks For New District Name

According to law, the official name of the local school district is "4th Class School District Number One Fractional, Townships of Lowell, Ada, Bowne, Cannon, Cascade and Vergennes, County of Kent; and Townships of Boston and Keene, County of Ionia." And as districts in other townships are annexed, such townships must be named also in all official or legal proceedings of the District! However, the school laws permit a school district to choose another name which must receive the OK of the County Board of Education before it becomes official.

By action of the Board of Education on Monday night, Superintendent Gumsier was directed to ask for suggestions, and to that end the Ledger is making it possible for interested citizens to send in their ideas. The title should be BRIEF. Possibly, the title should have the connotations of an area or a community to indicate that the school district embraces a large area outside of the city proper—such as "Lowell Area Schools." Streetlighting Petitions

Petitions were ready this week to be circulated among the Main Street property owners to decide the type and method of installing new lights. Six proposals have been made from fluorescent fixtures on cement posts, staggered at 65 ft. intervals from city limit to city limit to cost \$60,488.56 to mercury vapor on concrete posts 65 ft. staggered in the business district and on wood posts 100 ft. staggered at each end of Main Street for a cost of \$30,162.73. The other proposals are variation of these two. A total area of 17,000 feet is involved in the Main Street area; 14,205 feet assessed property and 2,795 in street intersections, bridges and other village owned property.

Council-Manager Type Government Selected For New City of Lowell

Lowell City Charter Commission in their first four meetings have made several important decisions regarding Lowell's government under its proposed city charter. Its first decision was that they favored a council-manager type organization, that the council be either 5 or 7 members. This is still undecided. They would be elected from the entire city. Two year terms was agreed best with a majority being elected each year, lowest vote getter to only have a one-year term.

The group favored having the mayor chosen from the council by its members. The election date approved was the first Monday in April to be the same as for State elections. Non partisan election of the council and justice of peace with no primary, nominating petitions with at least 25 but not more than 50 signatures being required, members must be residents of the city for at least a year.

Discussion of salary for the governing body was finally decided that if a 7 man council is used, it would be \$60 for members and \$100 for mayor; if a 5 member council, it was to be \$100 for members, \$150 for mayor.

How other village officers would be named is being discussed at the next meeting. Donald M. Oakes has been employed by the commission to act as consultant to the group. He is a former city manager of Grand Rapids and will be in attendance at meetings when his advice will be needed.

Carbon Monoxide Claims Victims In Cold Weather

When temperatures go down, your chances of falling victim to carbon monoxide go up, Dr. Albert C. Heston, state health commissioner, said today.

But there are several precautions you can take to protect yourself against this deadly gas, the department added. Most of them apply to automobiles and the use of carbon fuels in stoves and appliances.

Carbon fuels include coal, charcoal, coke, wood, oil, gasoline, kerosene, natural gas and bottled gas. Some carbon monoxide is formed whenever carbon-containing material is burned. The amount of carbon monoxide increases as the air supply is reduced. If venting is inadequate, the deadly gas is carried away without causing harm.

Last year 85 persons died in Michigan of carbon monoxide poisoning, almost all of them inside their homes.

To protect yourself inside a car, the health department recommended:

- 1—Have your car's exhaust system checked and repaired or replaced if necessary. If the muffler isn't working right, carbon monoxide will leak up through the floorboards.
- 2—In cold weather, always drive with a window or vent partly open so fresh air can get in.
- 3—Never run a car's engine inside a closed garage or other building.

To protect yourself inside your home:

- 1—Check all stoves, heaters, appliances and engines that use carbon fuels to make sure that they are adjusted and vented properly. If you don't know how to do this, get someone who does.
- 2—Don't install water heaters where air doesn't circulate, such as in closets that are kept closed.
- 3—An increasing number of carbon monoxide accidents have been occurring during cold weather at motels and cabins, the state health department said. To help owners and operators of these places protect their guests, it has issued a pamphlet entitled "Carbon Monoxide Hazard." It can be obtained from local health department offices or by writing to the Michigan Department of Health, Lansing.
