





Michigan's Conservation Department draws from two main sources—the General Fund and the Game and Fish Protection sources—the General Fund and the Game and Fish Protection Fund—to expand and conserve the state's natural resources. The General Fund appropriation, totaling some \$7.880,000 this fiscal year, comes from state taxes and several federal aid grants. These monies are used to carry out the Department's parks, forestry, lands and geology programs. Completing the budget picture is the Game and Fish Fund (license fees) which is providing more than \$9,600,000 for ten major programs of the Department as shown above. Federal apportionments have added about \$1,100,000 annually to this fund in recent years. Jack of All Trades


