Act To Set Mar. 7 Date For City Charter Vote

A time table for the city vote was set by the action of the council on Monday night calling for petitions being filed by February 1 for candidates for the five positions of the city council and the post of justice of the peace. Petitions must bear at least 25 but not more than 50 signatures of registered voters in the precincts of the proposed City of Lowell. Filing must be done with the secretary of the City Charter Commission, Laura Shepard, at the City Hall before 5 p. m. on Monday February 1st.

The time table calls for a vote on March 7 to adopt the charter

The Lowell Village Council on Monday night took action to approve a gas ordinance for the village to protect the citizens from improper installation of gas equipment. The ordinance to be enacted which will provide for licensing of installers of gas operated equipment. There will be a gas inspector who will examine the installations while under construction.

and to elect the officers of the proposed city. Under the charter up for approval the citizens will elect five council men and a justice of the peace. Other officers will be filled by appointment.

In the first election the two candidates for the council who receive the highest number of votes will be given a two year term, the next three candidates will hold a one year term. Thereafter at regular city elections to be held the first Monday of April, same as the State spring election date, the two candidates receiving the most votes will win the two year term and the third highest will get the one year term.

The mayor of the village will be elected from among the five council members by the council. Other offices such as clerk, treasurer, police chief, etc., will be appointed by the city manager with the approval of the council.

The Justice of the Peace will serve two year terms and have expanded authority under the proposed charter. For compensation the will receive only his fees the same as the township justices now are paid.

Registration of Voters
Any person who resides within the boundaries of the proposed City of Lowell and is registered with the Lowell Village Clerk or with the Township Clerk will be eligible to vote in the Charter election on March 7th. If not registered the last day to apply will be Monday, February 8, at the Village Clerk's office in the City Hall.

Major General George E. Bush Commanding General, VI U. S. Army Corps has announced that Terrance B. Lindemer, Rural Rte. 2, Box 271, Lowell, will go to the Missouri camp.

The Michigan reservist is one of a group of 80 from VI Corps who will fulfill part of his military obligation by being sent to the short duty tour. Other Army Reserve members have duty tours of 6 or 24 months. The Reserve Force Act of 1955 authorizes local induction boards to classify men with certain critical skills in a special category and permit them to go on a short active duty tour.

Name Burch To Council



Village President William Jones named Carroll Burch, Lowell High School teacher, to the vacant spot on the village council Monday night. The action was taken, Jones reported, because of the long absence of George Dey, Sr., who is on vacation, for several weeks. With only four members all would have to be present at every meeting to make a quorum. Burch is also a candidate for the village council in the election in March.

No Primary
Because no more candidates filed than was necessary to fill the vacancies there will be no primary in February. If the time table is carried out as proposed by the charter commission (see another article) there will be no March 14 village election.

Street Light Bids
Bids were taken at the council meeting Monday for new street lights on Main street. For the lights necessary to properly illuminate the street from Jefferson to Amy, some 39 units, the cost was established by the low bid at \$19,466 or about \$3.80 a front foot. This would provide cement posts, fluorescent fixtures to do a lighting job the same as on the Grand Rapids streets.

William Christiansen, who has circulated a petition among the businessmen in this area, reported that he has 75 percent of them signed up to pay their share in a special assessment district. The village would have to pay about one-third of the cost for the footage in intersections and public buildings. No date has been set for the hearing on the special assessment district.

Basketball Squad Seeks First Conference Win

Lowell's Red Arrow basketballers, having found the cage competition a little tough in northern Michigan, return happily to the familiar Grand Valley Conference this Friday, January 8, when coach Norm Gotschall's five hosts the Rockford Rams at the Lowell gym. Both teams will be seeking their first conference win this season. The Arrows will be seeking their second conference win in three seasons, the only one thus far since the 1956-57 season being an upset of Godwin in last year's campaign. Second team action Friday begins at 7.

Manistee's powerful quintet combined excellent physical condition and a distinct height advantage to bury the Arrows, 73-44 on the 29th of December at the Manistee armory. The absence of senior forward and captain Fred Wissman prevented Coach Gotschall from substituting as much as in previous games, and the large Manistee floor, the longest the Arrows have ever played on, soon took its toll of fatigue on Lowell's pressing defense.

The host Chippewas roared off to a 21-10 first period lead as it took the Arrows nearly six minutes to break into the scoring column. They maintained firm control of the contest in the second period to hold a 38-20 bulge at halftime. At this point a strong comeback would have changed the game quickly, but the Manistee boys poured in 24 points to pull away 62-26. In the final eight minutes, against Chippewa substitutes, the Arrows garnered 18 points, mainly on foul shots and the ball-hawking of senior Carol Eckman.

Manistee led the Lowell scorers as he hit for 14 points his average thus far. Frank McMahon meshed 7, and Dick Ward and Steve Fritz had 6 apiece. Norm Radtke and Gordon Ogilvie tallied 23 and 17 respectively in only three periods of play for the victors.

School Supt. Looks to Break - Even Operation for the 1959-60 School Year

In a report to the members of the Lowell School Board at the regular meeting Monday evening, Superintendent W. W. Gumsier submitted a budget which indicated that the school will end the year without a debt for operation.

Payment of state aid money will enable the budget to balance in spite of several unexpected expenditures like the new school bus just purchased for \$6,918 which was not in this year's budget. Receipts

for the year are expected to reach \$264,750 and by careful handling of expenditures this should cover the operation.

In the money saving attempt, the board voted not to erect a bronze plaque carrying the names of the board members in the new addition to the Runciman elementary building which is expected to be ready for use on January 18. All children in the Lowell Area Schools will be attending classes in Lowell after this building is ready.

The board approved the hiring of two new teachers for the elementary school. The young ladies, Misses Patricia and Cecelia Bradley of Ada are sisters and graduates of Aquinas College in Grand Rapids.

A third elementary teacher and a high school English teacher are still needed.

The school is having its engineer Mr. Dean investigate the possibility of converting their main boilers from coal to gas.

The engineer will submit an estimate of comparative costs of operation.

Clark Installs First Gas Unit



Dave Clark, sr., points to the first gas furnace for use in the community just installed at the C. H. Runciman Co. The giant size burner which will take a 2-inch gas line to feed it, will fire the newly installed boiler to furnish heat for all the Runciman buildings on South Broadway. This includes the electric eye picking plant, the warehouse, bean elevator and office.

The Runciman installation is a dual fuel type burner which will burn oil or gas by merely flicking a switch. In case of a gas failure, the burner can be immediately changed over to oil.

Third Heating Change

Dave Clark revealed that this is the third change in heating fuel in the community since he began working in the plumbing and heating business here in 1927 for the late Charles Cook. In the 20's everyone heated with coal and wood, the first oil burning space heater he remembers came to Lowell in 1931 when one was installed in the apartment over Coons store.

The first oil burning furnace installation came here in 1931, Clark said in the Dr. Godfredsen home on Riverside Drive. In 1935 he remembers as the first complete oil burning unit being installed by the Cook Company. Now with the first natural gas burning unit installed, he says he looks forward to another change in the community over a period of years to perhaps as many heating with gas as now use oil.

Clark took over the ownership of the Cook Plumbing and Heating in 1945 after the death of Mr. Cook. His son, Dave Jr., is associated with him in the business.

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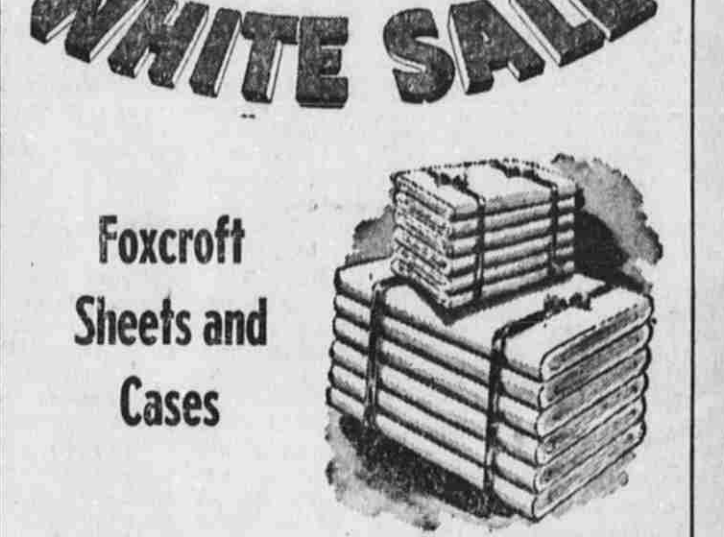

The clerk relayed the offer of the Consumers Power Company to connect the gas service to the city hall, without installation charge. Finance Chairman Dey recommended that same be done; no objection voiced.
C. J. Place was again present in the interests of Maple Street grading. He reported the necessary grade lines established and stated no manhole would be necessary. Street Commissioner Westbroek was directed to commence graveling and grading at once.
Mr. Westbroek also reported that Williams & Works' plans for correcting flooding condition on N. Jefferson Street amounted to \$3,210.72. Plans for a meeting with property owners would be set at January 4th Council meeting; clerk directed to so inform them. Mr. Westbroek also reported that:
1. Bids for materials for the proposed Main Street Lighting project will be opened and tabulated at 5 p. m. on December 28, at the Light & Power office, for presentation to the January 4th Council meeting.
2. Bids received on tires for St. truck (low bid \$213.45); he was authorized to accept low bid named above and purchase tires. (3)
3. Inquiry on cost of tree to replace a village-owned one, pending.
Trustee Schaefer stated that the amount of footage assessed to the village under the proposed lighting program on Main Street would be made known by Engineer Kempker at the January 4th Council meeting.

Chairman of Police Committee, Thompson, recommended that Mr. George DeGraw be named Acting Police Chief as of January 4; his recommendation was unanimously concurred in. The Police Committee was also authorized to hire (with the aid of the present police chief) a night police officer, that applicant best suited for the position.
Attorney VanderVeen stated a deed will be drawn from the survey on the right-of-way purchased on Grindle Drive. Mr. VanderVeen also reported that March 7 has been tentatively set for the city election of charter and commissioners. The attorney also presented a model gas ordinance and stated it called for the appointment of a gas inspector. He recommended that the license fees for installers, and permits by home owners to install gas, could defray the expense of a qualified gas inspector. He will have definite information on a possible inspector for the January 4th meeting.
The clerk and utilities superintendent were authorized to issue bonus checks for Christmas for village employees (\$25.00 employees of one year, \$12.50 for six-months' employees), as in previous years.
