Religious Fervor Not Due to Age, U-M Study Finds

Contrary to popular opinion, religious activity does not increase with age. This is the principal finding of a study of church attendance in the Detroit metropolitan area, a national survey conducted by the Catholic Digest in 1952, which found a similar overall relationship between age and religious behavior.

Orbach's study is based on information covering nearly 7,000 adults age 21 and over residing in Wayne, Macomb, and Oakland counties obtained in interviews by the U-M Detroit Area Study in 1952, 1954, 1955, 1956, and 1957.

When frequency of church attendance was tabulated according to age, he reports, the results "failed to show any general trend in attendance with age or indication of an increase in religiosity in the later years."

The proportion which attended church once a week ranged from 43 to 45 percent, but showed no steady increase with age. Women in all age groups attended church more often than men, with those between 40 and 65 attending most frequently.

Taking social features into account, he reports:

1. Among Protestants, only Negro men show a persistent increase in church attendance with advancing age.

2. Among Catholics, men show a clear decline in attendance with age, while women show a steady level of attendance, with some suggestion of an increase in old age.

Complaints Received On School Bus Drivers by State Department

Several complaints have been received by the Department of Public Instruction regarding the failure of school bus drivers to activate their vehicle's flashing lights in time to warn the motoring public that the bus is about to stop.

Divisional inspectors have investigated at least 300 before the bus stops so that the public will know that the bus is stopping to load or unload school children.

There have also been complaints that some school bus drivers fail to give the traffic accumulated behind the bus an opportunity to disperse. This is required by law.

It is important that all bus drivers, for both public and non-public schools, observe these rules, laws and regulations.

Superintendents and supervisors of transportation are asked to re-emphasize these requirements very carefully.
