

## New Main St. Lights by July!

Action by the city council Monday evening to install new street lighting on Main Street between Jefferson and Amity puts the target date for the completion of the project, July 18th.

The installation will be made on a special assessment district with the property owners paying 75 percent of the cost and the city 25 percent. Total cost is estimated at \$22,835 for the 46 units of fluorescent lighting. When completed it will give Lowell a brighter Main Street than Division Ave. in Grand Rapids.

A hearing for the special assessment has been called for Monday, April 25; final determination of assessment will be held on May 10. Bids are being requested for April 22nd and completion date is set at July 16th. Assessments may be paid in cash within 90 days or may be made in installments over 5 years.

### Ask Township Audit

In making a final settlement with Lowell Township over division of assets the council decided that the first step is to have a complete audit of township assets.

A letter to the 110 new citizens of the city is being mailed telling them of the schedule for garbage and rubbish pickup, fire and police protection and to check with their insurance companies to get a reduction in fire rates.

Preliminary to extending city zoning to the new area all citizens with construction projects that may change the land use are being notified that to continue will be taken up within a few weeks.

The clerk told the council that with the addition of the new names given to the city from the township clerks books the registered voters in the city now number 1,263.

**Act to Take Responsibility**  
The council acted Monday to take over its responsibility of determining where Showboat funds for public projects should go under the bylaws of Lowell Showboat Inc. It was brought to the attention of the council that their approval was necessary before the money to purchase the industrial site for Attwood Brass could be made available.

The council passes a resolution approving the Showboat gift of \$6,000 for the purchase of an industrial site and further stated that it will take over its duty in the future to pass on all gifts of funds from Showboat Inc.

A meeting will be held on Thursday, April 21, with Showboat directors to determine the procedure of the council in approving future gifts of these public funds.

Wolverine Boys State is held annually in mid-June (June 16-23) on the Michigan State University campus at East Lansing. Enrollment is limited to 1,000 outstanding youngsters in the state of Michigan.

American Legion officials say the teenagers were selected on the basis of their leadership, good sportsmanship, personalities and mental alertness.

During the eight-day session, the youths "learn by doing" the mechanics and operation of city, county and state government.

Under guidance of American Legion instructors, the boys elect city, county and state officers; learn how to draft bills, enact them into laws, then enforce and administer the laws after they are passed. The youths also attend lectures and clinics taught by representatives of the state police, sheriff's office, Lansing Mayor's office, and the Ingham County Bar Association.

The objectives of the Boys' State Program, say American Legion officials, are to impress teenagers with the responsibilities and duties of good citizenship.

## School Musicians Win High Rating at State Solo and Ensemble Festival

Last Saturday, the Senior High solos and ensembles from Lowell that won a first (superior) rating at the District Festival participated in the annual State Solo and Ensemble Festival on the Michigan State University campus in East Lansing.

Four first division soloists entered the proficiency grouping. Besides playing their prepared solo, participants in this category must play certain scales from memory and also sight-read a piece that they have never seen before. Proficiency is graded I, II, or III, according to the number of years the soloist has entered it. The number of scales to be played and the difficulty of the piece to be sight-read both increase according to the grade of proficiency the soloist is in. A total rating of 85 points or above (of a possible 100) is required to pass the examination.

Susan Keek was the only entrant in third year proficiency from Lowell. She was one of only twelve soloists entered in third year proficiency this year from the state of Michigan, all instruments combined. Sue scored a 92, which qualifies her as one of the best, if not the very best, alto saxophone players in the state. This is a great credit to her individually, and to Lowell High School.

Two people were entered in second year proficiency from Lowell. They were Galen Fletcher, playing bass, and Lola Alexander, playing alto saxophone. Galen passed his examination with a score of 88. Lola failed by a narrow margin, lacking only a few points to pass.

The lone entrant in first year proficiency from Lowell was Judy Posthumus, who passed with a total of 88 points. She played cornet for her examination, and she also accompanied two other Lowell entries on the piano.

Three ensembles entered the festival from Lowell. An alto sax duet of Lola Alexander and Sue Keek received a first division rating. A brass sextette consisting of Judy Posthumus and Ron Lindbloom, cornets, Sandra Staal, French horn, Jon Walter, baritone, Bob Thaler, trombone, and Galen Fletcher, bass was awarded a second division rating. A flute duet of Suzie Jacobi and Sharon Walker received a third division (good) rating.

## 'Stormy' Takes Early Plunge

Anthony H. Stormzand, 69, of 506 N. Jefferson Street, spent more than a half-hour in the frigid waters of Murray Lake Wednesday afternoon before rescuers found a way to get him out.

Stormzand who had been ice fishing on the Lake with Elmer Ellis walked too close to the north end channel, which was partly obscured by fog and fell through the thin ice. Bob Ward of Ada, hearing the calls for help, fell through the ice when he attempted to help Stormzand and was helped out by Mr. Ellis, Stormzand's fishing partner.

Ward then went to shore where he met James Heather of 10391 Five Mile Rd., N. E., who summoned Bill Loughlin and Sidney Hoogboom to the scene. Loughlin and Hoogboom borrowed a boat and tried to rescue Stormzand by clearing ice through the channel while Mr. Heather and his wife, Barbara, failed to pull Stormzand out with a rope. Mr. Loughlin finally pulled Stormzand, who was struggling to keep afloat, into the boat.

Mr. Stormzand was taken to Butterworth hospital and was released after recovering from his early plunge.

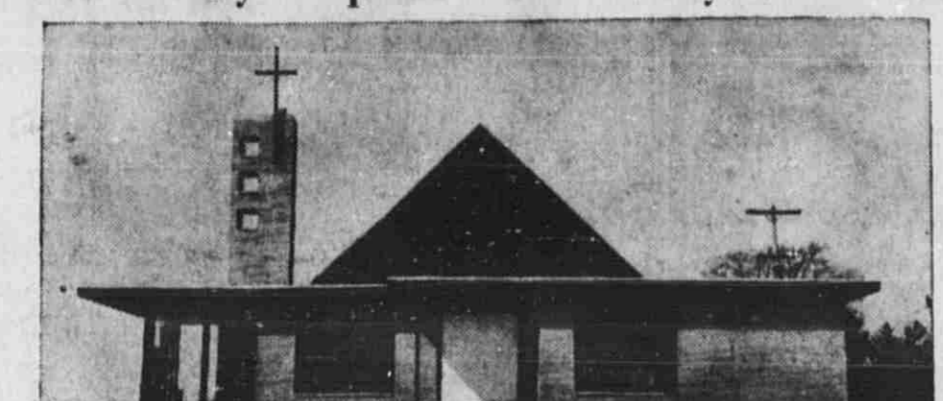

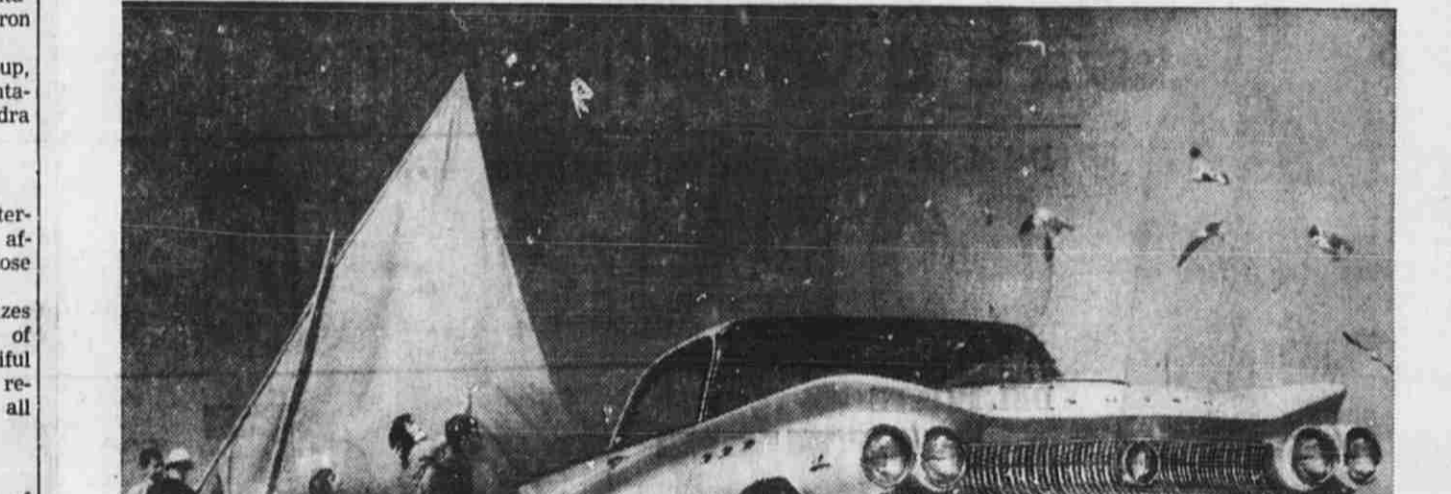

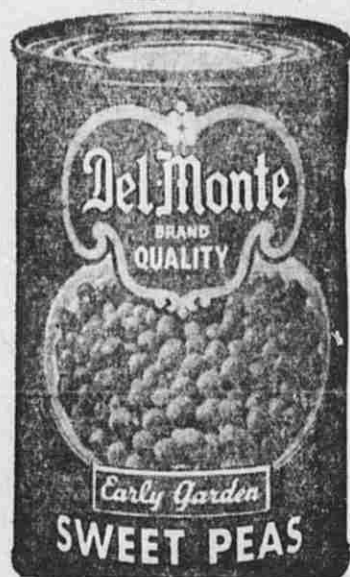
