In the big seventh Fritz walked, Dilly was hit by a pitch, and Carroll Eckman singled to load the bases. The next two batters, Dick Stepek and Ken Witherell, drew walks forcing in two runs. Bob Vidéan then connected on the game's biggest blast with a bases-loaded triple to drive in three runs.

Vote June 7 On Airport

Citizens will be given an opportunity to vote June 7 on a bond issue to finance the county's share of the cost of building the new Cascade Township airport. General county obligation bonds totaling \$3,975,000 would be issued but would require only a small sum raised by taxes to pay them off. Mainly they would be retired, county officials said, by sale of the present airport and out of revenues from operation of the new airport.

It was reported to the board of supervisors that more than \$2,000,000 may be lost to the county for the construction of a new airport unless this general obligation bond issue is approved by the voters on June 7.

Notices are appearing this week naming the last day, May 9, for registration of voters for the June 7 election.

Total cost of the proposed airport is estimated by engineers at \$6,997,000 to purchase land, build runways, administration building, and roads, etc.

The request for extra millage of 2 fifths of a mill for 17 years is being asked of voters. Airport authorities said that much less than that, perhaps only one-eighth of a mill would be required for 8 or 9 years.

V.F.W. Auxiliary Announces Sale of 50-Star Flags

The V. F. W. Auxiliary to Post 8303 of Lowell has begun the sale of 50-star American flags which become official on the 4th of July, 1960. Orders will be taken for either the flag-kit which consists of a 50-star flag, pole and bracket for the house, or for the flag alone for those who already have a pole and bracket. Also, orders will be taken for any street flags which merchants may care to purchase.

The Auxiliary will have samples of these flags on hand by the first of May, 1960, and will display one kit in a window in town so that all interested in purchasing a flag may see it. The separate flag will be the same as in the kit. The cost of the kits will be \$3.95, while the flag alone will cost \$2.50. The larger street flag will cost \$9.00 and will be purchased by order only. The street flag is 4 ft. by 6 ft. while the house-flag is 3 ft. by 5 ft.

Anyone interested in purchasing a flag may do so simply by calling or contacting any member of the V. F. W. Auxiliary. Frieda Hendrick is the chairman of the committee, but any member will gladly take your order. Delivery of the flags will be made by the 31st of May, 1960, by any order received by the 15th of May. Any orders received after that time will take about 2 weeks to fill.

Although this 50-star flag may not be flown until the 4th of July this year, it is felt that some citizens would be interested in purchasing them now. Of course, purchases may be made at any time from the first of May until the 4th of July and even after.

The council two weeks previously had notified Mr. DeMull before he had built the fence that the area was to be rezoned and would not be possible to have a junk yard in the area. He has continued building the fence after being given the warning by the city attorney.

Mrs. Leonard Murphy and Bill Cannon appeared before the council voicing their protest over blighting the new area with a junking operation.

Rural Eighth Grade Students to Be Tested
The Lowell Area Schools have requested that all 8th grade students who plan to attend Lowell High School next year, ride our school buses next Monday, April 25, in order that they may be given an achievement test.

The test is the same given to our 8th grade students and will be used to assist wise choices of courses for the following year.

The subjects tested will be reading, vocabulary, spelling, language skills, arithmetic, social studies, study skills and science.

From one to two weeks later the tests will have been scored and a meeting will be called to present the test scores to parents and students. Teachers will be on hand to supplement the coordinated effort toward good counseling.

Rural students are asked to report to the high school gymnasium as soon as they arrive at school. The testing will last all day. Students should bring their lunch. They will be able to buy milk at the hot lunch counter, and will ride home on the regular bus runs.

If time permits there will also be an orientation discussion.

"Of those I like best are speech and government. They are the only ones that I could not have in Germany. Speech helped me to speak and to think correctly and logically and was enjoyable besides. I have an interest in both history and politics. US Government made me understand those subjects better."

Besides all his academic work, Peter finds time for outside activities, consisting mostly of Tennis, being Junior Rotarian, and Exchange student. He also enjoys photography, reading and being in his German actors group.

McMahon, Wingeier, Rog Dempew, and Randy Johnson will enter the shotput, and the list of broad jumpers includes Rog Odell, Kaufield, Martin Van Driel, Larry Hartley, Slack, Gordon Rogers, and Myers. The pole vault will be weak with no experience whatsoever learning the event. Several boys are learning the event.

The dashes and relays will be filled by Jim Miner, Hartley, Mike Boyden and Slack, while Odell, Bill Smith, Charlie Ford, Dennis Sealey and Boone will run the 440. The distances could be another surprise. Wingeier, VanDriel, Henry Kampshorn, Mike Houlihan, Jim Floyd, and Al Eckman fill up the 880, and Ron Wilson and Bob Thaler are the only milers.

The Grand Valley has always been a strong track league, having produced several individual and team state champions in recent years, and this year doesn't look like an exception. Among pre-season marks have been a 2:08 half mile and a broad jump of 21 ft. 1 1/2 in.

Asks Reorganization of Showboat; Says It Has Outgrown Original Board

The City Council in a resolution passed Monday night at the regular meeting asked that Lowell Showboat Inc. reorganize to give a broader representation of the city on the board. In the discussion William Jones, Mayor of Lowell, pointed out that Showboat had outgrown its original beginning and that now the operation was divided among all the organizations in the community and they should all share in the management. The city council voted unanimously on the resolution.

There was a meeting on Friday evening with members of the board of Lowell Showboat Inc. and the City Council at which time there was some discussion. Members of the board from the American Legion objected to sharing control with the council or other organizations in the community.

The entire discussion came about when the directors representing the Lowell Board of Trade and the American Legion disagreed on the distribution of Showboat funds.

A general meeting of Lowell Showboat Inc. may be called soon to act on the council resolution. All members of the American Legion and Lowell Board of Trade make up the stock holders of the corporation and it will be on their vote that changes could be made in the by-laws of the organization.

Council Resolution
WHEREAS, Council was asked to have joint meeting with Board of Directors of Lowell Showboat to review recent actions of said Board in the distribution of said Corp. profit.

Meeting was held and actions were thoroughly discussed.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT:
1. That the present method of selecting the Board of Directors as stated in said corp. by-laws is no longer truly representative of a purely community project.

2. That the by-laws have not been followed in determining what is "public improving" before distribution of funds.

3. It is recommended that the by-laws be changed and that various organizations have equal representation, two members of each to be appointed by each organization such as:

American Legion, Board of Trade, Lowell Lions Club, V. F. W., and Lowell Rotary Club.

And since the City Council is the governing body of the City of Lowell and is responsible for the health, welfare and safety of the citizens of Lowell, it is recommended that one member of this body be appointed by the Council to represent it on the Board of said Corp.

4. It is also recommended that the Lowell Showboat operate strictly in accordance with the by-laws as amended.
