
The University of Michigan is the oldest state university in the country created directly by the voters through their state constitution. Michigan also has the nation's

Established in 1855, the Michigan agricultural school soon became the model for the 53 land-grant universities and colleges established throughout the nation under provisions of the Morrill act passed

by Congress in 1862. With a 1959 registration of 20,-800 students, Michigan state is second in size among our state universities in Michigan and ranks eighth in the nation in full-time enrollment, Wayne State in Detroit, with 20,500 students registered, is Michigan's third largest university.
