

Showboat Plans Well Underway

Plans were well underway this week for the annual production of Showboat on Flat River in Lowell on July 25-30. This will be the 29th production of this outstanding outdoor entertainment.

Announcement was made this week that William Jones, interlocutor of the 1959 show will not be able to take on these duties because of his many other civic projects which are in process. These include the many meetings and work necessary to organize the new City of Lowell of which he is mayor and leader; building of the Community swimming pool. He is chairman of Lowell Swimming Pool Inc.; also the Lowell Branch of the Y. M. C. A. Jones is president

of the local board which is organizing for its first summer project. With all these going at the same time he told Showboat directors that he could not do an adequate job of being the interlocutor of the Showboat.

Roy Westcott Interlocutor
Monday evening, Roy Westcott was chosen to be interlocutor of the 1960 Lowell Showboat production by directors and endmen of the show. Westcott who served his first year on the '59 show, has a fine voice and has been active in minstrel shows and choral groups for many years.

Roy Westcott was born in Detroit, Michigan, and graduated from Thomas M. Cooley High School in 1939. He attended Michigan State University, graduating with his D. V. M. in 1943. He served in the U. S. Army Veterinary Corp. in Boston from 1943-47 in World War II; while serving in Boston he married his wife, Marion. After leaving service he entered private practice in Constance, Michigan. Later he served as an instructor of surgery and medicine at Michigan State. He came to Lowell from South Bend, Ind. where he was in private practice in 1957. He is now working with the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Roy has been a member of the choir of the First Congregational church since coming to Lowell and active with the SPEBSQSA chapter in Grand Rapids. He has always been active in school and college glee club work, and took charge of several minstrel shows in communities where he has resided. He has a good background to become the interlocutor of the 1960 Showboat.

Ron Holst New Endman
Ron Holst has been named to take over as one of the six endmen on the '60 show. He is employed in a Grand Rapids supermarket, and lives at 402 N. Washington St. He is married and is the father of two children.

Other endmen are Forrest Buck, Bernard Kropf, Stephen Nisbet, Phil Kropf and Robert Reagan.

Some Acts Selected
C. H. Runciman, chairman of the entertainment committee of Showboat has announced that several of the professional acts have been selected. The star act of the '60 show will be "the Sportsmen," the group that worked with Jack Benny for many years. They have an outstanding act of comedy, and music that will give the show a real bounce. Also obtained for this year will be "Stevenson's Dogs," the best dog act touring this country with a fine, fast moving performance. The line of girls this year will be the "Pony Line of the June Taylor Dancers." They will be coming to Lowell direct from the "Sands" in Las Vegas, Nevada, where they close on Sunday night, July 24, and fly directly to Lowell, arriving at 6 p. m. to be rushed right to the Showboat dock for the first night performance.

Music Corporation of America is the booking agent bringing the professional show cast to Lowell.

Amateur Night, July 16
Amateur night has been set for Saturday evening, July 16, and many are already applying for spots on the tryouts. Mrs. Doris Draper, of C. H. Runciman Co., who has handled the correspondence for amateur night for many years has been named by Showboat President Richmond as chairman of this event. The endmen and interlocutor will assist her on the night of tryouts.

Ticket Sales
J. Jerald Roth has been named chairman of ticket sales and he has announced that orders for tickets can be mailed to Lowell Showboat Inc. now but they will not be ready for delivery until the ticket office opens on Tuesday, July 5. Prices have been set the same as last year—\$1, \$1.60 and \$2.20 with all seats reserved.

300 Gather to Honor Gumsier

Over 300 Lowell and Michigan men and women were present Tuesday evening to honor Walter W. Gumsier who is retiring this year after 34 years as superintendent of Lowell Area Schools.

Stephen Nisbet, principal, acted as master of ceremonies, introducing Gerald Rollins, President of Lowell School Board, who paid tribute to Gumsier's long faithful and dynamic leadership in Lowell Schools.

Next to be introduced was C. H. Runciman, who said he was most happy to be out for the first time in 15 weeks. Runciman was on the original board that employed Gumsier in 1926. He introduced from the audience Miss Grace Walker the only other member of that board present. In paying homage to the work of Gumsier in Lowell, Runciman said Lowell Schools were in an enviable position because of the work of its superintendent; that the quality of the education is acknowledged to be of the highest and the operation has been so economical that it has saved the taxpayers of Lowell many thousands of dollars over the years. The Lowell school system has a smaller indebtedness than any school of its size in the area, all which can be traced to Gumsier's outstanding administration.

State Honors
James Covert, President of Michigan Association of School Administrators, speaking his tribute, said that Gumsier's leadership in helping to provide the best education for children of Lowell and all the boys and girls in the State of Michigan was of the highest. Gumsier is a past president of the school administrators organization and a strong leader in Lansing over the years in school legislation. Covert stated that he was proud to be here to pay his personal tribute and that of the school administrators of Michigan.

William DeHart, superintendent of Sparta Schools and head of the Kent County School Administrators association, said Gumsier was not only an outstanding school administrator but a wonderful gentleman whom he had been active with for many years, and proud to be in Lowell to sing his praises. He said the work of Gumsier for Lowell and every community in the state could not be measured.

Permanent Tribute
Don Kelly, President of Lowell Teachers Club, presented in behalf of the entire school personnel a painting of Walter Gumsier and a message of tribute to be hung in a suitable place in the school as a permanent acknowledgment of Gumsier's service to Lowell Schools.

William Jones, Mayor of Lowell, spoke of Gumsier's civic activities in the community and his leadership in affairs of the town. He told the audience that Lowell was proud of W. W. Gumsier and happy to have him as its representative on the Kent County Board of Supervisors. Jones presented a plaque to Gumsier as a memento of the evening and of the 34 years of community work. Stephen Nisbet presented a portable TV to Mr. and Mrs. Gumsier as a gift from the men of the Lowell service clubs.

Gumsier Speaks
In a humble reply to all the tributes and acknowledgments, Walter Gumsier told of his decision to come to Lowell 34 years ago and how he has never regretted it. He said that he was proud of every one of the 2,287 graduates of Lowell Schools since he has been here; from the 30 who graduated in 1926 to the 119 who will graduate this year. He told the assembled group that perhaps he could attribute his long tenure here to Ron Finch who came here with him from Clare, and had winning teams that always make a superintendent's position in the community stronger.

For the future Gumsier said that he and Mrs. Gumsier intend to enjoy life and that he plans no full time work, even though he has had many chances. He spoke of how he would like to be a member of the legislature where he has spent so much effort in providing laws to insure an adequate education for all the boys and girls of the state.

The program was concluded with the playing of a tape of Walter Gumsier singing the "Battle Hymn of the Republic." This is the song he thrilled Showboat crowds with for many years and was the most requested number in this annual show.

Attorney Rules on Property Ownership For School Board

The issue of whether a person may become a candidate for the Lowell School Board without having property on the assessment rolls in his name, was cleared up this week in an opinion of school attorney George R. Cook.

Attorney Cook said Tuesday, that the Legislature in 1959 amended the law which now provides that it is not necessary that the name of the candidate appear on the assessment rolls; although he must own property assessed for taxes. The question came up when David Debbink, pastor of the First Congregational Church, circulated petitions for the school board.

Previous to 1959 the law required that a candidate must have property listed in his name on the tax assessment rolls. This view was substantiated in 1955 by an Attorney General's opinion. The Legislature last year took action to change this portion of the law. A candidate must also have the other qualifications as stipulated in the formal notice which is to be found in this issue of the Ledger.

Announced candidates to date for the four positions on the School Board are Dr. Thomas Hill and David Coons, incumbents for the four year places on the board, and the Rev. David Debbink and Tyrus Wessell for the three year positions.

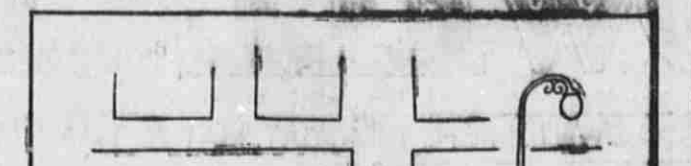

Carbonneau Says, 'Keep Old Airport'

Gordon S. Carbonneau, industrialist head of the foe of the proposed Cascade airport today said: "The proposed Cascade site would be a \$21,000,000 mistake for many reasons. The controlling reason is that we already have the airport we need in a better location."

"The site at Cascade is actually a dislocation that would move the airport away from the bulk of its market—the 800,000 people in Western Michigan who live north and west of Grand Rapids."

"The excuse that the airport should be moved now for longer runways doesn't stand up to the facts. The Cascade proposal calls for only two runways by 1970—one 5800 foot runway and one 3000 foot runway. The present airport 3700 foot runway and a 4200 foot runway."

"Such a seasoned aviation man as Eddie Rickenbacker has said: 'One can predict the landing and take-off characteristics of aircraft that will be in use in 1970. Committing for a \$21,000,000 scheme now for so-called longer runways in 1971 flies in the face of changing developments in aircraft.'"

"For instance, the Federal Government has a major project, called 'Humming Bird' devoted solely to the development of planes that require shorter runways. The British now have three jet planes that require no runways. A company in the U. S. already has a jet that takes off in less than 500 feet. Commercial helicopters on regular schedules carrying hundreds of thousands of passengers a year are presently operating on both coasts and in Chicago."

"The people should not now be asked to shoulder another long term tax burden for 1971 runways we will never need."

"A poor way to try to get ahead is to block the way for the people."

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Urge Vote on Airport in Cascade

On Tuesday, June 7, the taxpayers of this county will be asked to vote on a bond issue to build a new Kent County airport in Cascade Township. The plans have already been unanimously approved by the County Board of Supervisors and their opinions have been fully supported by the Michigan Department of Aeronautics and the Federal Aviation Agency.

There is a real need for a new airport in Kent County if we are to keep pace with the rapid progress of air transportation. Already we have fallen far behind other neighboring communities such as Lansing, Flint, Kalamazoo, South Bend, and Fort Wayne, and our old airport, built in 1916, has long since outlived its usefulness. It is virtually surrounded by heavily developed commercial and residential sites which make the cost of new and modern buildings in the area constitutes a very real safety hazard that could some day total in tragedy.

The total cost of the new airport has been estimated at just under seven million dollars, but only four million is being asked of the taxpayers. The remaining three million will come from state and federal grants, which, in themselves total \$2,775,000. The bond issue to every Kent County citizen is to save themselves money and to create more job opportunities by putting Kent County on the business map of the Midwest, the voters are being strongly urged to support the new airport by voting "Yes" on June 7.

Doubts Life Can Be Made In Test Tube

Man is not likely to be able to create life, says a British biochemist lecturing at Michigan State University.

According to Dr. W. T. Astbury, a professor at Leeds University, life began when nature learned to make chain molecules. The few chain molecules man has made—in nylon, for example—are nowhere near as complex as the chain-molecules made routinely in nature.

Chain molecules require their highest order in genetic material, he says. Like the tape feeding an electronic computer, these chain-molecules contain information an organism needs to direct and control its growth.

Dr. Astbury is a visiting scientist for the American Chemical Society.

Nominating Petitions Due For Board of Education

The terms of Dr. Thomas B. Hill and David Coons as members of the Board of Education will expire on July 1, 1960, and in accordance with law the vacancies will be filled at the annual election which will be held on Monday, July 11, 1960. In accordance with provisions of a law becoming effective this year, two additional members must be elected to all fourth class school districts, making a total of seven board members in districts like the Lowell Area Schools.

The new law provides that in situations where a total of four members must be elected, two members must be elected for four year terms and two must be elected for three year terms. Incumbents may choose to run for the three or four year terms. (Subsequently, after 1960, the voters shall elect members for four year terms.) Any qualified voter in the district whose name appears on the assessment roll and who is the owner of property so assessed is eligible for the Board of Education. Those who wish to become candidates for the position, must, in accordance with law, file nominating petitions with the Secretary of the Board of Education before 4 p. m. on June 11, 1960. Petitions must indicate whether the candidate is running for a three or four year term. The nominating petitions must be signed by at least fifty qualified electors who are registered in fourth class school district number one fractional (Lowell Area Schools).

It is to be noted that electors are not to sign petitions for more than four candidates this year. Only the names of those candidates who have qualified by filing their nominating petitions will have their names printed on the ballot. Nominating petitions are available at the office of Secretary Thomas B. Hill, M. D., 103 West Main St., Lowell, or at the high school office.

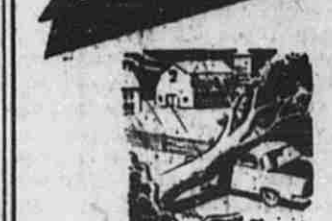
