RESOLUTION BOARD OF SUPERVISORS KENT COUNTY, MICHIGAN

JUNE 9, 1960

WHEREAS, the electors of the County of Kent at a Special Election held on June 7, 1960, did authorize the issuance of General Obligation Airport Bonds of the County of Kent in the aggregate principal sum of Three Million Nine Hundred Seventy-five Thousand (\$3,975,000) Dollars for the purpose of paying part of the cost of constructing and equipping a new airport in the County, consisting of a terminal building, runways and all attendant and necessary additional buildings and facilities to provide a completely modern airport and for the acquisition of a site therefor, and also approved an increase in the constitutional tax-rate limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in Kent County by a sufficient number of mills for a sufficient period of time to provide adequate security for said bonds; AND WHEREAS, it is the intent and purpose of the Board of Supervisors to pay the principal and interest on said bonds so far as possible from the net revenues of the airport, thus reducing the amount of ad valorem taxes actually required to be levied; AND WHEREAS, under the provisions of Act 327, Public Acts of Michigan, 1945, as amended, the County has the power to impose and collect charges, fees, rentals and rates for the use of said proposed new airport and for the commodities and services furnished thereby;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- The Board of Supervisors of Kent County hereby determines that the proposed new airport and the existing airport shall be operated by the County on a public utility rate basis wherein charges, fees, rentals and rates shall be imposed against all users of the proposed new airport and existing airport, and for the services, facilities and commodities furnished by said proposed new airport and existing airport, as authorized by Act 327, Public Acts of Michigan, 1945, as amended.
- The proposed new airport and the existing airport shall be operated on the basis of an operating

It is the intent and purpose of this subsection that there shall always be on deposit in said Operation and Maintenance Fund at the beginning of each month sufficient moneys to provide for the next ensuing three months' requirements as shown by said budget and to that end, after the three months' requirements are first established, there shall be set aside into said fund, monthly, out of the revenues in the Receiving Fund, sufficient moneys to maintain said three months' requirements.
