City Adopts Zoning Ordinance

The new area to the west which became a part of Lowell City after the election this spring was zoned residential and agricultural at a meeting of the city council on Monday evening.

A hearing on this ordinance was held on Wednesday, July 6, and there was only one party at the meeting voicing an objection. In the area to the south of the former village limits and across the Grand River the zoning was made industrial with no residential permitted.

The new ordinance was drawn up after a study by Raymond Mills of Midland, a city planning consultant, and makes available a large area of residential property for the growth of the city. A complete copy of the ordinance will be published in the near future.

New Street Lights

Roger Westenbroek reported to the council that the materials for the new street lights on Main Street were here and the crew of the Clifton Electric Company plan on starting work Showboat week.

For Showboat the light plant will try to get some temporary lighting set up and store owners are being asked to turn on signs and store lights to help brighten up the street.

The street department was also asked to prop up the old fence along Riverside Drive and estimates on a new fence will be requested so that the old board fence can be replaced.

The mayor, William Jones, also told the council that a meeting with the State Highway Department is being scheduled to attempt to get the area on the bridge repaired and a new railing installed.

City Taxes

The city clerk reported to the council that many citizens were calling asking where their summer city tax bills were. With the change over the tax statements have been delayed but are expected to be in the mails this week end.

Mrs. Esther Fahmi was asked to write up the tax statements after the roll was completed by Theo Bailey and Frank Houghton. This was not ready until after the first of July which is when the tax statements were regularly mailed.

Because of getting the tax notices out late the council set September 1 as the first day a penalty will be charged instead of August 1, as the city charter calls for.

Taxes will be collected in the city council room daily from 9 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. by Mrs. Fahmi.

Overreiner will become the fourth member of the force; George DeGraw is chief with Herman S. Kline and Neils Francen the other two officers. The new man has been on the night shift for several weeks while Neils Francen has been in the hospital and convalescing, after an operation.

In the past auxiliary police have been hired to work on days off, vacation and sick-leave of the three regular officers, with the fourth man this will not be necessary DeGraw told the mayor.

Mothers wiped the grease-paint off their little darlings' faces and packed up the homemade costumes before the long trip back home.

Next year they would be back, with a bigger and better act—and a bigger and better costume.

"We weren't allowed to have a spotlight—our record stuck—the piano player couldn't turn his pages—those exploding fire crackers ruined her number! That's why we didn't win!"

Or was it because the audience wasn't interested in watching another imitation of Al Jolson? Or because Bobby's voice hadn't fully changed yet? Or because Susie muffed the crucial line, and Mary felt a little awkward facing the large, critical crowd? Or because "Ol' Man River" is too slow to make a good Showboat song?

No one knows what turns an amateur into a star. It's neither the hysterical applause of relatives seated on the edge of the grandstand seats, nor the harassed decisions of judges.

It isn't sequins and satin or long, blond curls or rose-colored spotlights or sheer numbers.

At best it's a combination of many things—a spark of talent, months of practice, a lucky break—and six acts of the fifty which appeared on Amateur Night last Saturday had the winning combination.

After the judges' selection was announced and it was all over except the shouting, those performers who had lost disappeared, the crowd straggled home through the dim streets, and the Showboat callopie gave a final gasp being silenced under wraps again.

Even the winning Thack dancers, fearing they had lost, left for Battle Creek before the results were in.

But a few, tired and happy, stayed behind on the dew-wet stage to talk with Showboat directors and to face the press. This was their moment of glory—they had earned a chance to perform next to professionals on what is often billed as "the world's largest floating minstrel show."

"Arch your backs, girls," Gerri Gillette, many-time Amateur Night winner, called to her proteges. The girls finished straightening their hair, shivered uncontrollably, and complied.

The flash-bulbs went off, everyone sighed, and someone remembered to help the ape-man extricate himself from the Showboat paddwheel.

Errol Kaufman didn't have a costume—he didn't expect to win. Another contestant loaned him a bright blue derby. Herb Harris donated his bow tie, and "Doc" Westcott took off his coat and added it to the cause.

The Melody Mrs., apologized profusely and said they couldn't make it for the Thursday night show. They gratefully settled for Monday night instead.

"We want you to sing 'Knock Twice and Ask For Joe,'" Westcott told them as they packed up their stow hats.

Names were taken and publicity releases planned.

"We need a new one, anyway," said Terry and Tom Hunt as they gave up their search for their lost record.

Gary Johnson tickled the ivories just once more for the photographers' benefit, and then rolled his piano, balanced precariously on its sled, onto a waiting truck.

"Douse the lights!" someone called into the darkness.

Amateur Night was over for another year. Only 23 new stars had made the grade.
