Annexation Vote For Fallasburg **Coming August 16**

The Fallasburg school district, Vergennes 1 Fr., will hold a special meeting Tuesday, August 16, at the school building for the purpose of voting on the proposal of annexing to the Lowell Area Schools. The special meeting will begin at

At their annual meeting the Fal-At their annual meeting the Fai-lasburg school board was instructed to ask the Lowell board for a resolution to offer them the oppor-tunity to annex. This resolution was adopted at the July 11 meeting and sent to the Department of Public Instruction in Lansing for approval.

Annexation Logical Fallasburg school would have only eight children for the coming year and at the annual meeting it was therefore thought to be impractical to operate. The services of a teacher had not been contracted for at that time.

The school census showed that there would be no children coming into the lower grades for the next school year to qualify for state aid. This also helped to make the decision to ask for annexation logical at this time.

The record shows that the Low ell board of education often gives aid through annexation to those rural school districts which find it to their advantage.

It is expected that other districts will be discussing annexation soon. Logan and Talbot school districts have voted to send in their seventh and eighth grade students for the coming year.

It's Up to Homemakers To Guard the Food

Your eyes and taste buds don't always warn you of food poison-ing. Mary C. Coleman, instructor of foods and nutrition at Michigan State University, says a food may taste and look good yet still be the source of serious digestive

Most food spoilage is apt to occur after the food leaves the grocery store. This places the responsibility of preventing food contamination on the homemaker.

Bacteria capable of poisoning food prefers warm, moist protein and mixtures containing milk, eggs, meat, poultry or cheese are susceptible. About three and a half hours is the safety period for these foods if they are not refrigerated. When you place large amounts of warm food in the refrigerator, use shallow tional Home Chairman, OR 6-3006, pans to promote quicker cooling of the food.

Refrigerate protein foods as soon after preparation as possible and put liftover meats and boultry in the refrigerator right after the meal. Keep the food preparation area and utensils very clean. Be-

man, use the pressure cooker to preserve non-acid foods such as meats and vegetables. The one very serious type of food poisoning, often fatal, is botulism which develops in improperly home-canned, non-
