First New Street Light Up Friday



Workmen positioned the first of the new street lights for Main Street last Friday, using a derrick mounted on the rear of a truck to help raise the tall pole to a vertical position. Once raised, a five-foot extension of the pole was inserted into a hole previously dug in the ground. The new lights will be spaced 65 feet apart all along Main Street between Amity and Jefferson streets.



During the return trip a storm came up, and he became lost in the blizzard for 2 days, even though h knew by section markers that he was within one-half mile of his sod homestead

Secret of Longevity Despite the ordeal and the snow blindness and delerium which fo

lowed, Charles Henry lived to the ripe old age of 84 years. His wife Florence Norton Henry, lived to be 95, and Mr. Henry credits his own ongevity to family tradition. "It's just a matter of ancestr and healthy blood," he says. When asked if abstinence from liquor and tobacco had helped, Mr. lenry chuckled and claimed that he "never smoked or drank be

fore I was eleven!" Pharmacist for Sixty Years During his long life Mr. Henry

has served as a practicing phar macist for over sixty years, having taken a degree in pharmacy from Ohio Northern University in Ada,

He started in the drug business in 1890 at Greenville, coming to Lowell a year later when he was 18 to work for Dexter G. Look. He was connected with Mr. Look's drug business "off and on" for 15 years before opening his own
