Ends 38 Years Of Postal Service



Charles E. Radford, Rural Letter carrier on Route 2, will retire October 31, 1960, after completing 38 years and 13 days in the Postal Service.

He entered the Postal Service at Middleville, Michigan, as Rural Letter Carrier on Feb. 17, 1917, with a route of 30 1/2 miles. These were the days before the present all weather routes were completed and part of the year the Mail had to be delivered with horse and buggy.

On April 1, 1918 he transferred to Route 6 at Hastings, Michigan, with a route of 24 1/2 miles long. In November he resigned from this route to take over other employment.

Mr. and Mrs. Radford and their daughter Helen moved from Hastings to Grand Rapids, Michigan, on July 1, 1926, where Charles reentered the Postal Service as City Carrier. He transferred to Lowell on September 16, 1943 as Rural Route Carrier on Route 3.

After the death of Merle Dawson, carrier on Route 2, Charles transferred to his route, where he is now retiring from the Postal Service and is leaving a 68 mile route and fond memories of his patrons during the several years in the Postal Service.

Mr. and Mrs. Radford have been active members of both the City and Rural Letter Carriers Associations and the Ladies Auxiliaries and will continue meeting with them at their meetings, after settling in their new home at 13661 Second Street, Yucaipa, California.

Senior Citizens Say —

Old Time Campaigns Much More Exciting

The old-time political rallies and campaigns were brought to mind last Thursday when the "Y" Senior Citizens Group held its monthly meeting in the YMCA Lounge.

The torch light parades were remembered by everyone present and Ralph Story told of carrying one of the torches through Main Street. Mrs. Jennie Townsend recalled a Lowell parade in which one party used all white horses and the other used dark horses, making a very striking appearance.

Mrs. Chris Kropf said the political activity was high in the Alton-Moseley area with a Republican Rally being held at Alton Church, the only available meeting place large enough to hold the crowds. The Alton Swiss Band played for the event, the members of this band being Albert Thomet, Alfred Thomet, Chris Kropf, Charles Kropf, Albert Minger, Dan Stauffer, Jake Wittenbach and John Wittenbach. Their leader and teacher was John Miller whom some people will remember at the time he lived in the house located where the Ledger office now stands. Singing and yodeling with the band were Mrs. Fred Wittenbach, Mrs. Fred Geiger, Mrs. Chris Fahrni and Mrs. Sam Kropf. This was a very colorful group as they all dressed in the native Swiss costumes.

There was also an anecdote about little Johnny Andrews whose parents had taught him to say "Hurrah for William Alden Smith" and had him posted at the door of his church to greet Mr. Smith on his arrival. Although Johnny couldn't speak too plainly, he received a silver dollar from Mr. Smith for his enthusiasm.

Mrs. Andrews, mother of Mrs. Eva Engle of Moseley, was a school teacher and quite an artist. She drew a cartoon about Cleveland which was copied and printed on flags to be carried in the Lowell torch-light parade.

Mrs. Royce Ford remembered hearing that both the Republicans and the Democrats installed a flag pole at Alton but during election night, someone cut down the Republican pole and it wasn't until about 50 years later that the ring-leader of the gang that did the sawing, confessed to the act.

Due to lack of communication facilities such as we know them today, election news was slow in reaching some areas although Mrs. Kropf recalled the story of the Cleveland-Harrison bout when William Delaney, sr., rode his horse home from town late at night and shouted "Cleveland Won" in front of each house along the way.

Mr. Story heard Grover Cleveland speak from the back of a train at the Grand Trunk depot.

It was also reported that paying for votes was very prevalent in those days—some being paid with money, some with whiskey. During one election, local party leaders paid \$2 per vote—\$1 at the caucus before election and the other dollar if their ticket won. Of course, they won and people were lined up way down the street to collect the second dollar.

Getting victory snatched from their hands on the final play of the game, the Lowell YMCA Juniors High Flag Football team went down to a 13-12 defeat at the hands of Seymour Christian School of Grand Rapids.

Lowell scored on the opening kickoff on a 45-yard run-back by Mike McMahon to take a 6-0 lead. Seymour came back strong and scored on a flat pass and made the extra point to take a 7-6 first quarter lead. From this point on the game was dominated by Lowell and with less than three minutes remaining, Lowell scored in dramatic fashion on a power play over the left side from 15 yards out by Mike McMahon.

It looked as if Lowell had the game wrapped up when Bob Elzinga intercepted a pass with two minutes remaining but being unable to move the ball, Lowell was forced to punt. Seymour received the ball and immediately called time out, with two seconds remaining. Fading back, Seymour's quarterback threw a 40-yard pass for the game-winning touchdown. The Lowell Red Arrows rolled over Cedar Springs in an easy 27-0 victory Wednesday night. Cedar Springs will be in the new Tri-River league with Lowell next year.

The opening kickoff went to Cedar Springs and the Arrows then held them to two yards on the first series of downs. On only four plays after gaining possession of the ball Lowell scored their first touchdown as Dilly carried around the right end. Dilly also scored the extra point. The Arrows kicked to Cedar and this time held them to only six yards. After receiving Cedar's punt Lowell marched 52 yds. in eight plays for their second touchdown. After a scoreless second quarter the Arrows took the third quarter kickoff and on the first play from scrimmage fullback Larry Miller raced 65 yds. for a touchdown through a huge hole made by the right side of the Lowell line. Coch Pierce then substituted an entire new team "The Shockers" thus giving them valuable experience for next year. "The Shockers" played the entire second half after Lowell had scored on the first play. Lowell's final touchdown came in the last quarter as Ed Ridgeway took a pitchout from Dave Thaler and ran 36 yds. around the right end. Ridgeway also scored the extra point.

On 52 plays from scrimmage the Arrows gained 356 yards and 13 first downs. Cedar Springs gained only 73 yards and 4 first downs. Cedar Springs penetrated to the Lowell 25 yard line in the final minute of play after Lowell had controlled the ball for all except four plays in the last quarter.
