Lowell Chest Campaign 68.3% Of Its Goal

The United Community Fund drive in Lowell achieved 68.3 percent of its goal this week as co chairmen Rev. David Debbink, Dr. Herbert Mueller, both of the Lions Club, Wally Hook, Jr., and Roger Westenbroek, both of the Rotary Club, reported contributions totaling \$2,904.

Lowell's goal for the 1961 drive was \$4,248. Overall county goal was \$48,875, of which 64.2 percent or \$31,400 was reported at the last report meeting at Fountain Street church in Grand Rapids.

Other area drive figures are Cascade Township, Mrs. Campbell Steketee and Mrs. Duncan Littlefair, co-chairmen, raised \$1,800 on a quota of \$1,162 or 155 percent; Vergennes Township, Mrs. Robert Yates, chairman, raised \$813 on a quota of \$662, or 123 percent; Ada Township, Mrs. D. J. Denison, r. chairman raise quota of \$957, or 47 percent; and Caledonia Township, Dr. R. Steghuis of the Lions Club, chairman, raised \$328 on a quota of \$916



Stains on the carpet, cleaning fluid and death are a terrible tric but they sometimes go together The villain in this plot is carbon tetrachloride. Homemakers often reach for a bottle of this chemical -or for a solution which contains carbon tetrachloride-yet too often they fail to read the caution signs on the label. Jessie Marion, home furnishings

specialist at Michigan State University, says carbon tetrachloride owes its popularity and "safe" reputation to the fact that it is nonflamable. This advantage is counteracted by the fact that it can be toxic when the fumes are in haled or when it comes in direct contact with the skin. A vapor builds up very quickly, especially in a closed room, and can be come dangerous even before odor is noticeable. First reactions to exposure ma

be headache, mental confusion, nausea and loss of coordination or sense of balance. These symptoms may not appear until some time after contact, Prolonged use of carbon tetra chloride produces a high vapor concentration. This happens when a nomemaker gives her rug a vig orous cleaning, and may occur even when she is removing spots This high concentration of vapor

can cause major damage to th liver and result in death. The homemaker is not using armless liquid when she uncay bottle of carbon tetrachloride She is dealing with a potential killer and should treat it accordingly.




