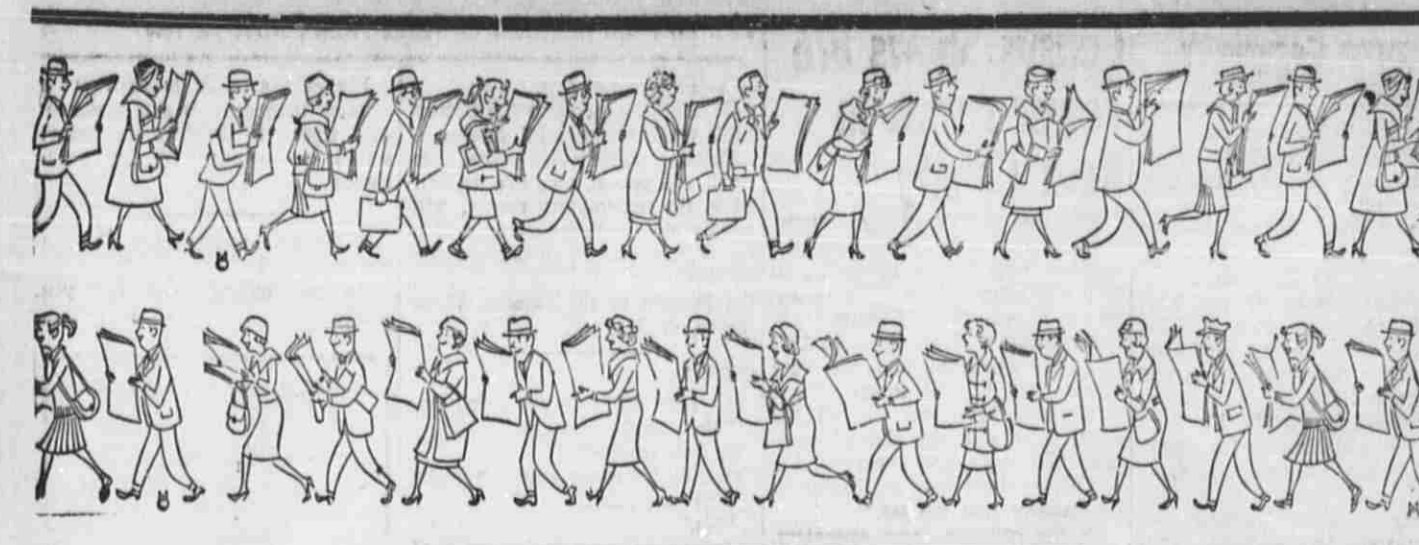

SOIL and WATER CONSERVATION

When Frank Monroe, S. C. S. State Forester visited the Kent Soil Conservation District, October 22, we visited the former Sealley wood lot in Grattan Twp., now owned by the Hessler Bros. We found several white oak with a diameter of 40 inches, ready to be cut. These are the largest white oak we have found in the District. Nearly thirty trees also of hickory, red oak, soft maple, black cherry and ash are ready to harvest.

At we take a woodland inventory with the owner we suggest certain trees to be cut if timber sized stock is found. The District Forester then can be called upon to assist with a timber cruise in trees to be selected for cutting. The cut timber can be sold to the mill operators or to a contractor for possible sale of standing timber or of cut logs. We find black cherry and some mature hard maple in many woodlots which varieties are in high demand. Generally they are taken out, beech, hickory, ash and elm in order to get the more valuable cherry and maple.

We found the best hard maple woodlot growth on the former Gayard-Hokomb farm in Bowen Twp., owned by Kenneth Henry & Sons for the past 5 years. While taking inventory of these woods with Bill Henry, who graduated from Caladonia High School last June, we found the tallest, straightest hard maple from seedling to pole size that we have noticed this year. Few trees here are large enough to harvest now, but here is a valuable hard maple stand which if thinned in the next fifteen to twenty years, will increase in value.

Bill leaves November 19th for six months in the Army. He plans to return to the farm. More than 40 acres of this farm now planted to wheat and in winter barley cover crop will be laid out in four strips because of sloping fields.

Stanley Milanowski has enlarged his present pit pond type irrigation pond in Cascade Twp. The first pond, dug on the edge of good muck was 35 feet by 55 feet by ten feet deep but did not have enough capacity. The new pond will be 60 feet by 80 feet. It is fed by a water shed of over 100 acres also by springs and seep from the surrounding land.

Ed Brumbach's new fish and wildlife pond in Ada Twp., on water part of the former Todd farm has an earthen dam 300 feet long and is fifteen feet wide at the top. The side slopes are 1:3 on the inside and 1:2 on the downside of the dam. Springs and seep are filling this half acre pond nicely. Depth of the pond will be more than 10 feet.

John Newberg, Sparta Twp. needed a structure with a metal outlet tube located in a valley outlet in his orchard. John ended up with a good spray pond plus his structure and 42 ft. long outlet tube. Some of his peach trees showed poor condition as the result of last year's drainage. Now his orchard has been completely drained. John's orchard has a good elevation with ideal air drainage. Erosion has been controlled by seeding fescue. Son, Dennis, was a FFA student at Kent City is now at Junior College. He expects to become a game biologist and wildlife specialist and will finish his studies at M. S. U.

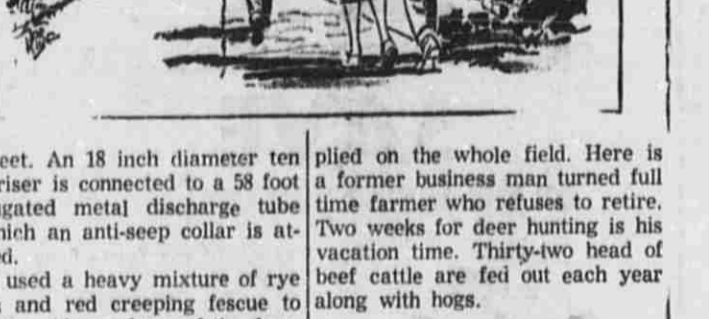

Shooting Preserves Guarantee Good Hunting

Shooting preserves are becoming more popular each year. Thank goodness. A shooting preserve, you know, is privately owned land on which game is released to provide sport for hunters. A fee is usually charged. Shooting preserves are just perfect for sportsmen, or sportswomen, who haven't time to spend long and perhaps wasted hours searching for unopened land. And they're ideal for initiating youngsters into the thrilling sport of hunting. The preserve guarantees good hunting, in the form of flying legal game.

This game is every bit as hard to hit as the wild variety, but that doesn't mean it can't be done—even by you and me! Lots of women are bagging pheasant, quail, chukar partridge and mallard at hunting preserves. And a few of the big game states allow them an extended season, and in some states there's no season limit at all.

Ed used a heavy mixture of ryegrass and red clover to feed the seed and sides of the dam, mulched heavily and fertilized with 12-24-12.

In cooperation with Merle Raber, of the Michigan Conservation Department, adapted wildlife trees and shrubs will be planted around the pond.

We had an interesting time when we assisted Claude L. Walton with a conservation plan for his 120 acre farm in Bowen Twp. He will use a corn, oats seeded, two years of alfalfa rotation followed by wheat. A green manure cover crop of ryegrass or field brome will be plowed under following corn and wheat. Our main suggestions were the increased use of cover crops and also of minimum tillage. The south fifteen acres of the farm which has a steep slope has been kept in permanent alfalfa-brome hay which is the best land use possible. Little if any erosion has occurred.

Claude likes to experiment with fertilizer treatments, especially in the corn. Next year he will compare a 5-20-20 analysis, no commercial fertilizer and a nitrogen supplement with barnyard manure applied to the whole field. 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Guide Book Available For Superior Road

Huntmen and sight-seers who intend to drive the newly completed Ontario Highway 17 along Lake Superior's northern shore can obtain a printed report containing complete description of driving conditions from Automobile Club of Michigan offices.

Auto Club travel director Harry N. Rogan and touring manager Jerry E. Fisher recently completed a logging trip along the new highway that affords for the first time a complete circle tour of Lake Superior.

Driving the Ontario highway has been made possible by completing a 165-mile stretch of highway from Agawa Bay to Marathon. The road is still not paved completely but it is passable throughout its 456-mile length from Sault Ste. Marie to Port Arthur, Ont.

Rogan reports, "Many have a false impression about road conditions on Ontario 17. They have assumed that it is paved in its entirety. There are still many stretches of rough gravel."

"The bush country of Canada offers little of scenic value. The beach drive around Batchewana Bay, the Falls of the Montreal River, the lake-studded countryside ringed by thick brush or deep forests and the many deep cuts through multi-colored rocks are the main attractions between Sault Ste. Marie and Marathon."

"From Marathon to Nipigon, the views of Lake Superior and its islands from overlooks of mountain proportions is the most scenic section of the route."

A circle tour of Lake Superior via Duluth, Minn., spans 1,150 miles and may be driven comfortably in four days. Accommodations on the Canadian side are scarce and generally rustic. Gasoline stations are at no point more than 60 miles apart and gas sells for 48 cents regular, 52 cents premium per Imperial gallon. (An Imperial gallon is 1.25 U. S. gallons.)
