The Steering Committee for the six Alto Area School Districts met Tuesday Jan. 10. The main order of business began with a report from Harold Metternick on the discussion between the executive committee and the Lowell School Board. The discussion covered the following points:

1. The proposal to annex cannot be worded to include the acceptance of the millage increase.  
2. All registered voters in the six districts may vote on the proposal to annex, but the question of the millage is open only to registered voters who are also property owners in their districts.  
3. All six districts must approve the annexation if it is to occur.

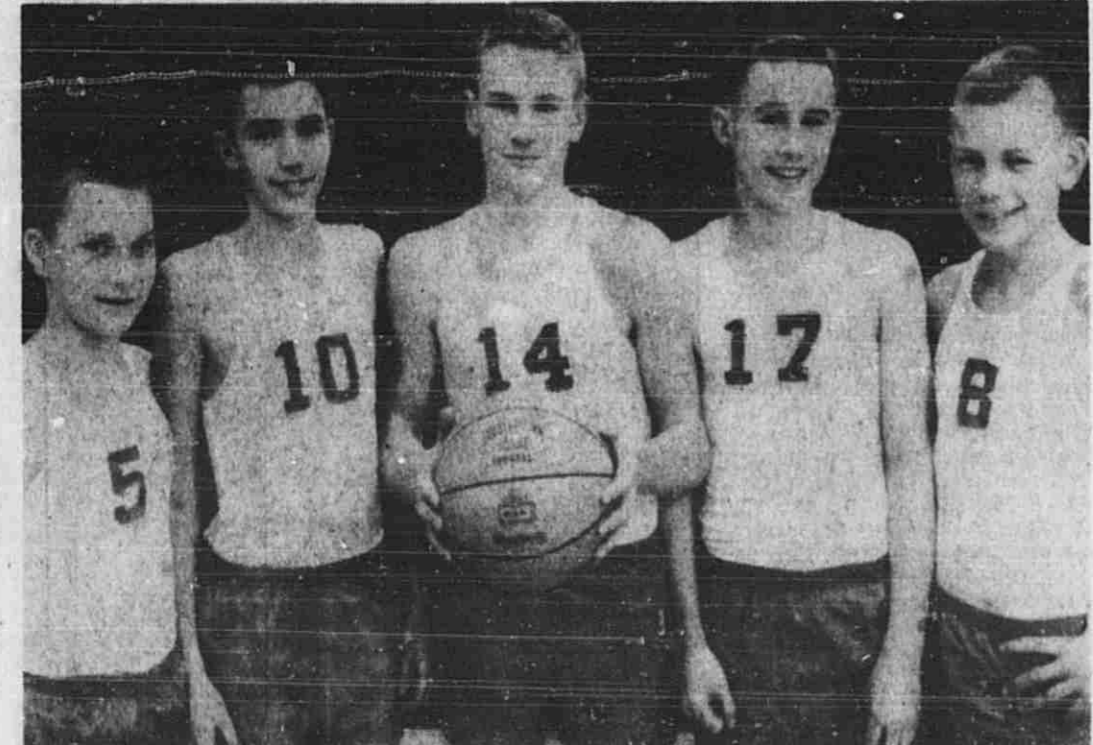

## TWO FROM THIS COMMUNITY GRADUATE FROM WESTERN

In four minutes of the third quarter these same boys scored 16 points. Every member of the seventh and eighth grade teams were given a chance to play in this game. The final score was Lowell 47, Comstock 16. Bob Elzinga led the scoring with 14 points, Paul Kropf was next with 13. The next game for these boys will be Friday, Jan. 27 when they play Sparta here at 3 p. m.

Joel Thurtell, Jerry Hartley and Lesley Foss shown in the front row, are among some 90 Lowell High School sophomores who are enjoying the fine new biology laboratory facilities completed this fall under the National Defense Education Act. The very modern furnishing, lighting and equipment are making this course, under the direction of Bob Perry, one of the most popular in the school.

Our courses of study in the Science field include General Science, Biology, Chemistry and Physics. At present these classes are serving 229 students. The area of greatest development at this time is Biology where the facilities, equipment and materials are extremely inadequate because of age, type and limited numbers. For example the desks were of the old stationary arm-chair type. The three microscopes that we had were outdated and would have been satisfactory for only limited use when repaired. Also no work or storage place was present. Under these conditions Biology has been a read-about and talk-about subject based primarily on demonstration. A very limited number of students have had access to scientific equipment under conditions that lend themselves to the learning of Science by doing.

**New Facilities Complete**  
The present facilities now provide each student to have his own work area at a laboratory table, ample room for experiments without encroaching upon the work space of his neighbor and flexibility of work space to provide multi-student activities.

Our three year plan is designed to include all phases of Science. We feel that we are the weakest in the Biology program and that is where the first emphasis was placed. These facilities also accommodate part of the General Science program. Mr. Perry has 90 students in the field of biology and 60 in the field of General Science.

**Biology Study Objectives**  
We feel that two of the basic objectives of our Science program are:

1. To encourage more students to study Science as a general preparation for life.  
2. To provide the best possible science teaching and classroom facilities for the young man or woman preparing for a Science career.

We feel the improved physical facilities will make possible the most intelligent and efficient use of both laboratory and discussion time and will provide for real student participation. The flexibility of the new facilities will provide opportunity for students to work individually or in small groups, involving them in stimulating laboratory experiences.

**Modern Equipment**  
The installation of electrical outlets will complete the physical equipment of the room. We have 6 new microscopes with electric illumination, also a micro projector which cast the images of slides on a mounted screen. This piece of equipment takes place of several extra microscopes.

Also installed in the room is a room-length work bench with storage space beneath its entire length. It also provides work space for experimentation and much needed storage space for equipment and materials.

The two student laboratory tables easily meet the demand for both discussion and laboratory periods. By adding the 6 new microscopes, microprojector, sets of biological and botanical charts, display cabinets, an incubator, also a 29 gallon aquarium, I feel we can enhance the learning process of the individual and the group. This Biology and General Science unit is truly a multi-purpose unit that will be a great asset in meeting the objectives of the Science phase of our curriculum.

We are also in the process of developing an 80 acre tract of land for extensive use as an outdoor laboratory for our Science Courses.
