Questions on New College Answered By Coordinator Dr. Chris DeYoung

Lowell Rotarians were brought the story of the new Grand Valley College to serve the eight county area of Kent, Muskegon, Ottawa, Montcalm, Barry, Ionia and Allegan by Dr. Chris DeYoung, coordinator, Wednesday noon. This noted educator spoke of the purpose, program, personnel, place, purse and progress that had been made toward establishing this 4-year college. He told the rotarians that a student body of some 5,000 was expected by 1970.

The Prologue, he said consisted of the development of the college from its inception by a group of interested citizens through the passage by the Michigan legislature of a bill stating that the college would be a state supported institution after it had obtained from private sources one million dollars, plus a site.

The Purposes of the new college is to help provide more opportunity for more students to go to college.

The Program of the college will be basically a four-year liberal arts program. The Personnel consists at present of a Board of Control, appointed by the Governor of the state with consent of the Senate. The Citizens Council has a membership of more than 100 persons from the eight-county area. At present, the only employees are a secretary and the coordinator. Professional consultants from state institutions are being loaned to the new college. Later on a president and staff will be selected.

The Place of the college is still undecided. A site committee has been appointed by the Board of Control. Preliminary general recommendations for the nature of the suitable site have been made by the team of educational consultants.

The Purse for the college is now being filled with voluntary contributions. Approximately \$600,000 has been raised. After a million dollars is raised and the site is obtained, it is expected that the State of Michigan will make annual grants to the college.

The Plant has not yet been designed, as the construction of the buildings must await the completion of the financial drive, the selection of a site, and state financial support.

The Progress to date has been very encouraging.

In concluding his final point on the possibilities, Dr. De Young said "The obstacles are great, but the goals are greater than the obstacles, and the opportunity is one of the greatest in the history of education in southern Michigan."

Statement of Recommendations
The eight consultants from other state colleges and universities, who submitted preliminary recommendations, approved "in principle" by the Board of Controls, which stated:

1. The college should be a four-year, degree-granting liberal art institution, to meet the needs of both commuting and residential students.

2. The Board should request private four-year colleges in the area, such as Calvin, Aquinas, and Hope, to appoint a representative to the consultants' group. James Ver Meulen, Grand Rapids industrialist and member of the Citizens' Council, was named as liaison man with these colleges.

3. The college should work closely with community or junior colleges to encourage them to continue their functions both in terminal and college transfer programs, and to avoid duplication of curricula.

4. Advanced study and adult education should be planned jointly with the colleges and universities currently offering extension programs.

5. The site should be chosen with several criteria in mind, including an area of not less than 600 acres, with at least a 200-300 acre plot of "buildable land." Dr. Raymond Hatch of Michigan State is meeting this week with the executive board of the site committee to begin work on site selection.

6. The Board should study qualifications for a president, and decide on the age, salary range, political considerations if any, and duties of the men considered.

SHERMAN MILES' RECOVER FROM ACCIDENT & SURGERY

Sherman Miles, Route 3, Lowell, is resting comfortably in Butterworth hospital in Grand Rapids after an accident which occurred last December 24 at work.

Mr. Miles sustained a crushed right heel requiring surgery and bone fusion. Mrs. Miles recently underwent surgery, and is staying with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph M. Avery, Sr., of Grand Rapids, where Mr. Miles will join her in a few days.

Later, Mr. Miles will return to the hospital and have a permanent cast put on.

ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS PERMITS SMALLER LOT SIZES

The Lowell Zoning Board of Appeals met Tuesday afternoon and allowed a variation of the zoning ordinance requiring 12,000 square feet in all lots platted in the city to George Hale who is dividing up part of his acreage.

He submitted for approval 19 lots which averaged 10,000 square feet. The board voted to permit this variation in this particular subdivision.

Man Hurt in M-91 Bridge Crash Early Saturday

James Major 25, of Saginaw, was taken to Blodgett hospital by ambulance early Saturday morning after he collapsed following the crash of a car he was driving on the M-91 bridge over Grand River. The other passenger in the car was Robert E. Duffy 39, of Traverse City, who was not injured.

The car skidded in the middle of the bridge, wedging itself between the two sides blocking traffic about 2:30 a. m. Major appeared alright after the accident but complained of head injuries. While being questioned by Officer Nels Francin, he collapsed unconscious.

Further investigation revealed that the men were driving a borrowed car which had tools in the trunk that could be used for burglaries. Both men had police records. Major was released from prison early in December, he told police. He had a gun but had thrown it in the river.

Major was sentenced to 30 days in jail in Justice Rittenger's court for reckless driving.

Gumsier, Hollis Marsh and Ralph Townsend. The only other elective office, that of justice of peace, had only one candidate, the incumbent City Justice Howard Rittenger.

Two Lowell Men Injured In Hill-Top Crash Sunday

Kenneth Morgan 46, and Gilbert Noyes 44, both of Lowell, were injured Sunday evening when they crashed into another car at a hill crest in Keene Township on Ware Road, 2 of a mile west of Hotchkiss Rd., about 7:45 p. m. Another passenger in the Morgan car, Roger Morgan 17, was not injured.

The accident occurred, the Ionia Post of the Michigan State Police reported, at the crest of a hill on a narrow road. The cars, meeting at the top, were unable to avoid the collision.

Driver of the east bound car was Howard Smith 42, Rte. 3 Hotchkiss Rd., who received only slight cuts on his face. Kenneth Morgan suffered broken bones in his foot and Noyes had severe lacerations of the face.

Violates Charter

Need Investigation
This newspaper proposes a complete investigation of the workings of the city by an independent citizens group who would look into the operation of Lowell under its new charter and make recommendations. Mayor Jones and the new and old council members alike would find it to their advantage to get an outside appraisal of the city operation.

Plans Begin For Summer Topical Fluoride Program in Lowell Area

The program will be made available to pre-schoolers, second, fifth, and eighth graders and to special cases referred by the family dentist. The charge for the cleansing and four applications will be \$3.00.

The topical application of sodium fluoride to newly erupted teeth will reduce new tooth decay by 40 percent in groups of children. In addition to these benefits the program offers a valuable dental experience with no discomfort involved and dental health education is given the child by the clinic personnel.

The entire procedure consists of four visits to the topical fluoride clinic, which will probably be located in the Lowell school. At the first visit the teeth are cleaned and the first application is given. An application of sodium fluoride consists of the teeth being isolated with cotton rolls; then the teeth are dried with compressed air and a 2 percent solution of sodium fluoride is applied to the teeth with cotton tip applicators. On the second, third, and fourth appointments the application of the sodium fluoride is repeated.

The children in these grades of the Lowell, St. Mary's, Alton, Bennett, McPherson, Moseley and Water Schools will be given a letter on or about February 1st. If the parents are interested, please sign the necessary form on the letter and return to the school as soon as possible so we may be able to begin our planning program.

Because Lowell has had fluorine in its water for four years, the pre-schoolers and 2nd grades of Lowell would receive no additional benefit from the treatments. However, the 5th and 8th grade students would receive some benefit from them.

Lowell Pharmacist Charles E. Brown Passes at 83

Lowell pharmacist, Charles E. Brown, passed away Thursday evening, January 19, at his home, 206 Broadway Street, at the age of 83. He was born March 9, 1877.

Rev. J. Marion DeVinney officiated at the funeral services conducted Monday afternoon at the Roth Funeral Home under the auspices of the Lowell Lodge No. 90 F & AM. Burial was made in Oakwood Cemetery.

In 1905, Mr. Brown received his certificate as a registered pharmacist, and operated a drug store in Alto. In the late 20's and early 30's he left the drug store business and became a traveling salesman, selling wallpaper and paint.

Twelve years ago he started working as a pharmacist at Christiansen Drug Store and retired two years ago, following a stroke.

In 1955 he was awarded a 50 year certificate and was honored for being one of the oldest practicing pharmacists in Michigan.

Mr. Brown is survived by his wife, the former Rose Kropp; and several cousins.
