

## Lowell College Sites Reviewed

This week a review team of Robert DeBrugn of Zeeland and David Almerigi of Grand Rapids, both members of the site committee of the Grand Valley College will visit Lowell and look over the site proposed here for the college.

The Lowell committee will host the men when they visit here on Thursday afternoon; they will be taken for a look at the site northeast of the city and also to an alternate site on the west edge of the city. The committee is being offered the following description and advantages of these two sites and of locating the college in Lowell in a prospectus worked up by the committee which we reproduce in part.

### Lowell Site Selection Report

The Lowell Board of Trade and other associated groups and interested organizations wish to present to your committee for consideration the two sites for the possible construction of the new Grand Valley College, Site No. 1 will be known as the Lowell Community Site, Site No. 2 the Lundberg Site.

**SITE NO. 1—Lowell Community Site.**

- (1) An acreage of approximately 516 acres of which more than 300 acres is buildable land.
- (2) The site is approximately 1 1/2 miles by 1/2 of a mile with a river frontage of approximately 3/4 mile.
- (3) Michigan Highway M-91 borders the property on the North. A city street is accessible to the property on the South. There is a good dirt road from the East.
- (4) As stated before, one of the boundaries is the Flat River. The other one is M-91.
- (5) In regard to utilities, water, lights, gas and sewer are to the South boundaries and Consumers Power with their present extension policies can extend the gas to any part of the site as needed.
- (6) Surface water drainage according to the Conservation Department is excellent.
- (7) The natural boundaries of the site are typical Michigan country, which includes a pine forest and oak forest. Part of it is hilly and you also have a beautiful view overlooking the Flat River. See slides accompanying this report as noted on map.
- (8) The present site is located within an area that is not near any dwellings whatsoever.
- (9) While the present center of population of this area may be West of this proposed site, it is conceivable that population growth will follow such projects as the new airport which is only seven

The number of land owners in this area is 12 individual land owners.

The Conservation Department has been contacted and expressed the opinion that an exchange of land is possible for the same value and acreage. Also some of the property owners have been contacted expressing favorable interest, but no agreements have been drawn up.

Estimate cost is approximately \$110,000.

**SITE NO. 2—Lundberg Site—Attached map.**

- (1) The site includes a total acreage of 471.5 acres all of which is buildable land.
- (2) The site again is approximately square. The land is relatively flat thereby enabling fast construction with a minimum amount of preparation.
- (3) Highway M-21 goes right through the site, East and West. The state also has under consideration the relocation of M-91 to run along the West boundary of this site, therefore, connecting it to Interstate 96. There are presently two other roads, one on the West and one on the North of the site, with the city itself on the East.
- (4) Again the utilities include, lights, water, sewer, and gas are up to or on the site at the present time.
- (5) The water drainage is good.
- (6) The beauty of the site. It is surrounded on the North by a crest of hills and on the South by the Grand River.
- (7) At present this area is partially settled with various businesses and residents. Ranging from motels to churches.
- (8) While the present center of population of this area may be West of this proposed site, it is conceivable that population growth will follow such projects as the new airport which is only seven miles from the proposed location.
- (9) The number of individual land owners on this site is 28.

### Why Lowell

The Lowell Board of Trade and associated groups, feel that this area is appropriate for the new college for the following reasons. In Lowell at the present time there are five active service groups of which there are many active business and professional people.

The school system in Lowell consists of a modern High School with two new elementary buildings, one a parochial school.

There are six churches of many denominations.

The recreation facilities are many and very diversified.

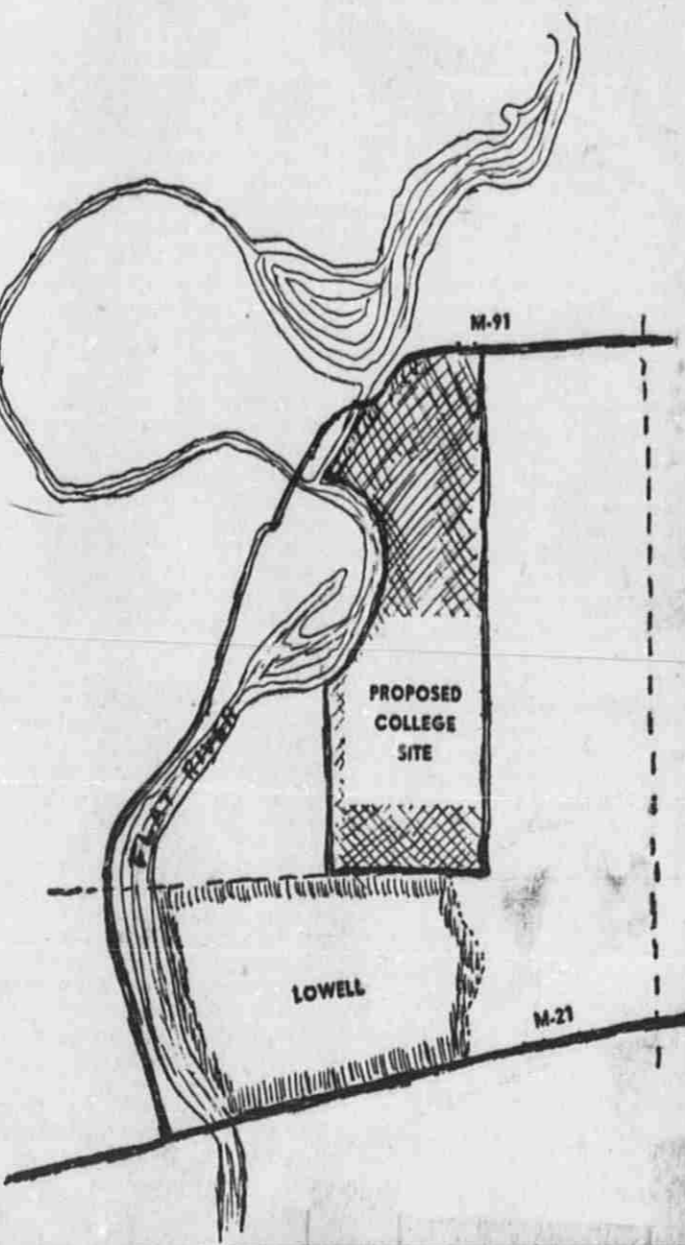
We have a new swimming pool and field house. A 4-H fair ground which is the largest in the state, consists of many buildings. A large recreational area for such sports as tennis, track, baseball, softball, and football, or for golf driving range. There is also an indoor ice skating rink in one of the 4-H buildings, and there is a new golf course being constructed within two miles of the proposed site. There is also a theater, bowling alley and roller skating rink and community building.

From the two proposed sites and within a radius of ten miles, there are two county parks, approximately five lakes which can be used for swimming, fishing, or boating. Adjacent to the Lowell Community Site both to the North and to the West boundaries we have a Lowell pond consisting of approximately 300 acres and the Flat River. These facilities at present are used for water skiing, canoeing, swimming, fishing, and sailing.

Last year the YMCA established a center in Lowell to provide additional instructional and recreational facilities which was provided by a \$550,000 legacy. They are currently contemplating the erection of a service building and if the college should be located on one of the sites proposed, they will in addition erect a residential building so that facilities would be similar to those in Grand Rapids.

Lowell will become the recipient of another legacy of a minimum of two million dollars of which the accumulated income could be utilized for any possible use within the city of Lowell at the discretion of the Advisory Board.

In addition to the above, there is a legacy known as the Lee Fund which is for recreational purposes. This fund was originally \$60,000 and has grown to the value of something over \$100,000. This money is all invested in good dividend paying securities and over a period of years has furnished over \$100,000 of recreational services in Lowell.
