Have you noticed the letters. IQF. . . on some of the polyethylene packages in the frozen food chests? IQF means Individual Quick Freezing, a modern freezing techique for vegetables and fruits, says Virginia Helt, Michigan State University Food Marketing Agent for Grand Rapids area. As its name ndicates, this method consists of freezing every green pea, green bean, corn kernel and strawberry individually instead of the conventional block freezing system. The frozen units of fruits and vegetables are then packed in polyethylene bags.

There are some advantages to IQF because it does mean that vegetables can be packaged in the larger size bags. . . and this is usually less costly to the consumer the fact that you can take what you need without fuss out The VFW Senior Citizens Party and put the remainder back into the freezer.
