Buy Rural Lines

Consumers Power Co. offered to purchase the north rural lines for total price of \$50,000; this includes some 65 miles of lines that serve over 500 customers in Vergennes, Keene and Grattan Townships. These lines had gross earnings in the past year of slightly over \$50,000, but need over \$200,-000 worth of work in rebuilding the lines. To make the most profit and to keep within the 25 percent of earnings required by the state law the engineers recommended they be sold.

Power Purchase Contract Consumers Power also brought several proposals to the city to furnish all the power except for what could be produced by the hydro plant on Flat River. Their proposals offered five ways that Lowell could hook up to Consumers lines at the Attwood Plant. These are under investigation by the engineers. Included were ways the Attwood load could be turned over to the Lowell utility, but Conit might cost the city money to take over this load.

As the disc moves over the surface of floors, wall, etc., it motivates the meter which records in feet the distance measured. 

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
