## Lowell Assessment Praised

The Kent Bureau of Equalization pointed to Lowell as the blue chip example for proper assessing in Kent County; the city was the only government unit that was not penalized for too low assessing program in the report released Tuesday. Lowell with a total assessment of \$6,556,700 is slightly over the county equalized figure of \$6,541,830 which gives Lowell a credit of .22679 when billing taxes.

Harold Linn, director of the Equalization Bureau found that the job of assessing in the City of Lowell met State and county standards and for the first time Lowell is in an envious position of being near perfect in property assessment.

This means when taxes are assessed to each property owner they will pay only the exact amount shown in millage, that is if we are raising \$5.00 on each \$1,000 of tax assessment that is what will appear on the tax bill, in fact Lowell will have a small credit.

## Lowell Pioneer Recalls Events

Mrs. Ethel Graham Conolly, 19 Enwood Street, Battle Creek, formerly Lowell resident, was recently honored in that city for the part she plays in community activities at the age of 80.

Mrs. Conolly, who has been confined to a wheel chair for 15 years, lets neither age nor infirmity prevent her from making her presence known in the community.

She was born October 4, 1880, in Lowell Township, the daughter of Florence Jane Scribner and Thomas Robert Graham. She graduated from Lowell High School at the age of 15 and taught school for two years. After enrolling in a commercial and banking course at Ferris Institute, she graduated in 1902.

Mrs. Conolly writes, "I can remember Seggun when it was a busy village and the depot was on the south side of the tracks. The Indians told us children that Seggun meant 'Beautiful River'. At one time there was a church, hotel, stores and a school (called South Ward). But as Lowell began to boom Seggun seemed to fade out.

How well I remember the band concerts on Island Park and how they took the walks down in the fall and put them up again after the spring floods. Also the log jams coming down Flat River, the saw mills and the woolen mills."

The present library building on the corner of Main Street and Hudson was donated to the village of Lowell by Mrs. Conolly's uncle, R. W. Graham.

Her father who was a builder and something of an early-day architect, constructed a lot of the buildings in the Lowell area.

Mrs. Conolly is to be congratulated on her part in community affairs and her ability to remember so well, the past.

### Maple Products Law is Strict

foods and standards division headed by J. L. Littlefield.

Laws not only cover minimum sanitary requirements, but also provide for proper labeling and require the finished syrup to weigh at least 16 pounds a gallon, the legal standard for maple syrup. Adulteration of the product, also is prohibited.

To be legally offered for sale, Mr. Littlefield explained, pure maple syrup must not contain beet or cane sugar, glucose or any other foreign substance. It must be clean, free from fermentation, and also free from damage caused by scorching, bunniness or objectionable odor. It must possess a characteristic maple flavor, Mr. Littlefield said.

"Any product failing to meet these requirements must be properly labeled as an imitation and bear a declaration of the percentage in which beet or cane sugar, glucose or any other foreign substance enters into its composition," Mr. Littlefield states.

Requirements apply to any such products regardless of the state in which they may originate.

### SOIL and WATER CONSERVATION Mackinac Island Retains Its Past

It is said that ghosts of four peoples—French, British, American and those Early Americans—congregate on high bluffs of Mackinac Island.

Visitors to the stacks some times claim to hear spectral voices chanting of ancient battles. A more practical soul might hold that the visitors are merely affected by the island-timelessness of Mackinac Island—whose silences have yet to be split by the roar of the automobile.

Mackinac Island is a charming and picturesque place for any tourist, and a delight to the person with a sense of history, says historian F. Clever Bald, director of The University of Michigan Historic Sites.

"Here is a portion of America preserved as it was in the early days," Professor Bald points out. "The clop of horse hooves grating on the air. The visitor steps gratefully into a carriage after a boat ride that has cut him off from the traffic, the speed and hectic pace of civilization."

Historian Bald commends the work done in recent years by the Mackinac Island State Park Commission under the direction of Stewart Woodfill, Dr. Eugene T.

Peterson, U-M graduate appointed Museum director in 1958, has done "a magnificent job" with the collection of historical items, he adds.

Some 17,000 visitors last year walked among the wooden stacks and blockhouses where mainline and auxiliary British uniforms stand the watch. The Museum preserves a long military heritage: the fer was built by the French in 1712, originally at Mackinac Island near the approach to the magnificent new Mackinac Bridge.
