Time for Action by Council is Now!

The time is right now for the new city council to put the opera tion of the city on an efficient economical basis. Monday the proposed budget for 1961-62 fiscal year was presented to the council; in the tentative stage it called for an increase of property taxes nearly \$20,000 over the last full year of operation as a village in 1959

It was our understanding that as a city we could operate more efficiently and make real savings. Now is the time for the council to start making those savings. They have it in their power to allocate the money and change salaries as they deem necessary.

It might be pointed out that generally salaries are up from the last full fiscal year as a village but in one department the difference is out of line. The administration of the city now costs far more than we feel necessary. Lowell needs two administrative officers, a manager at \$7,200 and a clerk at \$4,680, like a dog needs two heads. The last year as a village the clerk received \$3,754, or nearly a thousand dollars less than proposed this year. The manager's position is a new one. Most cities the size of Lowell have a manager-clerk combination or in some cities just a clerk who acts as manager; but not both. In addition to these salaries there is included \$650.00 for clerical help which is for treasurer's work.

The capital expenditure outlay planned in the budget of \$28,850 also will need careful attention. While some new equipment is needed, other work could be contracted and save buying the heavy machinery. It might be pointed out that this capital expenditure does not include any street black-topping during the coming year, which will not be well received by citizens who have patientlyand some not so patiently- waited to have their street hard surfaced.

The important point is that right now the council has a chance to cut the fat out of operating the ctiy and save the taxpayers money.


How to Brain-Wash a Church
