



Treat Fresh Hams Like Pork Roasts

Fresh hams are cooked like pork roast, says Virginia Helt Michigan State University Food Marketing Agent for Grand Rapids area. For the 10 to 12 pound fresh ham, allow 30 to 35 minutes per pound. If the ham weighs less allow more minutes per pound for cooking. A 4 to 6 pound fresh ham needs around 40 to 45 minutes per pound cooking. Cook in a 350 degree oven. Needs no cover or basting during cooking.

Fresh ham, like all all fresh pork, is ready to eat when it is thoroughly cooked. This means that the pork will lose its pink color. Pink colored pork is not done and should not be served.

Today, some food markets have fresh hams in the meat counter. Ham has about 63 per cent lean Boston butt 84 per cent and a pic nic shoulder 61 per cent lean From one pound of ham, expect 2 to 3 average servings, Picnic shoulder gives about 2 servings
