Question of Extending Services For New Development Made by Townsend

Assuming that it is for the express purpose of making a profit, that individuals or companies enter into real estate speculation, promotion, and development; we feel that in spite of any precedent to the contrary, that they are not justified in asking nor expecting any subsidy from the City or the taxpayers, in the nature of sewer and water extensions, nor surface water disposal.

We feel that since the City taxpayers do not participate in the profits of such a development, that they should not be expected to participate in the costs and the hazards of such a promotion. Since the citizens and taxpayers of Lowell have been taxed and have paid and are still paying on their own sewer and water facilities. We feel that it is no more than right that the future citizens and homeowners, in the anticipated developments, should likewise assume their own share of the costs of the utilities, and the cost of the extensions to our existing water and sewer mains.

By permitting the development company to connect to our existing sewer and water facilities, the taxpayers of Lowell will be assuming the responsibility of supplying the newly developed area with a greater volume of water, than our present wells and equipment will produce, necessitating the installation of new wells and pumping equipment. Also as the new dwellings develop, we will be faced with the necessity of a new and expensive sewage disposal plant, perhaps at a cost of upwards of a million dollars estimate.

It would seem that this anticipated cost to the taxpayers of Lowell, in furnishing and maintaining the present and future utilities, would more than compensate for any advantages that the development company might ultimately bring to the City of Lowell. There is as yet no assurance that we will immediately realize any considerable amount of revenue, from the anticipated taxpayers of the proposed new housing development. This remains yet to be seen.

Lowell should enact an ordinance, indicating that all Real Estate, Speculators, Promoters, and land developers, should develop their properties entirely at their own risk and expense. The cost of such utilities and extensions to be derived solely from the sale of the developed properties, to the ultimate home owner and future taxpayer, who would there by automatically shoulder his share of the utilities cost, rather than to ask the present Lowell City taxpayer to underwrite \$16,000.00 of the development company's anticipated profit. This would constitute a subsidy for the development company at the Lowell taxpayers' expense.

A proposal has been made to the city council suggesting that a ten inch water main be installed on the first street running north and south on the Lowell Development Company's proposed New Housing Development, west of Walter's Lumber Mart. This water main would serve both the new housing development area and the existing houses East of the Lowell Development Company.

Harold Metternick Wins School Post

Harold Metternick, former Alto school board head, was elected to the Lowell Area School board on Monday. A total of 256 votes cast at the polls, with Metternick receiving 164 and incumbent Francis Campau receiving 92.

Campau, who has served on the Lowell board since 1958, has represented the southern rural area and was head of his rural school board before joining the Lowell schools.

Following the election, the board reorganized, electing Gerald Rollins, president; Dr. Thomas Hill, secretary; and David Coons, treasurer. Meeting dates will continue to be held on the first Monday of the month at 7:30 p. m. in the high school.

Approve Plans For Track
The Lowell school board at their meeting Monday evening approved plans for a quarter-mile running track which will circle the present football field and will have a 8-lane, 220-yard straight-away along the east side of the field.

Plans for the track have been drawn by Williams and Works, Grand Rapids engineers, and bids will be taken as soon as possible. It is expected to take about 5 weeks to construct the cinder running track.

Ware School To Vote

Mrs. Doris Boyd, secretary of the Ware school, appeared at the school board meeting and revealed that a vote Monday by families of the district showed that 23 families wanted to join the Lowell district and 18 the Saranac district. Approval was given by the Lowell board to hold a vote in the district.

Sweet school will vote again late in August on joining the Lowell Area Schools.

A letter from Waters school requesting permission to join the Lowell district was read to the board and action on their request will be taken after further investigation by Superintendent Nisbet.

The school board also voted to borrow \$40,000 on their anticipated school aid monies; this will pay off the balance on a loan taken last year for \$65,000 and provide enough money to pay bills till the next state money is available.

Lowell Pistol Club Hold First Meet on New Flat River Range

The first practice match was held on July 9 on Lowell's new 21-point pistol range built by the club members located at the Boy Scout property on North Washington Street.

Shooters came from Ionia, Muskegon, Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo, Lansing and Lowell to participate in the 1200 point match. Courses of fire were 22 cal., 20 shots slow fire, 20 shots timed fire, and 20 shots rapid fire; Center fire, 30 shot National Match Course; and .45 cal. 30 shot National Match Course; and the total Grand Aggregate.

Match and Master Class winner was Sam Johnston, Grand Rapids, with 1109-25X. Expert Class winner was Dave Seidelman, Ionia, with 1080-17X. Sharpshooter Class winner was Phil Schneider, Lowell, with 1033-15X.

Other Lowell shooters who placed high in the match were Phil Johnson who won the 22 cal. Aggregate with 547-11X, in the Marksmanship Class. Tildon Pinckney in the Unclassified class won the 22 Cal. Aggregate with a 360-2X.

Richard Craft, Unclassified, won the 38 Cal. and 45 Cal. National Match Courses with 227-4X and 187-1X respectively. Richard Scherlitzauer, Sharpshooter class, won the 38 Cal. and 45 Cal. National Match Course with 256-4X and 251-3X respectively.

Three approved matches are scheduled for this year, one in July, August and September with a total aggregate of 1800 points each match. Spectators and shooters are welcome at each match. Food and refreshments are available at the range.

A new ski-jump for the Charles Sligh water-skiing group is being constructed under the supervision of Roger Bieri. Among those busy on the building project are L. C. Wittenbach and Barry Boyer. The new jump, which will be mounted on wheels to permit easy removal from the river after the show, is designed to include built-in water works which will keep the surface wet for the skiers.

Did you know that the first Interlocutor's chair, used on the first Showboat in 1932, reposes in the Ledger office where it is considered very comfortable by all visiting seat-warmers? Rumor has it that the chair was returned accidentally to the Ledger after the first boat was dismantled, and the rightful owners never picked it up. After thirty years we feel the solidly-constructed chair is now legally ours through squatter's rights!

Actually, the first captain's chair should probably be given a place of honor in the much talked-about but never-realized Showboat Museum. Such a museum would be a worthy project for some civic-minded community group. Showboat models, programs, early pictures, newspaper clippings, and other memorabilia, all of which are becoming increasingly difficult to obtain, should be collected and housed in a permanent collection which would be of interest to year-round tourists in this area as well as to Showboat visitors.

The first Lowell Showboat, built in 1932, was 60 feet from stern to stern, had a 20-ft. beam, and was graced by two decks, twin smokestacks, two 2-cylinder motors, a real mahogany steering wheel, as well as stern paddles. She had the usual signal bells and a big brass whistle. A total of 75 large air-tight oil drums were used in her bottom to help support, in addition to her crew, a cast of 40 or more and a band of 20 pieces. It was estimated that the first boat carried a weight of nearly 10 tons.
