It would seem that this anticipated cost to the taxpayers of Lowin furnishing and maintaining the present and future utilities, would more than compensate for any advantages that the development company might ultimately bring to the City of Lowe?? There is as yet no assurance that we will immediately realize any considerable amount of revenue, from the anticipated taxpayers of the proposed new housing development. This remains yet to be



In addition to being a financial success the work farm did a job of rehabilitation for many alcoholics and derelicts who were the habitual tenants of the jail. Welsh later went to the legislature and had a law enacted that provides for the establishment of work farms by counties. It will be under this law that Sheriff Pigorsh will operate.
