Bids were received from Rieth-Riley Construction Co. of Grand Rapids for a track with rubberasphalt surface for \$30,160.50; the other bid was from Velting Construction Co. of Grand Rapids. Their bid on a rubber-asphalt track was \$30,239.40 and for cinder surface, \$22,577.60. The cinder track was estimated by Williams & Works, engineers for the job, to cost in the neighborhood of \$16,-






