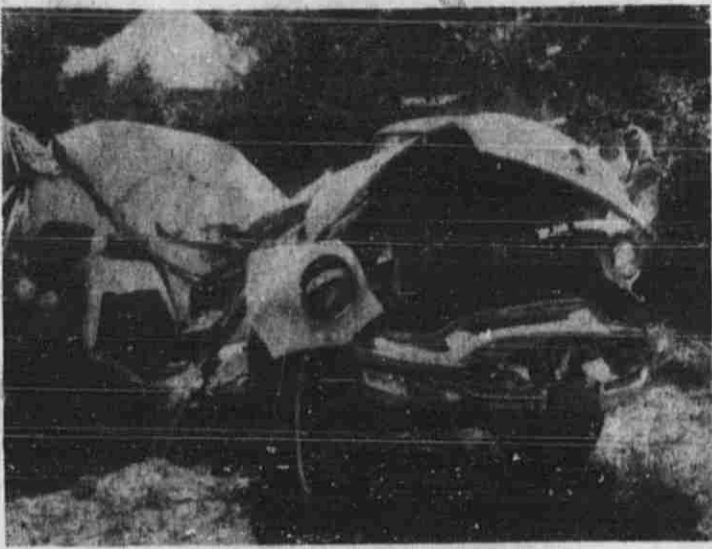

## Gerald Lee Dalstra Killed in Crash



The crumpled hulk of the car that carried 23-year-old Gerald Lee Dalstra to his death early Sunday morning attracted awed passers-by Monday as it rested in the back lot of the West Side garage. Wrecking crews, who claimed that the mangled vehicle was one of the worst they had ever called to remove, worked almost three hours to release Dalstra's body from the wreckage which lay wrapped around a tree on Grand River Drive four miles west of M-91. Dalstra was alone in the car at the time of the crash.

Dalstra died at 4 a. m. Sunday morning when his 1956 Oldsmobile hardtop went off the road on a curve and struck the large tree 2,000 feet west of 10800 Grand River Drive.

A companion in another car, Charles Russell Ritter, Jr., 21, of 611 Monroe Street, Lowell, who was following the Dalstra vehicle, told Kent County deputies they were traveling west at 85 miles an hour.

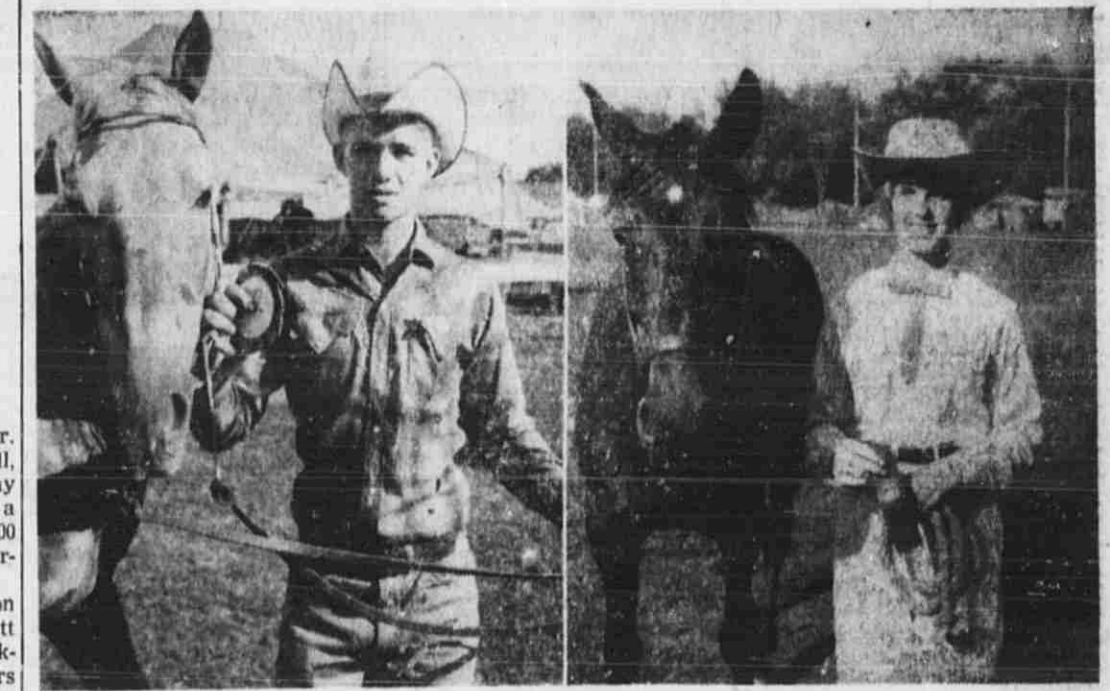

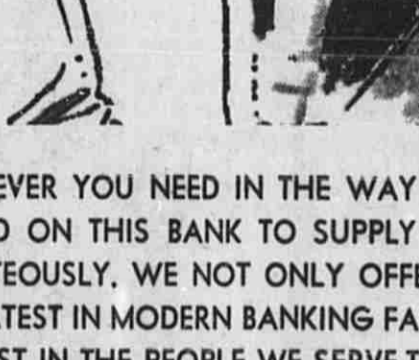
