Gerald Lee Dalstra Killed in Crash



The crumpled hulk of the car that carried 23-year-old Gerald Lee Dalstra to his death early Sunday morning attracted awed passers by Monday as it rested in the back lot of the West Side garage. Wrecking crews, who claimed that the mangled vehicle was one of the worst they had ever been called to remove, worked almost three hours to release Dalstra's body from the wreckage which lay wrapped around a tree on Grand River Drive four miles west of M.91. Dalstra was alone in the car at the time of the crash.


