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## Alto Student Teacher Learns Methods in Classroom Experience

One of the most essential phases in preparing new teachers is now in progress for the fall semester at Western Michigan University, with more than 200 students from the School of Education being placed in Southwestern Michigan classrooms.

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## Give Final Approval to New Subdivision; Settlement With Lowell Twp. Completed

The city council Monday night accepted the final agreement with the Lowell Development Company to let contracts for bringing city water and sewer service to the plat line and to allow the developers to get at least two houses under construction. The city will pay a limit of \$19,000.00 to bring the services to the plat, oversize the water main through the plat for a hook-up with the east side mains. The city will also pay one half of the cost of an open drain to the river from the area for storm and surface water. This drain will go under M-21 through a 42 inch tile and under Bowes Road across the gravel company.

Howard Gostnell appeared before the meeting representing the Airport Association and reported that 59 Lowell business and professional people had replied to the Airport Association's questionnaire regarding use of the airport. Twenty-one of those replying said that they would be willing to participate in making improvements to the airport. Mr. Gostnell said that the association expects to have the airport licensed by spring with gas, water, rest rooms and an office at the airport. The group expects to erect a large storage hanger for several airplanes and may have some T hangers built by individuals this coming year. Further improvements will have to come as use of the airport is developed.

Special Meeting on Sale of Lines

There will be a special council meeting at noon on Monday, November 27, to vote on approving the bid of Consumers Power Co. for the north rural lines and setting a date for a city-wide election on the proposal. Attorney VanderVeen said it would work out to hold this vote about January 10, 1962.
