

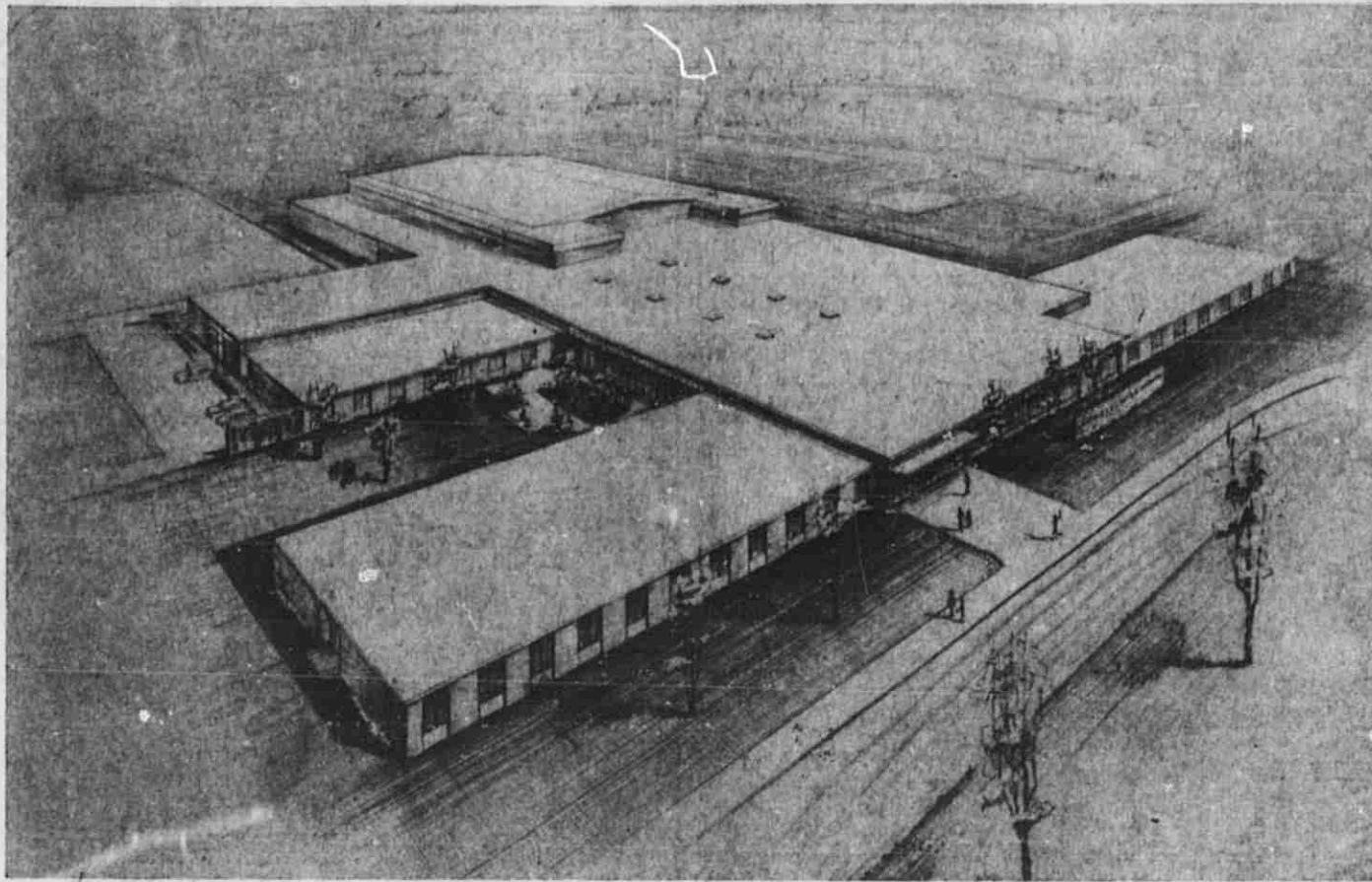

## Select Site for New High School



The Board of Education of the Lowell Area Schools announced at their regular meeting Monday evening their intent of purchasing the property belonging to Mr. Al Blaser as the site of the proposed high school. It is located on Foreman St., just off Lincoln Lake Ave., with Beach Street coming to a dead end on the property. The property extends to the south to the line of trees between Howard and Elizabeth Streets.

### The Superintendent's Corner

The Board of Education's announcement of the Blaser Site as the location of the proposed high school completes the preliminary planning of the school and the bond issue. Articles in this paper have explained the cost of the building and the amount of cooperative planning between the faculty, architect and the school board. Close association has been made with the Rockford school to arrive at a workable school plan. I realize that this proposal has caused much comment in the school district as it justly should. The election on March 26, will be an important decision for the members of the district to make.

Located elsewhere in this paper is a picture of the school. Next week another picture, showing the floor plan, will be presented. I want to remind you again of the Senior High Parents' night on March 19. This night the parents will go through a brief schedule which their child goes through each day. We hope all parents of Senior High students will take advantage of this program. This, and the Parent-Teacher conferences, scheduled for this Thursday and Friday afternoon and Monday and Friday evenings will replace the usual March Open House.

Also repeating the dates of March 22, Open Forum on the high school issue at the Alto Grange and on

March 23rd the Open Forum at the Runciman Building. I am attempting to secure a date and meeting place for those in the River, McCabe, Chase and Cannonsburg area. I will announce this next week and send notices with the school children of that area.

**Provide TV For School**  
Some have noticed a TV antenna on top of the All-Purpose room and wondered what it is doing there. One of the stations attempting to obtain the Channel 13 franchise has loaned and installed, free of charge, a 23-in. television set. This set is a VHF set with a UHF adapter, to reach channels 72 and 76. These channels are operated by MPACT as the Midwest Flying Classrooms. Whether we can successfully receive these programs has not been determined; presently the reception is not good enough to use. With some adjustment, channel 10 could possibly be received.

While we are not ready nor able to invest money in this program, we accepted this free offer with interest. Your administrator and faculty have attended classroom TV meetings in order to be informed. We hope, if this works, to try out this programming at no cost to us.

### Council Rejects Health Dept. Agreement

An agreement submitted by the State Health Department setting forth the conditions under which construction permit for extension of sewer service into the Valley Vista sub-division plat would be issued was rejected by the city council Monday night.

The council rejected the agreement on advice of city attorney Richard VanderVeen who pointed out that the agreement carried an admission by the city to operating an inadequate sanitation system, and to polluting the river. This, VanderVeen pointed out, has not been established by adequate tests; and the city could never sign such an admission unless it could be established beyond the shadow of a doubt.

Other points in the agreement did not draw any fire from the attorney or the council; they called for submission of plans for a new sanitation system by June 1, 1963 and completion by September 1, 1964.

**Vote For Four Councilmen**  
Councilman Walter Gumsier changed the date of his resignation from the council again Monday night, the new date accepted by the council being March 31.

This new date in the opinion of the city attorney, will mean that four councilmen will be elected at the city election on April 2. Running for the council are: Robert Crouch, Hollis Marsh, Arnold Wittenbach, Richard Schieritzauer, and Daniel Treleven. Voters will vote for four councilmen; the top two vote-getters will receive two year terms; third high will get a one year term and the fourth high will fill out the unexpired term of Walter Gumsier which ends in April 1963.

Dr. Harold Myers and Charles Doyle have indicated that they will run on stickers in the April 2 election.

**Purchase New Equipment**  
The city council authorized the purchase of a new truck for the sanitation department from the low bidder, Wittenbach Sales and Service Co., who offered the city an International Truck for \$3,587.30, and the old truck.

City Manager Olson was also given permission to buy a ten-year-old street sweeper from Kent County Road Commission for \$1,500 and our old sweeper. The 1952 3 yd. sweeper is in very good condition, Olson stated, and will pay for itself in three or four years of service to the city. He also stated that the Kent County Road Commission had told him that they would be unable to sweep the city under contract in 1962 because of other work.

Other scores are Lowell 67, Godwin 54, Rockford 48, Belding 43, Allegan 39, Cedar Springs 29, Greenville 22, Sparta 21, Nashville 14, Wyoming Park 13, Zeeland 11, Comstock Park 4, Ravenna 1, and Rogers 0.

The Lowell team had no first place winners. Second place winners for the Arrows were Mike Foss (112) and Tom Bigelow (130). Jeff Bonn (120) and Phil Sanders (165) received third places for the Arrows. Those receiving fourth place for Lowell were Junior Boes (138), Charlie Kyser (145) and Roger Depew (H. W.).

### Fire Chiefs Attend Meet

Frank Baker and C. J. Geldersma of the Lowell and Kent County Volunteer Fire Departments attended the 34th annual Fire Department Instructors Conference in the municipal auditorium at Memphis, Tennessee, participating in a four day discussion of latest methods of fire prevention and fire fighting.

On this year's Conference program were such subjects as fighting gasoline bulk tank fires, super-market fire prevention and control, and problems relating to fire department organization and management. Among other subjects, the Conference discussed planning for safety in industrial plants and how fires can occur in coin operated laundry and dry cleaning establishments.

Also, a number of outdoor demonstrations of fire fighting methods and equipment were held, including an actual demonstration of an underwater rescue of a victim in a submerged automobile.

More than 3500 persons from 48 states, Canada and several foreign countries were registered at this international fire service gathering. The Conference is attended by key fire department officers, educators from colleges and universities, fire and industrial plant protection engineers and public officials, all who participate only on invitation of the two Conference sponsors, Fire Prevention Department of Western Actuarial Bureau, Chicago, and the Memphis Fire Department.

Lewis S. Clark, aged 79 of 9371 Cascade Road, passed away Sunday, March 4, after a long illness.

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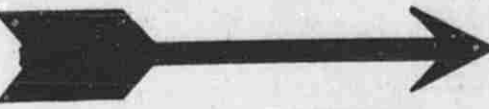

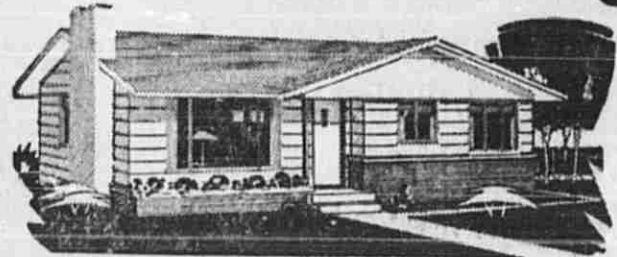

The largest voluntary, non-sectarian girls' organization in the world—Girl Scouts of the U. S. A.—is celebrating its 50th birthday. More than 18 million girls have found fun and friendship in Girl Scouts since it was started on Mar. 12, 1912, in Savannah, Georgia. Troop activities are carried out by girls in every state, U. S. possessions, and by American girls living on military installations in 49 countries.

This informal educational movement is dedicated to the purpose of inspiring girls with the highest ideals of character, patriotism and service. The concept of service to others is basic to Scouting, and girls are encouraged to develop skills to serve the community as well as themselves and their families. The program includes opportunities for girls from 7 through 17 to develop a variety of skills in homemaking, creative arts, outdoor life and citizenship.

Girl Scouting is an international movement with counterparts in 50 other countries. Large international encampments are held and an exchange program for girls and adults is financed by penny contributions from the Scouts.

The strength of the movement rests in the cooperation and support of the community and in the volunteer services of both men and women.

The Golden Anniversary theme—"Honor the Past—Serve the Future"—bespeaks the aim of every Girl Scout, both young and old.
