

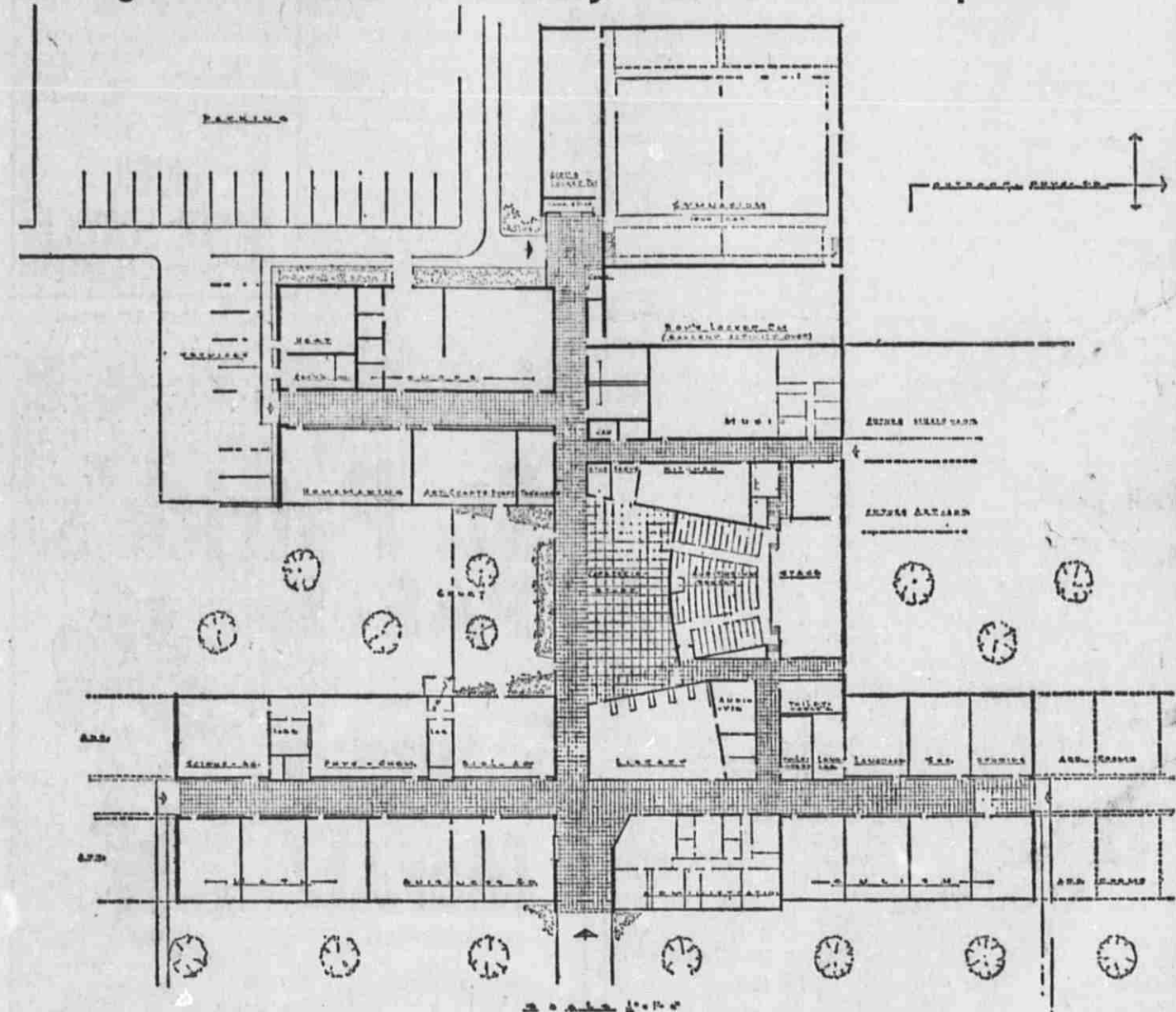

On this day the Camp Fire Girls and Blue Birds of Lowell will attend the church of their choice, in special recognition of the fact that "Worship God" is not only the first precept of the Camp Fire Law, but the most important principle in their lives.

This special day will open the week during which Camp Fire Girls will celebrate their 51st birthday as a national organization. Here in Lowell there have been active groups for 20 continuous years.

A highlight of this "Birthday Month" for the 128 girls now participating in the Blue Bird and Camp Fire Girls program locally will be their annual Dad-Daughter Dinner, to be held Thursday, March 29, at the Runciman School.

The general layout of the building, including materials and equipment selections, have been developed to present a modern, efficient and attractive high school building, meeting the requirements of a complete high school educational program. Economies will result from the compact plan, multiple use of areas, double loaded corridors throughout, lack of wasted space and careful selection of materials, equipment and structural methods. The building is planned without embellishments, depending upon proportions, details and color for beauty.

The three roof levels, resulting from the ceiling height needs of the rooms below, gradually grow from the low classroom and administration wings to the higher auditorium, cafeteria-study, library and shop roof, and finally to the high gymnasium roof. Present plans include using a prefabricated roof slab system that is structural and insulating; can be cut on the job, and when exposed in rooms below, forms an attractive acoustic ceiling. In some areas the steel beams and columns will be exposed but in such a manner as to become a decorative part of the interior.

Asphalt tile classroom floors and painted block classroom walls, glazed tile walls and terrazzo floors in locker rooms, kitchen and toilets; painted door frames and steel, brick, and natural finished wood will all add color and warmth. Aluminum windows are to be used. Glass above the lockers—above eye level in the corridors will give visual expansion to the corridors and class rooms and act as a borrowed light source for the corridors.

Lockers and much of the cabinet work will be built in. Loose furniture and laboratory, shop, gymnasium, kitchen and home-making equipment will be purchased within the budget from equipment companies.

Present plans specify a low pressure steam boiler system plus mechanical ventilation. Mechanical and electrical runs will be housed in pipe tunnels, and above ceilings available for service.

The Lowell Red Arrow Wrestling squad ended their season with the state meet at Ann Arbor. The Lowell team finished with a total of seven points. All of the Arrows points came from Roger Depew who was in the Heavy Weight class, winning two bouts to finish fourth in his weight class.

Other west state final scores were: Grandville 84 (Winners of the wrestling state crown); East 20; Greenville 12; Allegan 11; Rockford 9; Nashville and Lowell 7 each; Cedar Springs 3; and Belding 2.

Four Lowell Men Jailed On Drinking Charge

Four Lowell young men were arrested Monday, Officer Avery Block reported, on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, the 15-year-old boy being turned over to Juvenile home.

Tuesday the boys were brought before Justice Rooker in Ada who passed out the following fines and jail sentences: Joe Morgan 19, \$25 fine and 10 days in jail; Ed Bihler 19, \$40 and 10 days in jail; Ralph Peckham 17, \$50 and 10 days to be served week-ends; Bill Pryor 17, \$50 and 15 days for resisting arrest and on the contributing charge \$25 and 10 days.

The men were arrested after a local business place complained to the police that the boys were causing a disturbance.

Arrows Downed In Tournament

The Lowell Red Arrows fighting basketball team bowed out of tournament play last Friday by losing to Lakeview High in the semi-finals by a score of 49-48.

The Lakeview Wildcats took an early lead in the first half only to see the local team come back several times to come within one point of the Wildcats. The Arrows shot 28 times in the first half and made 10 for a percentage of 36.

The Lowell team scored 11 points in a row in the third period and outscored Lakeview 17 to 6. Don Dilly led the attack with 11 points. The Arrows had their biggest lead at the end of the third period which was six points. With the score 38 to 32, the Wildcats scored five free throws in a row to narrow the lead to one point with four minutes left to play. The Wildcats tied the score at 45 all with less than two minutes left in the game, and went ahead on a field goal.

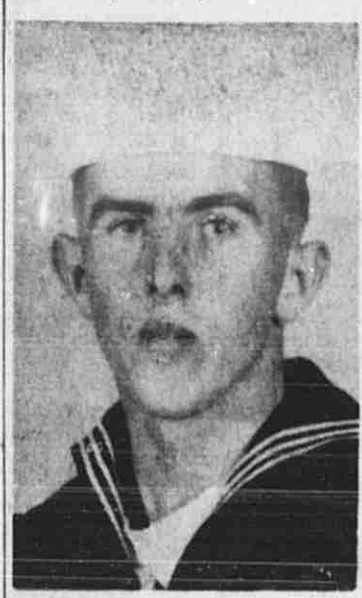
Bob Elzinga put the Arrows back on top with a three point play but it turned out to be the local team's dying gasp as the Wildcats made two free throws to win the game.

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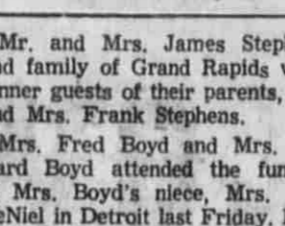

Lowell Area School Board

February 5, 1962

The regular meeting of the Lowell Area School Board was called to order by President Rollins at 7:30 p. m. and then adjourned at 8 p. m. and the minutes of these meetings are concerned with necessary legal work for filing the papers for the school election on the proposed high school bond issue. The meeting was then recessed at 8 p. m. by President Rollins; all school board members present also were Messrs. Nisbet, Hagen, Veenma and Jelferics.

Arthur Bierl, chairman of the Teachers' Salary Committee, presented the attached report on the recommendation for an established salary schedule for the Lowell Area Schools. This was adopted with the following limitations: Under the supplemental salary schedule, plays will be given for an additional \$250.00 to the yearly contract and an extra class will be given \$300.00 per year. Instead of the steps authorized, for the first year the maxima will stop at the eleventh step and the maximum increase for a teacher will be \$400.00 per year. The Board also reserves the right to withhold step increments whenever they feel the circumstances justify this. It is realized that if the first step is increased then the subsequent steps should also be increased.

Letters have been received from the Water and Wastewater school boards requesting permission to vote on annexation to the Lowell Area Schools. On the recommendation of our attorney it would be impossible to permit any area to annex or make any other changes in our boundaries at this time without jeopardizing the entire school bond issue. Therefore Dr. Hill was instructed to write to these districts informing them of our inability to accept them at this time, but reaffirming the desire of the board to annex them at the earliest possible moment.

A letter was received from Bruce Walter and he was invited to our next meeting with the architect on February 19, 1962, to discuss the possibility of using cost as the heating agent for the school. On motion by Kiel, supported by Metternick, Fred Sherk was hired as the bond accountant and George Cook as the attorney to carry out the necessary legal steps for the school bond election.

It was announced that Chris Burch was to be honored by the Michigan State Coaches Association at the state basketball tournament on March 17, for having completed twenty-five years of active coaching.

Mr. Rollins explained that although we can have a lower insurance rate if we will conform to certain necessary steps in routine inspections of the building and comply with a certain number of requests to correct violations, that there are a number of hazards present in the high school building that should require adequate attention to decrease the risk of fire.

On motion by Rankin, supported by Wessell, Mr. Gotschall is not to be retired as our basketball coach for the coming year. This was passed with six "yes" votes and one abstention. There was extensive discussion of other possible contract revisions as well; no action will be taken at this time until there has been a further chance to study the performance and compliance of the various teachers.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:15 p. m.

The Superintendent's Corner

This week the Ledger is printing the floor plan of the proposed high school. This plan has been drawn after much discussion between the faculty and the architect. Every attempt has been made to compromise with the existing buildings and to be sure that new areas were needed and usable. As you look over this floor plan you will notice how the building can easily be expanded as new additions are required in the future. You will notice that no separate study hall has been provided; however there will be a combination eating-study hall arrangement. The area listed as an auditorium will be usable for large class instruction where several sections are brought together, class meetings, and as a visual-aid room. The gymnasium is of standard construction, with the area for seating also usable for physical education classes, noon activities, and basketball practice. The bleachers when pushed back will allow the gym floor to be used by both boys and girls' physical education classes at the same time. This will allow maximum use of these facilities.
