Any citizen who has made any investigation of the need for a new high school in Lowell should be convinced that to provide the children of area with adequate education a proper facility and the money to operate it, is essential.

We urge any citizen who has any questions on the needs of the community for a new high school to pick up the telephone and talk with any member of the board or the school staff.

The other question that seems to be foremost in the minds of citizens is if the district is getting the most for its money, This question, I feel, can be answered by looking at the men we have on the board of education. These men have spent hours looking over other schools, interviewing architectural firms, and checking the plans submitted. I have been present at several meetings and know the way each item has been judged and questioned before the board's approval has been given.

The school that has been proposed is no "marble-palace" but an adequate structure that this community can be proud of without feeling that tax money has been squandered on luxury. Thesite represents the best location at the lowest price obtainable; no one has come up with anything better,

The amount of increase in tax dollars needed for this building and operating millage is modest in view of the increases that are being requested in our neighboring communities,

I feel that any fair-minded citizen who will investigate the facts on the need, the plans and the taxes required will come. to the conclusion that they should vote "Yes" on both proposals at the special school election on next Monday.

Accidental Poisoning Strikes Some 779 Kent County Children


> A total of 779 cases of accidental poisonings to children in Kent County and Grand Rapids were reported to the Health Department in 1961 by the Poison Control Centers at Blodgett, St. Mary's and Butterworth hospitals. Dr. W. B. Prothro, City-County Health Officer pointed out that of this total, 9 percent or 719 poisonings occurred to children under five years of age. Almost one-half of these were aged 2 to 3 years.

Two out of three children were oisoned by the accidental ingestion of medicines. Aspirin was the most common medicine left purses, on bedside tables and titchens or bathrooms within th asy reach of curious little fin gers. In addition to the accidenta consumption of aspirin is the need guard against overdosage, Children under one year, for example, require a minimum of 24 hours to excrete a single dosage of aspirin. Dosage should be prescribed by a doctor.

Because reducing drugs are often used at mealtime, they are equently and carelessly left o kitchen or dining room tables garded as potential causative a-
