



School Bonds Approved

School Bond Attorney George R. Cook, announced today that the State Finance Commission has approved the \$1,100,000 bond issue to build a new high school in Lowell that the voters approved by a one vote margin on March 26.

The bonds will be put up for bids on Tuesday, June 5, if present plans are carried out. Construction on the new school could get underway early in August if nothing happens to hold up the plans and specifications.

Ball Team Drops Two

Lowell's varsity baseball team after running up five straight league victories has dropped two close ball games to Cedar Springs and Sparta. In last Thursday's 4-3 loss to Cedar Springs, Lowell's infield defense fell apart, committing 4 costly errors. Cedar Springs scored 2 runs in the first and 2 runs in the second and Lowell could never overcome their early lead. Lowell's batting attack produced 7 base hits but the local team was unable to put them together.

On Tuesday afternoon at Sparta, 2 walks and a boot in the infield gave Sparta 2 unearned runs in the third inning and it was all they needed to post a 2-0 victory. Sparta's pitching ace, Dennis Buck, bested Lowell's Don Dilly who in the previous encounter had come out a 2-1 winner. Dennis Buck allowed just 2 hits, singles by Tom Bigelow and Fred Verspoor. Don Dilly allowed just 2 hits, both in the sixth inning. Despite the 2 losses, Lowell is still in first place in the Tri-River Conference, however, Coach Ver Morse is planning an infield shake-up in the hopes of tightening the defense in the final three league games.

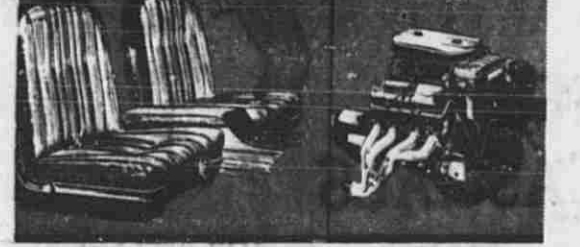

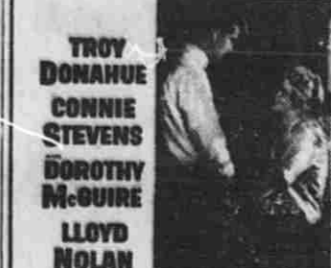
