

Black Bass Season Starts June 1



Fishermen are apt to find more action at the end of their lines than they're expecting during the early weeks of Michigan's black bass season this year. The season opener has been moved up to June 1 in all waters except Lake St. Clair, the St. Clair river, and Detroit river to give anglers a longer and better chance of catching large and smallmouth bass before these prolific fish head for deeper waters. When June 1 arrives, fishermen can look for largemouths mostly in shallow lake-edge water, in lily pad or bullrush areas, around stumps and submerged logs. Smallmouths favor rock, stone, or gravel areas in shallow water of lakes, near mouths of rivers, and in bays of the Great Lakes at this time of the year. Smallmouths strike small to medium plugs, spoons, poppers, bugs, and streamers cast---not trolled---into the shallows. For largemouths, most any artificial lure works well during early season fishing, and both casting and spinning gear are in order. Mich. Dept. of Conservation






